Please note that:

- from 4 August 2008, the lorry and bus theory test was split in to two parts; the
 multiple choice test (MC) and the hazard perception test (HPT). The MC and HPT
 could be taken in either order or on the same day or on separate days. Therefore,
 in Annex B, you'll find the number of large goods vehicle (LGV) and public carrying
 vehicle (PCV) tests conducted broken into HPT and MC from the 2008/9 financial
 year.
- from 1 May 2010, the abridged car theory test was introduced; this test is a shorter version of the standard car theory test and is only available to candidates that have been awarded the new pre-driver qualification in safe road use
