

## DECC Statement of New Regulation, July-December 2011

The publication of the Second Statement of New Regulation shows that DECC is committed to reducing the burden of regulation on business and society, without compromising our ability to meet our hugely important goals.

Some examples of where DECC has recently reduced the burden of regulation include:

- Raising the threshold for energy supplier participation in the <u>Carbon Emission</u> <u>Reduction Target</u> (CERT) and the <u>Community Energy Saving Programme</u> (CESP). This will bring about significant benefits for smaller suppliers, fostering competition which will in turn will foster innovation and help to lower prices for both household and business consumers
- Simplifying the exemption orders regime for users of radioactive substances which present a very low risk to people and the environment. As confirmed by the independent Regulatory Policy Committee, this will bring more than £1m annual savings to businesses in the UK.
- Reforming current legislation on third party access to upstream petroleum infrastructure. The current regime is both piecemeal and inconsistent, so these changes will facilitate timely development of oil and gas resources.

Measures on the Statement are fully compliant with the <u>one-in</u>, <u>one-out</u> rule, under which no new legislation which imposes costs on business can be brought in without the identification of existing regulations with an equivalent value that can be removed.

In 2012 and beyond, DECC will continue to pursue opportunities for burden reduction by further simplifying the CRC Energy Efficiency Scheme, by repealing obsolete regulations, and through full engagement with the <u>Red Tape Challenge</u>. While more regulation will be needed in the future in order to meet our extremely ambitious Climate Change and energy targets, we will seek to introduce this regulation in a "smart" way, that encourages competition and innovation, and that realises benefits for the environment, society and the economy as a whole.
