RED TAPE CHALLENGE UPDATE

Implementation Plan for the
Retail Theme

JANUARY 2013

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1. Introduction

The Prime Minister announced in April 2011 that he wanted his Government to be the first in modern history to leave office having reduced the overall burden of regulation. To help deliver this he launched the Red Tape Challenge, a systematic review of some 6,500 substantive regulations that the Government inherited, with the aim of scrapping or significantly reducing as many of them as possible. The Red Tape Challenge gives businesses and civil society the opportunity to have their say on the regulations, grouped by theme, that affect their everyday lives.

Retail was the first theme to go live on the Red Tape Challenge website in April 2011. The theme was open for public comment between 7 April and 10 May 2011 and we received almost 9,000 comments across eight sub-categories:

1. Consumer Information
2. Restricted Goods
3. Weights and Measures
4. Hallmarking
5. Vehicles Parts and Fuel
6. Trading with the Enemy
7. Trading Requirements
8. Sunday Trading.

Following consideration of the comments we received, and challenge from Ministers to ensure we were being sufficiently ambitious, we announced the Retail package on the 28 July 2011.

A total of 257 regulations were considered as part of the theme. From the full list of regulations we proposed to:

- Scrap 114 (44%)
- Improve 41 (16%)
- Keep 102 (40%)

Therefore, we committed under the original package to scrap or improve 60% (155) of the regulations under consideration.

2. The Retail Package

Since the theme was announced several changes have been made to the list of regulations above. The list of 102 regulations to keep included regulations which were unresolved and those that were transferred from the Retail theme to other Red Tape Challenge themes. At the time of the announcement many of the proposals were subject to further consultation. Policy leads have taken

the opportunity to add other regulations to the Retail theme which were not included in the original package.

The current package consists of 260 regulations and can be summarised as:

- **Scrap 119**

We have identified 119 measures which are no longer necessary and can be removed from the statute book. This is mainly because they are redundant and are duplicated by more recent and up to date legislation.

- **Improve 46**

We plan on improving 46 regulations to reduce the burden on business by reducing the number of regulations through simplification and through using alternatives to regulations such as voluntary codes.

- **Keep 73**

These regulations have been identified as being necessary to safeguard consumers and business. Some of these relate to EU measures therefore the decision to keep them is beyond the control of the UK.

- **Transfer 12**

After analysis we found that eight regulations were more appropriate for the Road Transport theme so they were transferred to the Department for Transport. Additionally four regulations have been moved to the Department for Health in their Healthy Living and Social Care theme.

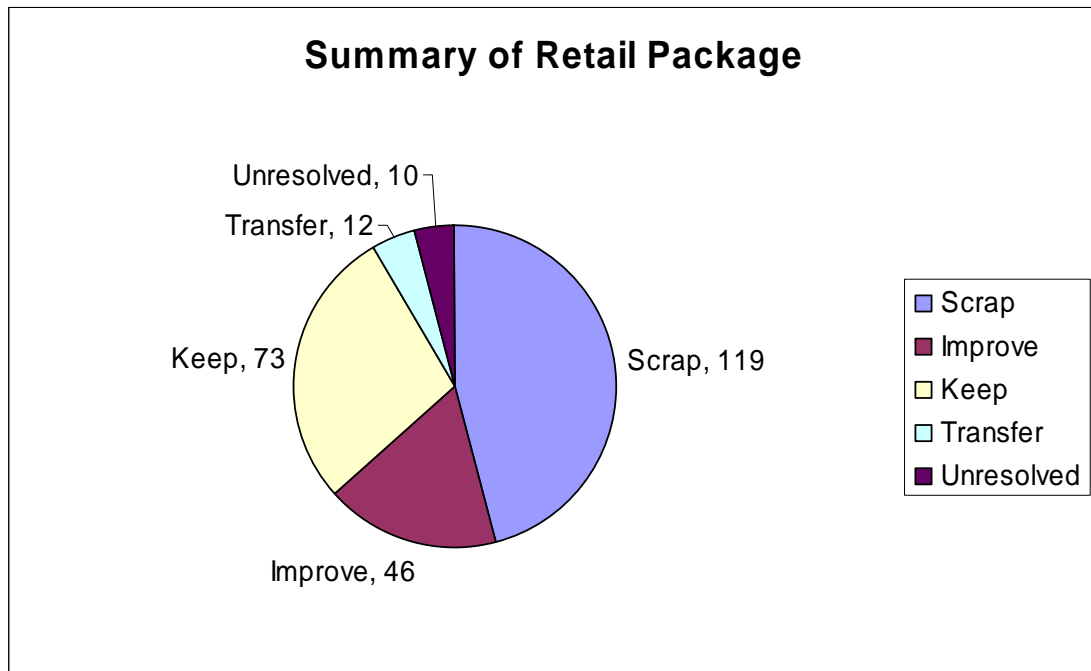
- **Unresolved 10**

The Star Chamber did not reach a decision on these regulations, so we cannot commence implementation on these until the regulations have been classified as a scrap or otherwise.

We aim to scrap and improve 165 regulations and have been proactive about reducing the burdens on business and tidying up the statute book. We have also identified an additional ten regulations to scrap and improve compared to the original retail package which was committed to scraping and improving 155 regulations.

In line with the Prime Minister's ambition, we now intend to scrap and improve over 60% of the regulations under the retail theme.

Chart 1 below shows a summary of how the regulations fall within each of the categories.



3. Progress to date

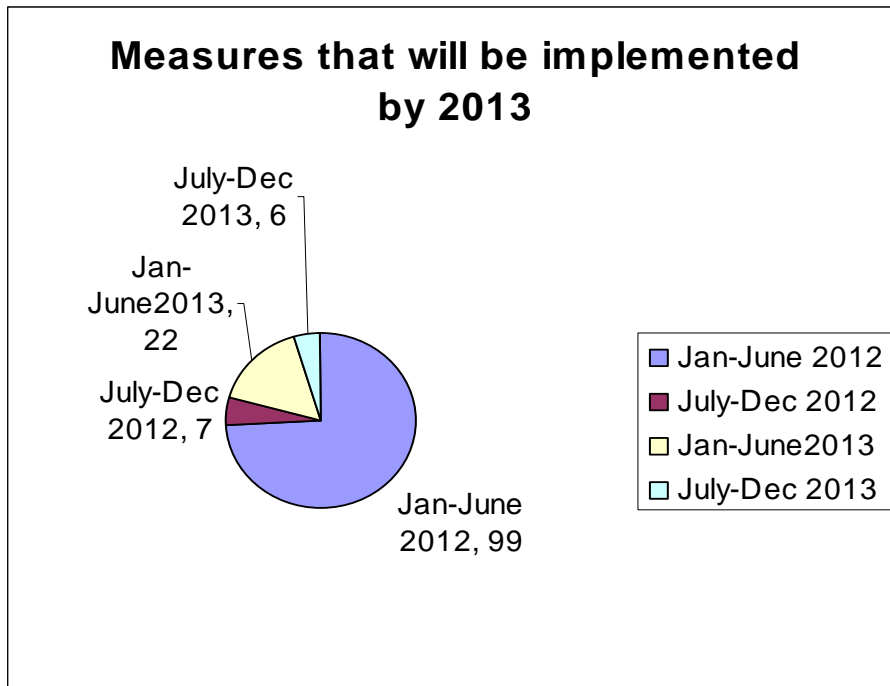
The Department has made significant progress, having already implemented 106 of the regulations (64%) we announced to scrap or improve. These include:

- 98 Trading with the Enemy Regulations (TWTE) have already been revoked. Business Innovation & Skills (BIS) revoked 84 TWTE Regulations on the 15th December 2011 and HM Treasury revoked 14 TWTE Regulations on the 25th May 2012
- The Competition Commission revoked the Domestic Electrical Goods Order on the 1st February 2012
- Seven product safety regulations were revoked on the 1st October 2012. These Regulations are redundant and are now covered by the General Product Safety Regulations 2005 and the Competition Act 1998. These concern Bunk Beds, Hood Cords, Imitation Dummies, Bed Pricing, Wheeled Child Conveyances, Child Resistant Packaging and Cooking Utensils.

4. Measures which will be implemented by the end of 2013

The Department will have implemented the majority of measures that we intend to scrap or improve by the end of 2013, with only 31 measures of the 165 outstanding.

The chart below sets out the timeline of when measures will be implemented.



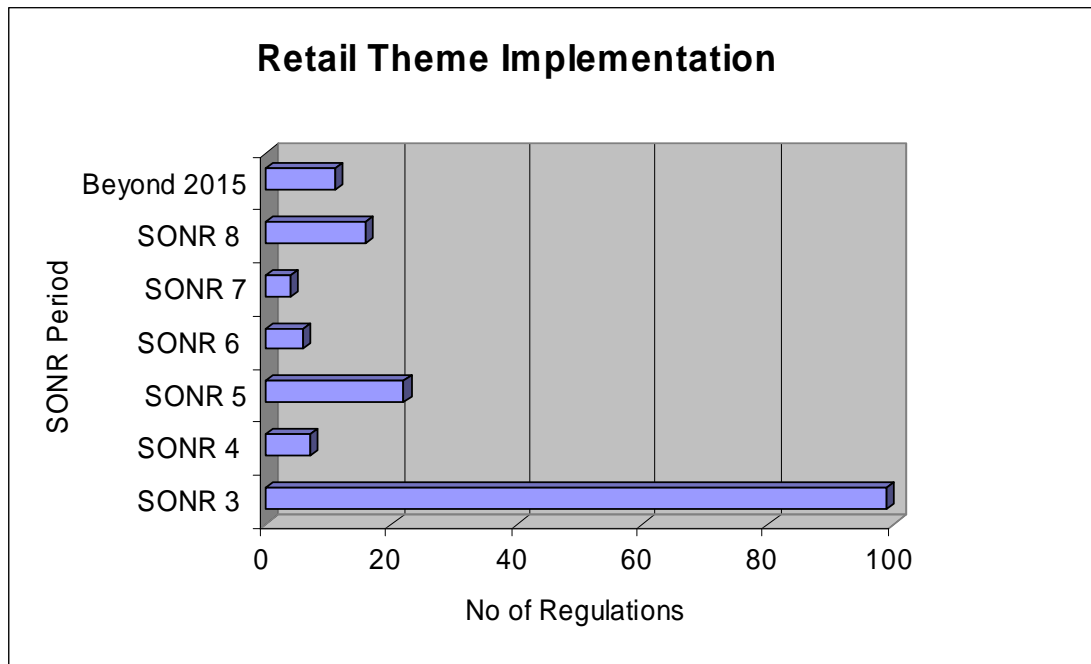
5. Statement of New Regulation (SONR) Implementation Timescales

The Statement of New Regulation is published every 6 months to give businesses an indication of when regulations affecting them will be coming into effect. The table below shows which SONR we expect the regulations to be implemented in. These have been grouped into the relevant sub-category.

* Please note that implementation of the 2 regulations under restricted goods relating to poisons in SONR5 only refers to the guidance document for retailers and not changes to the legislation.

The chart below shows sets out implementation of measures by statement of new regulation.



Many of the measures that are being implemented beyond 2013 cannot be carried out at an earlier stage due to a range of reasons such as: a) we are awaiting the related EU negotiations to take place before we can proceed with implementation; or b) we require the use of primary legislation and the bill process can be complex and lengthy.

It should also be noted that the implementation plans for these later measures may be subject to some change. This is because the measures are, in many cases, dependant on processes that are outside of our control (whether at a domestic or EU level).

6. Comments received from business

Through the Red Tape Challenge we have received helpful comments from stakeholders and a selection of them can be found below

Poisons

Quote from a Retailer 'I'm sure we should have a license, but we let it lapse and no-one has reminded us about it, so I don't think enforcement is very consistent. It's a farce really. The rules about information provided by manufacturers with the product and on the packaging have made it irrelevant anyway'

TV Licensing

Businesses will benefit because their staff will no longer have to spend time dealing with TV Licensing inspectors; or being trained to record details of TV sales, or spend time requesting information from customers – which may include managing any customer resistance to the request for personal data. Removing the burden will lead to a welcome reduction in costs for businesses [c.£1.8m pa for retailers overall]. The British Retail Consortium has described the repeal as an enormous help.

Age Restricted Sales

Association of Convenience Stores (ACS) 'Age restricted sales pose many challenges for retailers, enforcement authorities and communities, and this clear guidance advocating an evidence based and inclusive assessment of local needs is a significant step towards addressing some of these challenges'.

British Retail Consortium (BRC) 'The BRC has strongly supported the development of a comprehensive Code of Practice on Regulatory Delivery in the field of Age Restricted Products and Services – a Code that could and would be supported by all those involved in the area. We are glad to have been able to join with other stakeholders in its preparation'.

Consumer Law

The consumer law reform programme aims to streamline and modernise rights currently found in 12 pieces of legislation and the investigatory powers of Trading Standards officers currently found scattered in around 60 pieces of legislation. The reform programme will overhaul the current complex regime and set out a simpler framework in plain English. This new framework will provide certainty where there is currently lack of clarity, remove overlaps and unnecessary rules, and update the law where this is required.

Quote from the Red Tape Challenge Website- 'From the point of view of small businesses the problem is the sheer volume and complexity of all this 'protection of the consumer'. Frankly it is impossible for the small business owner to even read all this stuff, let alone understand and apply it. This means every small business owner is constantly exposed to action being taken against him for contravening some regulation he never knew existed. This is ridiculous and unfair'

Hallmarking

We are taking forward the Legislative Reform Order at the express request of the UK hallmarking community. The UK Assay Offices have asked for a change to the law to allow them to compete with those European counterparts whose hallmarking law permits them to set up hallmarking operations overseas. The view of the Assay Offices is that a change in the law would place them on level terms with their competitors but, just as importantly, failure to change the law would perpetuate, and make worse, their competitive disadvantage in relation to their competitors. It is estimated that, if the Assay Offices take advantage of this opportunity, they could benefit by £1 million per year.

Product Safety

British Retail Consortium 'We support the reduction in the age for the sale of Christmas crackers to 12. Our customers cannot understand why the sale of these products should be age restricted and any reduction in the age limit is welcome. The General Product Safety Directive as transposed into UK law is designed to ensure that only safe products are placed on the market, Cost savings result from retailers being able to utilise their own approaches to guaranteeing only safe products reach the market rather than trying to fit into a straitjacket imposed by regulation – often a different approach for each product'.

Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents 'RoSPA also supports the move to reduce red tape and unnecessary legislative burdens and we do feel that this exercise will assist in this process'

7. Next Steps

We will continue to update stakeholders on changes to regulations which affect them through the publication of the Statement of New Regulation which is published twice a year.
