# **REQUEST FOR INFORMATION: Files relating to the Northfield Report**

Thank you for your request for information about the status and whereabouts of the files relating to the Northfield Report, which we received on 3 December. We have handled this new request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

The initial search of the file database, which holds over 520,000 records initially only revealed the two CQE files of 13C and 13D. Additional research has revealed a total of 129 CQE files which are currently being held in our Record Centre. These files are overdue for appraisal and will be added to 2014 appraisal programme, at which time a decision will be taken on whether or not to preserve any of these records in The National Archives.

File AHA 10488 was the file series for the 'Committee of Inquiry into the Acquisition and Ownership of Agricultural Land (Northfield Committee)'. This was destroyed in 2004 because the report was published.

There were no actual Committee papers on the AHA file and the Committee report was officially published as a Command Paper which should be available from Government Publications.

I hope the existence of these files explains the gaps in the file series and attach a list of all the available CQE records with their numbers and titles. If you would like to examine these files they can be requested for you via the Departmental Records

Centre. We can only request 6 files at a time and they need to be returned before other orders can be made.

In keeping with the spirit and effect of the FOIA, and in keeping with the government's Transparency Agenda, all information is assumed to be releasable to the public unless exempt. Therefore, the information released to you will now be published on <a href="www.gov.uk">www.gov.uk</a> together with any related information that will provide a key to its wider context. Please note that this will not include your personal data.

I attach Annex A, which explains the copyright that applies to the information being released to you.

I also attach Annex B giving contact details should you be unhappy with the service you have received.
