A breakdown of the multiple choice and hazard perception scores achieved for those who pass the test, for example 5% may have achieved 50/50 on the multiple choice part of the test and 75/75 on the hazard perception part of the test.

For a candidate to pass their theory test, they must meet the minimum pass score. For cars and motorcycles they must score 43 out of 50 in the multiple choice section and 44 out of 75 for the hazard perception test.

Attached at Annex B is a table showing the full range of scores achieved in both the hazard perception and multiple choice parts of the test in the 2011/12 financial year. The figures supplied are based on the number of tests conducted so the total will differ from the number of individuals detailed above.
