

Could you please provide me with the following information

1) The current total number of potential driving instructor (PDI) details held by DSA

We currently hold details of 95,265 PDIs. This information is correct as of 29 March 2011. Please note that many of these PDIs will no longer be pursuing a career as a driving instructor.

2) The total number PDIs who have registered in the past two years and have not yet qualified and then broken down into

- a) not passed part one**
- b) passed part one not passed part two**
- c) passed part two not passed part three**

We do not hold information on individuals going through the qualifying examination. Our records show details of 26,324 individuals who applied to start the qualifying process between 29 March 2009 and 28 March 2011 but have yet to qualify. Out of those 26,324 individuals:

- 17,876 have not passed the ADI part one test
- 2,734 have passed the ADI part one test but not the ADI part two test
- 5,714 have passed the ADI part two test but not the ADI part three test

3) The number of criminal records bureau (CRB) checks conducted on PDIs between

- a) 1 April and 30 June 2010**
- b) 1 July and 30 September 2010**
- c) 1 October and 31 December 2010**

You can find the number of CRB checks conducted on PDIs in the time periods you have requested in the table below.

Time period	Number of CRB checks conducted on PDIs
1 April to 30 June 2010	3,161
1 July to 30 September 2010	3,397
1 October to 31 December 2010	2,853
