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Taking Part – Background and what's new

improving the quality of life for all

Background

- Commissioned by DCMS and partner NDPBs Arts Council England, English Heritage, Sport England, and the Museums, Libraries and Archives Council.
- Has run continuously since 2005
- Random probability sample; households selected from PAF
- Household survey of adults (16+) and children (5-15)
- Covers England and provides reliable national and regional estimates
- Face-to-face survey, lasting 40mins (20mins in 2009/10)
- 5-10 year olds interviewed via proxy (thru parent); 11-15 year olds interviewed face-to-face.
- Asks about the activities done and events attended, but does not ask where activities or events have taken place
- Fieldwork conducted by TNS-BMRB

Good-bye targets



Taking Part is a National Statistic



- Produced to the standards set out in the Code of Practice for Official Statistics
- National Statistics undergo regular reviews to ensure they meet customer needs and are free from any political interference
- It is a requirement for all central Government departments and a number of nominated NDPBs to produce and use official statistics in accordance with the Statistics and Registration Service Act.
- Pre-release access is granted 24 hours ahead of release to a limited number of named officials. Access prior to this is only available to those required for the production and quality assurance of the release.

- Quarterly statistical release
- Broader Analysis Programme (KKP)
- Ad hoc research to address specific research questions many reports published today

Looking forward

- Current contract runs until the end of this financial year
- We are developing a business case that forms the basis of re-tendering
- With the help of NatCen's review of Taking Part (published today), we are exploring ways of making changes; options include:
 - Interviewing all adults in household instead of just one
 - Retaining a small core sample (of around 5,000) of respondents who are asked given the full questionnaire, and supplement this will a larger sample who would be given a much shorter questionnaire.
 - Adding a longitudinal element to enable us to track changes over time
- We are also exploring ways of measuring the Olympics legacy and digital participation




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NEW 2009/10 Adult and child data






Regional breakdown


 Increases in West Midlands, Yorkshire and the Humber, South East and the North West



The effect of area level deprivation is particularly stark






 No changes since 2005/06, but engagement higher in East of England and South East



The effect of area level deprivation is also noticeable






Regional breakdown


 Decreases in all areas except the North East and East Midlands (which have remained stable)



The effect of area level deprivation is less noticeable








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The effect of area level deprivation is considerable








Regional breakdown
