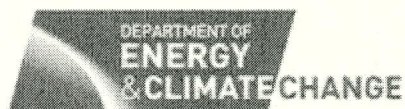

On the whole I think it reads well and am particularly pleased that we have captured nuclear aspects now and covered the main elements re climate change impacts, i.e. flooding and water consumption. My only comment would be in relation to the last paragraph on the bottom of page xii – 'historical reluctance to increase nuclear capacity'. This is not really true, as past Governments, from all parties, have been committed to nuclear. I think it would be better phrased as:

'For example there has been a continuing debate about the need to increase nuclear capacity and some renewables...

That fits better with the political and societal attitudes theme of the paragraph.

The Adapting to Climate Change Programme is currently in the process of compiling the Government Report to accompany the UK Climate Change Risk Assessment Report (previously referred to as the Synthesis Report), which will be laid before Parliament in January 2012.

The structure and format of the Government Report has already been agreed by the Department Adaptation Programme Board and the CCRA Steering Group (see attached for ease the paper which outlines the structure, format and purpose of this document).

The 'UK Climate Change Risk Assessment' Report which many of you have reviewed and commented on, will be laid before Parliament alongside the Government Report, and will form the main evidence document. The Government Report, which is primarily aimed at central Government Departments and large organisations, within both the public and private sectors, provides an opportunity for Government to highlight current policies in place to address some of the key risks identified in the CCRA and to look forward to the development and delivery of National Adaptation Programme.
