Consult on proposals for anti-social behaviour powers and tools (end Apr 2011)	The review of anti-social behaviour tools and powers is now complete, and we will set out our proposals in a public consultation in February.
Develop and publish a revised 'Prevent' strategy aimed at stopping people from becoming terrorists or supporting violent extremism	Public consultation and regional events were scheduled to take place between November and December 2010. To allow for wider consultation, Ministers requested additional consultation events in the knowledge that this would push the publication date back. With their agreement, the publication deadline was put back to February 2011. Due to the considerable response we received during the consultation process, an additional month is required to complete the analysis and finalise the drafting. Revised Prevent strategy will be published by the end of March.

Remove national Stop and Account recording and reduce certain Stop and Search procedures (Dec 2010)	Still not complete	Ministers remain committed to reducing the bureaucracy that gets in the way of frontline police officers doing their job most effectively. However, stop and search remains an issue of concern to many communities, particularly those of a black or minority ethnic background, and additional time was taken to confirm the content of the draft Code of Practice with civil liberties groups. This delayed the laying before Parliament of the PACE Code of Practice Order that is necessary to make the changes. The Order was debated in the House of Lords on 25 January and the House of Commons on 2 February, we aim to commence the changes on the 28 of February.
Develop proposals for functions currently performed by the NPIA (Dec 2010)	Still not complete	Initial scoping work on the range of functions currently performed by NPIA and their operational importance to police forces has been completed. A new significant factor has been the far reaching recommendations of Peter Neyroud's review into police leadership delivered to the Home Secretary just before Christmas. Further proposals are expected to be submitted to

		Ministers by mid February for consideration alongside wider policing changes.
Undertake and publish a review of counter- terrorism and security legislation, working with the Department for Communities and Local Government on the Regulation of Investigatory Powers Act (Dec 2010)	Complete	The review of counter-terrorism and security powers was published on 26 January.
Develop and publish proposals for the storage and acquisition of internet and e-mail records (Dec 2010)	Still not complete	It has been the Home Office's intention to publish proposals for the storage and acquisition of internet and email records by December 2010. Work on the proposals has been underway but was dependent on the Counter-Terrorism Powers Review of counter-terrorism and security legislation, which includes addressing public authorities' powers to acquire communications data and additional safeguards for local authorities acquisition of data. The publication of proposals on the storage and acquisition of internet and email records will therefore follow in due course.
Determine policy changes to extend the UK's ability to deport foreign nationals, as part of the review of counter-terrorism and security legislation (Dec 2010)	Complete	The review of counter-terrorism and security powers was published on 26 January and included recommended policy changes to extend the UK's ability to deport foreign nationals.
Review the 'Prevent' strand of the counter- terrorism strategy (Dec 2010)	Complete	Public consultation and regional events took place between November and January 2011. To allow full consideration of the evidence obtained, the review deadline was put back to January 2011 and has now been completed.
Decide whether further legislation will be required to ensure a safe and secure Games (Dec 2010)	Still not complete	Ministers are currently considering whether further legislation will be required to ensure a safe and secure Games. A decision on this is expected by March.
Develop proposals for a new, simplified set of anti-social behaviour powers and tools (Sep 2010)	Complete	The Home Secretary set out the Government's direction on anti-social behaviour in her speech of 28 July. The Home Office has been working on implementing that vision so the police and other local agencies have the tools and powers to crack down on perpetrators. The review of anti-social behaviour powers and tools has been completed, and we will set our proposals out in a public consultation in February.
