Introduction

This report presents the key trends on the latest twelve months (April 2010 to March 2011) of activity in the Criminal Justice System (CJS) for England and Wales. The court proceedings data for January to March 2011 is provisional. For each process a brief description of the function is included with an explanation of some of the main procedures involved. More detailed analysis is published annually on the full calendar year dataset.

Alongside the publication is a technical document titled "Criminal Justice Statistics: Background, Definitions and Measurement". This document provides users with detailed information on the concepts and methods used in compiling this bulletin, including the quality of the data. Where appropriate comparisons are made between different sources covering activity in the CJS. In particular, comparisons are made to numbers of crimes recorded by the police (often the starting point for crimes dealt with by other CJS agencies) rather than estimates from the British Crime Survey (BCS). The BCS provides robust estimates of trends in crimes against the population resident in households, including those never reported to the police, but excludes other crimes such as those against businesses or so-called 'victimless' crime. Therefore police recorded crime provides a more meaningful comparison for measures relating to the wider CJS. Findings from the BCS and recorded crime are published together in statistical bulletins by the Home Office.

The data provides users with information about proven offending and its outcomes in England and Wales. The contents of this bulletin will be of interest to government policy makers in the development of policy and their subsequent monitoring and evaluation. Others will be interested in the way different crimes are dealt with in the Criminal Justice System.

Information about statistical revisions, forthcoming changes and the symbols and conventions used in the bulletin are given in the explanatory notes section.

Main findings [Tables Q1.1 – Q1.5]

Overview of the Criminal Justice System in the 12 months ending March 2011

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 2.09 million individuals¹ given an out of court disposal or proceeded against at court. Compared with the 12 months to March 2010, there was a 13.3 per cent fall in the use of out of court disposals from 522,100 to 452,700 and a three per cent fall in the number of defendants proceeded against at court.

Out of Court Disposals

There were 452,700 out of courts disposals administered in the 12 months ending March 2011, 13.3 per cent fewer than the 522,100 in the 12 months ending March 2010, with a decrease seen in every offence group.

Police cautions

There were 238,100 cautions administered in the 12 months ending March 2011.

- This was 12.9 per cent fewer than the 273,200 administered in the 12 months ending March 2010 and 33.7 per cent fewer than the 359,000 administered in the 12 months ending March 2007 when the use of cautions peaked.
- Fewer cautions were administered in all offence groups in the 12 months ending March 2011 except *robbery*, which increased by sixty-three offenders from 173 to 236.
- The decrease in cautions was greatest for *theft and handling stolen goods* which fell 19.8 per cent.

Penalty Notices for Disorder (PNDs)

There were 134,000 PNDs issued in the 12 months ending March 2011.

- This was 17.1 per cent fewer than the 161,600 issued in the 12 months ending March 2010 and 36.0 per cent fewer than the peak of 209,400 issued in the 12 months ending March 2007.
- Thirteen thousand nine hundred of these were for drug offences, an increase of 5.4 per cent compared with the 13,100 in the 12 months ending March 2010.
- There was a decrease of 18.0 per cent (to 37,400) in penalty notice disorders issued for theft and handling stolen goods in the 12 months ending March 2011.

Cannabis warnings

There were 80,700 *cannabis warnings* issued in the 12 months ending March 2011, 7.6 per cent fewer than the 87,300 warnings issued in the 12 months ending March 2010.

Court proceedings

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 1.64 million defendants proceeded against in magistrates' courts.

- This is three per cent fewer than the 1.69 million defendants proceeded against in the 12 months ending March 2010 and 20.3 per cent fewer than the peak of 2.06 million in the 12 months ending March 2004.
- The decrease in prosecutions compared to the 12 months ending March 2010 was caused by fewer proceedings for summary motoring offences and summary non-motoring offences.


Of those defendants who were proceeded against at magistrates' courts there were 3.3 per cent remanded in custody. For the more serious indictable offences 9.8 per cent were remanded into custody.

Convictions

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 1.36 million offenders convicted of a criminal offence.

- This was 3.0 per cent fewer than the 1.40 million offenders convicted in the 12 months ending March 2010 and 11.8 per cent fewer than the 1.54 million offenders convicted in the 12 months ending March 2004.
- The largest percentage increases in convictions were for theft and handling stolen goods which increased 9.1 per cent from 112,300 to 122,500 and sexual offences which increased 12.3 per cent from 5,290 to 5,940.
- The conviction ratio² for the 12 months ending March 2011 was 82.9 per cent and remained similar to the previous period. The conviction ratio varied from 57.3 per cent for *sexual offences* to 91.8 per cent for *drug offences*.

Sentencing

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 1.36 million offenders sentenced at all courts, 2.9 per cent fewer than the 12 months ending 2010, and 11.8 per cent down on the 12 months ending March 2004.

Fines are the most common sentence passed at court.

 In the 12 months ending March 2011, 65.4 per cent of all offenders were given a fine, a decline of 1.7 percentage points on the 12 months ending March 2010. The decrease in the fine rate is due to the declining use of fines for summary offences, the type of offence for which fines are most commonly used.

In the 12 months ending March 2011, 17.5 per cent of persons were given a sentence to serve in the community either as a Community Sentence (13.9 per cent) or a Suspended Sentence Order (3.6 per cent).

- The community sentence rate in the 12 months ending March 2011 ranged from 41.2 per cent for *criminal damage* (45.0 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2010) to 3.1 per cent for *summary motoring offences* (3.4 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2010).
- The suspended sentence rate in the 12 months ending March 2011 ranged from 25.6 per cent for indictable motoring offences (24.9 per cent in the 12

Custodial sentences are given for the most serious breaches of the criminal law. In the 12 months ending March 2011, 7.6 per cent of persons received a custodial sentence, an increase of 0.4 percentage points from the 12 months ending March 2010.

In the 12 months ending March 2011, 102,000 offenders were given a custodial sentence, just over two per cent more compared to the 12 months ending March 2010, but 7.2 per cent lower than the 12 months ending March 2003 peak.

- The sentence given depends on the nature of the offence and custody is far more common for indictable offences than summary offences. In the 12 months ending March 2011 the custody rate³ was 24.0 per cent for all indictable offences, a decrease of 0.5 per cent compared to the 12 months ending March 2010. For summary offences the custody rate was 1.8 per cent, the same as the 12 months ending March 2010.
- The custody rate varies across indictable offence groups and was highest for robbery (58.6 per cent) and sexual offences (57.1 per cent) and lowest for criminal damage (14.5 per cent) and drug offences (15.6 per cent).

Overall, the average custodial sentence length has increased by 0.1 months to 13.9 months.

 There were 1,342 indeterminate sentences handed down in the 12 months ending March 2011, a decrease from 1,413 in the 12 months ending March 2010. Within this group the number of life sentences fell from 414 in the 12 months ending March 2010 to 384 in the 12 months ending March 2011, the lowest figure in the last eleven years.

Offending Histories

There were 226,000 new entrants to the criminal justice system in 12 months ending March 2011, a fall of 11 per cent compared to 12 months ending March 2010.

25.8 per cent of all offences that resulted in a caution⁴ or conviction in 12 months ending March 2011 were committed by people with no previous proven offences. This is down slightly from 27.8 per cent in 12 months ending March 2010 and reflects the fall in use of cautions. This continues the fall in the proportion of offences committed by people with no previous proven offences since the peak in the use of cautions in 2007.

53.2 per cent of offenders receiving a caution for an indictable offence in 12 months ending March 2011 had no previous proven offences, whilst 3.3 per cent had 15 or more cautions or convictions.

10.4 per cent of offenders convicted for an indictable offence in 12 months ending March 2011 had no previous proven offences, whilst 29.5 per cent had 15 or more previous cautions or convictions.

Figure 1.2 : First offences and further offences in the 12 months ending March 2011



Much of the activity in the criminal justice system starts with the police, when a crime is reported, investigated and detected. The Home Office report on the police activity and the crimes they deal with. In the 12 months ending March 2011, recorded crime decreased by 4.3 per cent from 4.34 million to 4.15 million when compared to the 12 months ending March 2010.

Over the same period, for the equivalent notifiable offences, the use of out of court disposals decreased by 14.4 per cent; penalty notices for disorder (PND) were down 19.1 per cent, cautions down 14.8 per cent and cannabis warnings down 7.6 per cent.

Between the 12 months ending March 2010 and the 12 months ending March 2011 prosecutions for notifiable offences increased by 1.5 per cent and convictions increased by 1.8 per cent. However, these changes are not consistent across the offence groups.

The greatest percentage increases in prosecutions were recorded for the following offence groups:

- sexual offences, increasing 8.7 per cent from 28,100 to 30,500;
- *drug offences*, increasing 8.2 per cent from 103,200 to 111,600.

The greatest percentage decrease in prosecutions was recorded for the following offence group:

• criminal damage, decreasing 2.7 per cent from 81,400 to 79,300.

The greatest percentage changes for convictions were also for these offence groups and were as follows:


- sexual offences, increasing 10.5 per cent from 15,600 to 17,200;
- *drug offences*, increasing 7.7 per cent from 91,100 to 98,100.

Crime in England and Wales [Table Q1.6]

Police recorded crime statistics are administrative data based on crimes that are reported to and recorded by the police in England and Wales, it does not cover crimes not reported to the police e.g. Television Licence Evasion. For more detail see: User Guide to Home Office to Crime Statistics

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 4.15 million crimes recorded by the police (notifiable⁷ offences).

- This was a decrease of 4.3 per cent compared with the 4.34 million in the 12 months ending March 2010 and a decrease of 31 per cent compared with the 6.01 million in the 12 months ending March 2004.
- Compared with the 12 months ending March 2010, crimes decreased in every offence group except sexual offences, robbery and other theft, which increased by 1.1, 1.4 and 4.0 per cent to 55,000, 76,200 and 1,078,700 respectively. The largest decrease was for criminal damage which decreased 13.1 per cent from 806,600 to 701,000
- Of these crimes 86.1 per cent were in the offence groups: *violence against the person, criminal damage, burglary* and *theft and handling stolen goods.*

Out of Court Disposals [Tables Q2.1 - Q2.5]

Out of Court Disposals aim to deal with low risk, low-level and mostly first-time offenders outside of the court system in appropriate circumstances. Out of Court Disposals are not suitable for contested or more serious cases. They would not normally be considered for those who offend repeatedly (subject to relevant guidance). Out of court disposals can include cannabis warnings, Penalty Notices for Disorder and cautions⁸ ⁹.

Cannabis warnings

For a first time offence of cannabis possession an adult is usually issued with a 'cannabis warning'.

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 80,700 warnings for cannabis possession, a decrease of 7.6 per cent compared with 87,300 in the 12 months ending March 2010.

Penalty Notices for Disorder

Penalty Notices for Disorder (PNDs) are more commonly known as 'on the spot fines'. PNDs are a fixed penalty of £50 or £80 designed to tackle low-level, anti-social and nuisance offending for offenders aged 16 or over and are issued for a range of minor offences.


There were 134,000 PNDs issued for the 12 months ending March 2011, a decrease of 17.1 per cent compared with the 12 months ending March 2010. This was a decrease of 36.0 per cent compared with the 209,400 issued at the peak in the 12 months ending March 2007.


There were fewer PNDs issued in 40 of the 43 police force areas (including British Transport Police) in England and Wales compared with the 12 months ending March 2010.

Four offences accounted for 87.9 per cent of all PNDs issued in the 12 months ending March 2011, an increase of 1.2 per cent compared with the 12 months ending March 2010. These were

- 'retail theft of goods under the value of £200' 27.9 per cent (37,400);
- 'drunk and disorderly' 27.2 per cent (36,400);
- 'behaviour likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress' 22.4 per cent (30,000);
- with 'possession of cannabis', the newest offences for which a PND can be issued now accounting for 10.3 per cent (13,900) of PNDs issued.

The change in the use of PNDs is different across these offences.

- 'Behaviour likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress' has decreased year-onyear from the high 84,300 in the 12 months ending March 2007 when it was the most frequently issued PND;
- 'Drunk and disorderly' has declined slightly with 1,700 fewer PNDs issued in the 12 months ending March 2011 than in the 12 months ending March 2006;
- 'Retail theft of goods under the value of £200' increased every year up to the 12 months ending March 2009 and decreased from then to 37,400 in the 12 months ending March 2011;

 'Possession of cannabis' PNDs issued in the 12 months ending March 2011 remains similar to the preceding twelve month period.

Caution

A caution can be given when there is sufficient evidence for a conviction and it is not considered to be in the public interest to institute criminal proceedings. Additionally, the offender must admit guilt and consent to a caution in order for one to be given. A formal caution may be given by, or on the instructions of, a senior police officer. A system of reprimands and warnings replaced cautioning for juveniles in June 2000.

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 238,100 offenders including juveniles, cautioned ¹⁰ or given a reprimand or warning. This was a 12.9 per cent decrease on the previous period (12 months ending March 2010) and continues the downward trend in the use of cautions from the peak in 2007. Of those offenders cautioned in the 12 months ending March 2011:

• For indictable offences there was a decrease of 13.0 per cent in offenders cautioned to 130,600. The offences *violence against the person* and *theft and handling stolen goods* accounted for 78.8 per cent of this decrease. Summary offences similarly decreased by 12.8 per cent to 107,400.

Cautions peaked in the 12 months ending March 2007 and March 2008 with 359,000 and 355,900 cautions administered respectively. Since the 12 months ending March 2008 there has been a 33.1 per cent decline in the number administered. The decline coincides with the removal of a target in April 2008 to increase offences brought to justice and a move towards bringing more serious crime to justice.

Within indictable offences the cautioning rate¹¹ is normally highest for *drug offences*, *criminal damage* and *violence against the person* and lowest for *robbery*, *other indictable offence and sexual offences*. In the 12 months ending March 2011 the cautioning rates for these offences were:

- *drug offences* 39.8 per cent;
- criminal damage 39.2 per cent;
- *violence against the person* 32.2 per cent;
- robbery 2.6 per cent;
- other indictable offences 12.1 per cent;
- sexual offences 19.0 per cent.

Figure 2.2: Offenders cautioned by offence type, 12 months ending March 2001 to 12 months ending March 2011



Court proceedings [Tables 3.1 – 3.5]

If there is sufficient evidence against the defendant and none of the out of court disposals are appropriate, the police will formally charge the suspect. The law then requires the defendant to be brought before a magistrates' court as soon as possible. The defendant can be summoned to appear in court or remanded on bail or custody.

Magistrates' courts

All criminal court cases start in a magistrates' court and the less serious offences will be handled entirely within this court.

In the 12 months ending March 2011, 1.64 million defendants were proceeded against at magistrates' courts, 3.0 per cent fewer than the 1.69 million in the 12 months ending March 2010.


The main factor contributing to this decrease is a fall in defendants proceeded against for summary offences, a drop of 5.4 per cent from 1.27 million to 1.20 million between the 12 months ending March 2010 and the 12 months ending March 2011. Over the same period the number of proceedings for indictable offences increased 4.2 per cent from 418,900 to 436,500.

Summary proceedings, which cover the relatively minor offences such as TV license evasion, common assault and motoring offences, can be dealt with entirely within the magistrates' courts and make up nearly three quarters (73.4 per cent) of all cases. Just under half (49.5 per cent) of these cases relate to summary motoring proceedings which include offences such as speeding, driving while disqualified and drunk driving.

The majority of the decrease in proceedings for summary offences was accounted for by the fall in summary motoring proceedings:

- Defendants proceeded against for summary motoring offences fell by 9.1 per cent from 654,400 in the 12 months ending March 2010 to 595,100 in the 12 months ending March 2011;
- Defendants proceeded against for summary-non motoring offences fell by 1.6 per cent from 617,700 in the 12 months ending March 2010 to 608,100 in the 12 months ending March 2011.

Looking back at the past ten years, defendants proceeded against at magistrates' courts peaked within the decade in the 12 months ending March 2004 at 2.06 million. There were 20.3 per cent fewer defendants proceeded against in the 12 months ending March 2011 compared to the decade's peak. This drop was due to a decrease in summary offence proceedings of 22.6 per cent from 1.56 million to 1.20 million between the 12 months ending March 2004 and the 12 months ending March 2011.

Remands [Tables Q3.1 - Q3.4]

Police remands are the decisions made by a police officer on whether to detain or bail a defendant pending their first appearance in court or send a notice summoning them to appear in court. Court remands are the court's decision on whether a defendant charged with a criminal offence should be held in custody or released on bail during the period up to and including the trial, or while awaiting sentence.

Defendants are more likely to be remanded in custody for indictable offences than summary offences. As a result the proportion of defendants remanded in custody at the Crown Court is higher than at magistrates' courts.

Police remands

In the 12 month period ending March 2011, there were 1.72 million 12 defendants directed to appear at magistrates' courts, a decrease of 3.2 per cent compared with the 12 month period ending March 2010. Of these, 33.3 per cent were granted bail by the police, 11.2 per cent were remanded in custody, and the remaining 55.5 per cent were directed to appear via summonses.

The proportion of defendants remanded in custody varies by offence type. In the 12 months ending March 2011 the proportions remanded in custody were:

- 28.1 per cent (135,700) for indictable offences, similar to the 12 months ending March 2010 and 11.8 percentage points more than the 16.3 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2008;
- 7.7 per cent (48,100) for summary non-motoring offences, half a percentage point more than in the 12 months ending March 2010, and;
- 1.4 per cent (8,800) for summary motoring offences, similar to the proportions seen (1.5 per cent) in the 12 months ending March 2010.

Magistrates' courts

In the 12 month period ending March 2011, 1.72¹³ million defendants were proceeded against at magistrates' courts. Of these it was estimated that:

- 581,500 33.8 per cent were granted bail:
- 56,900 3.3 per cent were remanded in custody;
- and the remaining 1.08 million 62.9 per cent had their case concluded at the magistrates' courts without being remanded.

The proportion of defendants remanded into custody at magistrates' courts has remained broadly consistent over the last seven years at around three to four per cent.

The proportions of defendants remanded in custody by magistrates' by offence type in the 12 months ending March 2011 were:

- 9.8 per cent (47,400) for indictable cases;
- 1.3 per cent (8,400) for summary non-motoring offences:
- 0.2 per cent (1,100) for summary motoring offences.

Crown court remands

The proportion of defendants tried at the Crown Court for indictable offences who were remanded on bail has increased each year from 42.5 per cent in the period ending March 2005 to 53.2 per cent in the period ending March 2011 whereas the proportion remanded in custody fell from 42.6 per cent to 34.7 per cent over the same time frame.

Ethnicity

Data on the ethnicity of defendants are currently available for indictable offences only. It is collected using the officer observed appearance 4+1 system.

In the 12 months ending March 2011, the proportion of white defendants tried at the Crown Court for indictable offences who were held on remand was 32.9 per cent. This figure was 44.5 per cent for black defendants and 32.7 per cent for asian defendants.

Outcome of cases¹⁴

In the 12 months ending March 2011 approximately 11.8 per cent of those defendants remanded in custody at magistrates' courts were subsequently acquitted or not proceeded against, 13.6 percent received immediate custody, 3.4 per cent received a fine and 5.9 per cent received a community sentence. The remainder were either committed for trial or sentence at the Crown Court (54.6 per cent), received an absolute or conditional discharge (2.2 per cent), a suspended sentence (2.8 per cent), were otherwise dealt with (2.6 per cent) or failed to appear (3.1 per cent).

Over the same period, of those remanded in custody during trial at the Crown Court, 12.4 per cent were subsequently acquitted or not proceeded against, 70.7 percent received immediate custody, 6.3 per cent a community sentence and 5.9 per cent a suspended sentence. The remainder received a discharge (0.6 per cent), were otherwise dealt with (2.2 per cent) or failed to appear (1.7 per cent).

The much higher proportion of defendants receiving immediate custody at the Crown Court reflects the more serious nature of cases tried at the Crown Court.

Failure to appear

Each year a proportion of defendants fail to appear in court having been summoned to appear or granted bail.

 In the 12 months ending March 2011, just under 81,600 defendants failed to appear to bail or summons at magistrates' courts, 4.7 per cent of those directed to appear. This compares with 87,900 in the 12 months ending March 2010 and 109,400 in the 12 months ending March 2009, where the proportion failing to appear was 4.9 per cent and 5.6 per cent respectively.

• In the 12 months ending March 2011 approximately 2,900 defendants on bail failed to appear at the Crown Court, 2.2 per cent of those tried at the Crown Court. This compares with 2,700 (2.3 per cent) in the period ending March 2010.


Offenders found guilty [Tables 4.1 – 4.3]

A conviction is where a person or a company is found guilty of a criminal offence at either the magistrates' courts or the Crown Court.

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 1.36 million offenders found guilty, a decrease of 3.0 per cent compared to the 12 months ending March 2010.

- Whilst there was an increase of 6.2 per cent (to 351,600) of offenders found guilty for indictable offences there was a decrease of 3.2 per cent (to 493,600) of offenders found guilty of summary non motoring and a decrease of 8.2 per cent (to 513,600) of offenders found guilty of summary motoring offences.
- Convictions for indictable offences accounted for 25.9 per cent of the total defendants found guilty; this is the highest proportion in the last eleven years and continues the trend of steady rises seen since the 12 months ending March 2005 when the percentage was 20.4 per cent. Summary non-motoring offences accounted for 36.3 per cent, and summary motoring offences for 37.8 per cent of convictions respectively.

Figure 4.1: Offenders found guilty by offence type, 12 months ending March 2001 to 12 months ending March 2011




Convictions by offence group

Eight of the ten indictable offence groups show increases compared to the 12 months ending March 2010. These include the following:

• Sexual offences increased by 12.3 per cent from 5,300 to a series peak of 5,900 in the 12 months ending March 2011. The conviction ratio for sexual offences increased by 3.1 percentage points over the same period.

- Theft and handling stolen goods increased by 9.1 per cent from 112,300 to 122,500, with the conviction ratio increasing by fewer than one percentage point.
- Burglary convictions increased by 8.1 per cent from 22,700 to 24,500, and the conviction ratio increased by 1.6 percentage points.

A total of one million males were found guilty in the 12 months to March 2011, accounting for 76.7 per cent of all persons. This compares with 304,400 females found guilty, 23.3 per cent of all persons ¹⁶. A total of 71,500 juveniles (persons aged 10 to 17) were found guilty in the 12 months ending March 2011 (5.3 per cent of persons found guilty).

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 351,600 persons found guilty of an indictable offence, of which 90.3 per cent were of a known ethnicity. This is a 3.6 percentage point increase on the previous 12 month period and a 53.4 percentage

point increase since the 12 months ending March 2008; the year the LIBRA case management system was rolled out.

Around three-quarters of the total persons found guilty at all courts were white. Of these 38.5 per cent were convicted of theft and handling of stolen goods.


Conviction ratio

The conviction ratio is defined as the proportion of defendants proceeded against who were found guilty. In the 12 months ending March 2011, the conviction ratio for all offences was 82.9 per cent, consistent with the previous 12 month period. In comparison with the 12 months ending March 2001, the overall conviction ratio has risen by 8.5 percentage points.

Comparing the 12 months ending March 2011 with the 12 months ending March 2010, there was:

- an increase of 1.5 percentage points in the conviction ratio for indictable offences (80.6 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2011).
- a decrease of 1.3 percentage points in the conviction ratio for summary nonmotoring offences (81.2 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2011).
- an increase of fewer than one per cent in the conviction ratio for summary motoring offences (86.3 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2011).

Eight out of the ten indictable offence group conviction ratios in the 12 months ending March 2011 have increased compared to the 12 months ending March 2010. All of

the indictable offence groups conviction ratios in 2011 have increased in comparison with 2001. The largest increase was for '*violence against the person*', which has increased from 45.4 per cent to 67.9 per cent across the 10 year period.

Sentencing [Tables Q5.1 – Q5.9]

When someone is convicted of a crime, they will be given a sentence by a court which reflects the seriousness of the offence or offences committed by the offender. Sentences are generally time spent in prison, a community sentence, a fine or discharge.

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 1,357,400¹⁷ offenders sentenced following a criminal conviction, a decrease of 2.9 per cent from the 12 months ending March 2010. This comprised

- a decrease of 5.8 per cent in offenders sentenced for summary offences (to 1,007,600).
- an increase of 6.3 per cent for offenders sentenced for indictable offences (to 349,700).
- an increase of 7.8 per cent in offenders sentenced at the Crown Court (to 103,300).
- a decrease of 3.7 per cent in offenders sentenced at magistrates' courts (to 1,254,000).

Sentence outcomes for all offences

Custodial sentences

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 102,000 persons sentenced to immediate custody at all courts, an increase of 2.2 per cent compared to the same period a year earlier but a fall of 2.3 per cent since the 12 months ending March 2001. The custody rate 18 in the period ending March 2011 of 7.6 per cent is the highest since the 12 months ending March 2003 when it was 7.8 per cent. The custody rate was 3.9 per cent at magistrates' courts and 52.1 per cent at the Crown Court.

Of the 102,000 persons sentenced to immediate custody in the 12 months ending March 2011:

- There were 48,200 custodial sentences handed down at magistrates' courts and 53,700 at the Crown Court; this was the third consecutive 12 month period where more custodial sentences were given at the Crown Court than at magistrates' courts.
- The average custodial sentence length (ASCL¹⁹) was 13.9 months. This was an increase of 0.1 months from the previous 12 month period and an increase of 2.3 months compared to the 12 months ending March 2001.

- There were 1,342 indeterminate sentences handed down in this period. Of these:
 - There were 958 Indeterminate sentences for Public Protection (IPP's)
 down from 999 in the 12 month period ending March 2010;
 - The number of life sentences fell from 414 in the 12 months ending March 2010, to 384 in the current 12 month period; this is the lowest figure in the last decade. Of the 384 life sentences in the current 12 month period, 334 were given for murder; this is down from 367 in the 12 months ending March 2010 and the lowest since the 12 months ending March 2004.
- The custody rates varies by the seriousness of the offence; the custody rate
 for indictable (including triable-either-way offences) was 24.0 per cent down
 0.5 per cent on the previous 12 month period while for summary offences
 the custody rate was 1.8 per cent this has changed little over the past
 decade.
- The average custody sentence length also varies depending on the seriousness of the offence; for indictable offences it was 16.4 months, for summary motoring offences it was 3.1 months and for summary non-motoring offences it was 2.6 months.
- Of the determinate custodial sentences handed down in the 12 months ending March 2011 there was a increase of 1.9 per cent in the number of sentences of 12 months or less over the previous period from 69,800 to 71,100. There were also increases in the number of sentences over 12 months and including 4 years rising from 23,300 to 24,000 and a rise of 4.0 per cent in the number of sentences over 4 years (excluding indeterminate sentences).

Suspended Sentence Orders

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 48,600 Suspended Sentence Orders imposed, an increase of 6.0 per cent from the previous 12 month period. Of these sentences:

- 26,400 persons were given a suspended sentence at the magistrates' courts, an increase of 3.7 per cent on the previous 12 month period. Despite more than half (54 per cent) of suspended sentences being given at magistrates' courts they accounted for only 2.1 per cent of sentences handed down at magistrates' courts in the current 12 month period.
- 22,200 suspended sentences were given at the Crown Court, an increase of 8.8 per cent on the 12 months ending March 2010. Of those sentenced at the Crown Court, 21.5 per cent were given a suspended sentence; this was little changed from the previous 12 month period.

Community sentences

There were 188,200 community sentences handed down in the 12 months ending March 2011. The community sentence rate for all ages was 13.9 per cent, this is up

slightly from 13.7 per cent in the previous 12 month period and up from 11.2 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2001.

- There were 141,300 community sentences given to adults in the 12 months ending March 2011, this was 11.1 per cent of all adults sentenced.
- There were 47,000 community sentences given to juveniles in the current period, this was down by 11.0 per cent on the previous period. Community sentences were given to 65.2 per cent of juveniles sentenced, this is down from 67.2 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2010 but up from 41.7 per cent since the 12 months ending March 2001. The majority of juveniles given a community sentence are given either a referral order (52.6 per cent of all juvenile community sentences) or a Youth Rehabilitation Order (YRO) (38.4 per cent of juvenile community sentences).
- Of the community sentences handed down 169,000 were given at a
 magistrates' court, a fall of 3.0 per cent on the previous period while there
 were 19,300 handed down at the Crown Court, a rise of 16.3 per cent on the
 previous period. Of all sentences given at magistrates' courts 13.5 per cent
 were community sentences. At Crown Court 18.6 per cent of all persons
 sentenced were given a community sentence.

Fines

Fines continue to be the most common sentence due to the large volumes issued at magistrates' courts for summary offences. In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 887,400 fines handed down (99.7 per cent of these being issued at magistrates' courts). Of the offenders receiving fines in this period:

- The majority (93.1 per cent) were issued for summary offences.
- There were 60,800 fines issued for indictable offences. The fine rate for indictable offences at all courts was 17.4 per cent which is a decrease from 24.9 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2001.
- The mean fine amount was £219 for all offences and the median fine amount was £175; these were similar to the averages in the 12 months ending March 2010 when the mean was £220 and the median £175 but have risen since the 12 months ending March 2001 (when the mean fine amount was £153 and the median fine amount was £100).

Other sentences

Other sentences comprise absolute and conditional discharges and 'otherwise dealt with'. The latter category deals with a miscellaneous group containing: mental health disposals; ancillary orders (e.g. compensation or confiscation orders); and other procedural disposals. There were 131,000 other sentences handed down in this period. These comprised:

- 90,200 conditional discharges; an increase of 5.6 per cent from a year earlier but a fall of 11.9 per cent since the 12 months ending March 2001.
- 8,600 absolute discharges; this was a fall of 4.5 per cent from the previous period and a fall of 45.4 per cent from the 12 months ending March 2001.

 32,300 offenders 'otherwise dealt with', an increase of 11.9 per cent from the 12 months ending March 2010.

Sentence outcomes by age band

Adults:

There were 1.28 million adults sentenced in the 12 months ending March 2011; this was a 2.6 per cent fall from the number sentenced in the 12 months to March 2010 and a 2.6 per cent fall from the 12 months to March 2001. Of those adults sentenced:


- 68.4 per cent of offenders were given a fine, down from 70.4 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2010 and from 74.3 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2001.
- There were 97,800 immediate custodial sentences handed down, this was 7.7 per cent of all adults sentenced. The custody rate increased by 0.4 percentage points on the previous period but has changed little in the past decade ranging from a low of 6.8 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2007 to a high of 8.1 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2002.


Juveniles:

There were 72,000 juveniles sentenced in the 12 months ending March 2011, a decrease of 8.3 per cent on the previous 12 month period and down by 22.0 per cent on the 12 months ending March 2001. Of those sentenced:

- There were 4,200 custodial sentences handed down, 5.8 per cent of all juveniles sentenced. The percentage of juveniles sentenced to immediate custody has fallen from 8.1 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2001.
- There were 6,100 fines handed down, a fall of 21.0 per cent on the 12 months ending March 2010 and by 71.8 per cent since the 12 months ending March 2001. Over the same period the fine rate fell from 23.3 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2001, to 8.4 per cent in the current period.

Offenders sentenced by ethnicity

Data on the ethnicity of offenders is currently only shown for offenders who have been convicted of an indictable offence due to data quality. In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 348,900 persons sentenced for indictable offences of which 315,800 (90.5 per cent) had their ethnicity recorded.

- The immediate custody rate for indictable offences for all ethnicities was 24.0 per cent. This varied between ethnic groups with: white offenders having a custody rate of 23.2 per cent; black offenders having a custody rate of 26.3 per cent; and asian offenders having a custody rate of 28.9 per cent. These differences are likely to be a reflection of the different offences committed and different offender characteristics between ethnic groups. For more information see the publication *Race and the Criminal Justice System*²⁰.
- The community sentence rate also varied by ethnicity. The community sentence rate for all ethnic groups sentenced for indictable offences was 31.0 per cent. This compares to 31.9 per cent for white offenders; 29.9 per cent for black offenders; 27.1 per cent for Asian offenders; and 20.6 per cent for offenders of unknown ethnicity.

Persons sentenced for indictable offences

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 348,900 persons sentenced for indictable offences, an increase of six per cent from 328,100 in the 12 months ending March 2010. Of these persons:

- Over half were sentenced for either theft and handling stolen goods (35.0 per cent) or drug offences (17.7 per cent).
- Theft and handling stolen goods and drug offences accounted for over two thirds (69.2 per cent) of the increase in indictable offences since the 12 months ending March 2010. The largest increase in number sentenced was for theft and handling stolen goods which rose by 10,400 (9.3 per cent) on the previous 12 month period.
- The largest proportionate increase was for those sentenced for *sexual* offences with a rise of 12.3 per cent to 5,900. The largest proportionate decrease was for indictable *motoring* offences falling by 6.7 per cent to 3.350.
- For theft and handling stolen goods the most common disposal is a community sentence. This disposal was given to 35.2 per cent of persons sentenced in this offence group in the 12 months ending March 2011. Since the 12 months ending March 2001 the main change in sentencing for theft and handling stolen goods offences has been the falls in the fine rate (down by 8.0 percentage points) and the immediate custody rate (down by 2.0 percentage points).
- For *drug offences* the most used disposal is the fine given to 38.5 per cent of offenders sentenced in the 12 months ending March 2011. This was down from 45.8 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2001.

Figure 5.2: Percentage change in persons sentenced by indictable offence group, 12 months ending March 2010 to 12 months ending March 2011



Offences [Tables Q6.1 - Q6.4]

This chapter differs from the others in the publication by counting on an all offence basis, as opposed to a principal offence basis. Courts and the police typically deal with defendants charged with more than one offence; for example, in the 12 months ending March 2011 each offender committed on average 1.4 offences.

In the 12 months ending March 2011 the ratio of convictions per offender was 1.4, the same as the 12 months ending March 2010. This compares to 1.5 in the 12 months ending March 2008 and the 12 months ending March 2009 and a ratio of between 1.6 to 1.7 for the 12 months ending March 2001 to the 12 months ending March 2007.

In comparison with the 12 months ending March 2001, convictions per offender in the 12 months ending March 2011:

- fell from 1.9 to 1.7 for indictable offences.
- rose from 1.1 to 1.2 for summary non-motoring offences.
- fell from 1.9 to 1.4 for summary motoring offences.

Convictions (offences basis)

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 1.90 million convictions on an all offences basis, a fall of 4.5 per cent from the previous 12 months. From a peak of 2.61 million in 2004 there have been average year-on-year decreases of around four per cent, with an overall fall of 27.2 per cent when compared with the latest period.

Compared to the 12 months ending March 2010 there was:

- an increase of 3.6 per cent in convictions for indictable offences (592,800 in 12 months ending March 2011).
- a decrease of 3.2 per cent in convictions for summary non-motoring offences (608,400 in 12 months ending March 2011).
- a decrease of 11.4 per cent in convictions for summary motoring offences (698,600 in 12 months ending March 2011).

Indictable offences accounted for 31.2 per cent of convictions in 12 months ending March 2011, a rise of 2.4 percentage points compared with the 12 months ending March 2010. This was the highest proportion of convictions for indictable offences since the 12 months ending March 2001 (26.4 per cent).

Summary non-motoring offences accounted for 32.0 per cent of all convictions, up slightly on the previous period (0.4 percentage points), but a rise of 9.4 percentage points compared with 2001. Summary motoring offences accounted for 36.8 per cent of all offences, a fall of 2.9 percentage points compared with 12 months ending March 2010, and a fall of 14.2 per cent compared with 2001.

Cautions (offences basis)

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 260,000 cautions issued for offences, a decrease of 13.8 per cent from the 12 months ending March 2010. This decrease continues the downward trend observed from the year ending March 2007 where cautions peaked at 392,500. Prior to this, there had been year on year rises from the 12 months ending March 2004 to the 12 months ending March 2007.

Compared to the 12 months ending March 2010 there was:

- a decrease of 12.7 per cent in cautions issued for indictable offences (to 142,200 in 12 months ending March 2011).
- a decrease of 15.0 per cent in cautions issued for summary non-motoring offences (to 117,700 in 12 months ending March 2011).

Indictable offences accounted for 54.7 per cent of caution offences in 12 months ending March 2011, a rise of 0.7 percentage points on 12 months ending March 2010 but a fall of 8.6 percentage points compared with 12 months ending March 2001.

Summary non-motoring offences accounted for 45.3 per cent of caution offences in 12 months ending March 2011, a fall of 0.7 percentage points on 12 months ending March 2010, but a rise of 8.6 percentage points compared with 12 months ending March 2001.

Offences Brought to Justice (notifiable offences)

One measure of justice outcomes is Offences Brought to Justice (OBTJ). An offence is said to have been brought to justice when a 'notifiable offence' results in an offender being convicted, cautioned, issued with a penalty notice for disorder or a cannabis warning, or having an offence taken into consideration at court.

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 1.25 million OBTJs, a decrease of 4.3 per cent compared to the 12 months ending March 2010. Recorded crime totals for the same period also fell by 4.3 per cent.

Over time the number of OBTJs has increased from 995,600 in the 12 months ending March 2001 but decreased from the series high of 1.45 million in the 12 months ending March 2008.

In the 12 months ending March 2011:

- convictions accounted for 61.2 per cent of OBTJs (764,700), a rise of 3.7 percentage points on the 12 months ending March 2010.
- cautions accounted for 19.6 per cent of OBTJs (245,400), a fall of 2.2 percentage points on the 12 months ending March 2010.
- penalty notices for disorder accounted for 6.9 per cent of OBTJs (86,200), a fall of 1.3 percentage point on the 12 months ending March 2010.
- formal warnings for cannabis possession accounted for 6.3 per cent of OBTJs (79,000), a decrease of 0.2 percentage points from the 12 months ending March 2010.

 offences taken into consideration accounted for 5.9 per cent of OBTJs (74,200), a decrease of 0.1 percentage point son the 12 months ending March 2010.

In the 12 months ending March 2011 convictions accounted for 61.2 per cent of OBJTs, this was a decrease from 68.2 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2001. This fall is accounted for by the introduction of penalty notices for disorder and formal warnings for cannabis possession in the same period.

OBTJs by offence group

In the 12 months ending March 2011, the main offence groups which make up OBTJs were *violence against the person* (28.6 per cent), *theft and handling stolen goods* (25.2 per cent) and *drug offences* (18.8 per cent).

In comparison with the 12 months ending March 2001, the proportion of OBTJs accounted for by *violence against the person* has increased from 21.5 per cent to 28.6 per cent in the 12 months ending March 2011, and *drug offences* has increased from 11.5 per cent to 18.8 per cent.

Offending Histories [Tables Q7.1 - Q7.5]

Information presented in this section differs from previous sections, in that all information is taken from the Police National Computer (PNC). The main difference is that the PNC does not include a range of less serious summary offences (such as TV licence evasion and a range of motoring offences) and so the figures do not match those given in previous chapters.

This section provides an overview of the changing structure of the known offending population with information on the breakdown of offences committed by new offenders and repeat offenders, the trends in new entrants to the criminal justice system, and breakdowns of the criminal histories of cautioned and sentenced offenders

First offences and further offences

An offence is defined as a first offence if it results in the offender receiving their first reprimand, warning, caution or conviction – i.e. they have no previous criminal history recorded on the PNC. Offences resulting in further reprimands, warnings, cautions or convictions are known as further offences since the offender already has a recorded criminal history.

Offenders committed 874,299²¹ offences that resulted in a reprimand, warning, caution or conviction in the 12 months ending March 2011, 25.8 per cent were first offences, and 74.2 per cent were further offences. In comparison:

- In the 12 months ending March 2010 there were 910,835 offences, with 27.8 per cent first offences and 72.2 per cent further offences.
- The number of offences steadily increased from 802,869 in the 12 months ending March 2001 and reached a peak of 993,116 in the 12 months ending March 2008. This increase was mainly due to an increase in the use of cautions, for both first and further offences.
- First offences comprised on average 33 per cent of offences between 12 months ending March 2001 and March 2008 but the proportion has since fallen as the use of cautions, which are often the preferred sanction for first offenders, has fallen relative to convictions for first offences.

Juveniles committed 123,437 offences that resulted in a reprimand, warning or conviction in the 12 months ending March 2011, 36.9 per cent were first offences, and 63.1 per cent were further offences.

• In the 12 months ending March 2001 182,275 offences were committed, with 49.5 per cent being first offences.

• The number of offences peaked in the 12 months ending March 2007 at 227,503, and has since fallen sharply due to falls in the number of reprimands and final warnings issued by the police.

Adults committed 750,862 offences resulting in a caution or conviction in the 12 months ending March 2011, 24.0 per cent were first offences and 76.0 per cent were further offences.

- Unlike offences committed by juveniles, those committed by adults that resulted in a caution or conviction peaked in the 12 months ending March 2008 at 775,304 and since then have fallen by 3 per cent.
- First offences committed by adults peaked in the 12 months ending March 2007 and have declined since then. In comparison further offences are at their highest level over the past 11 years in the 12 months ending March 2011.

Figure 7.1: First offences and further offences in the 12 months ending March 2011




Figure 7.2: Number of juvenile first and further offences in England and Wales between the 12 months ending March 2001 and the 12 months ending March 2011





Figure 7.3: Number of adult first and further offences in England and Wales between the 12 months ending March 2001 and the 12 months ending March 2011



First time entrants to the criminal justice system in England and Wales

First time entrants to the criminal justice are classified as offenders, resident in England and Wales, who received their first reprimand, warning, caution or conviction, based on data recorded by the police on the PNC.

In the 12 months ending March 2011 there were 226,000 first time entrants (FTE) to the criminal justice system, this is a decrease of 11 per cent compared to the previous 12 months and 32 per cent down on the 2007 peak of 331,000. Compared to the 12 months ending March 2001 figure of 270,000 the 2011 figure shows a fall of 16 per cent.

Within the 2011 total there were 45,519 juveniles, a figure that has fallen by 27 per cent since 12 months ending March 2010 and 59 per cent since the 12 months ending March 2007.

When expressed as a rate per 100,000 people in the population juvenile first time entrants have fallen by 57 per cent since the peak in 2007 whilst for adults the fall was 21 per cent.

The changes comprise the following:

- A 31 per cent reduction in the number of reprimands and warnings for juvenile FTEs (aged 10 to 17) and a seven per cent reduction in the number of cautions for adults between 12 months ending March 2010 and 2011.
 Between the 2007 peak and 2011 the equivalent reductions were 62 per cent for juveniles and 24 per cent for adults.
- In the 12 months ending March 2011 convictions accounted for 41 per cent of first time entrants, the largest proportion over the last 10 years. Juvenile convictions accounted for three per cent of this figure and adults the remaining 38 per cent.
- The decline in the use of reprimands, warnings and cautions in dealing with FTEs is consistent with the reduction in the use of these disposals for all offenders and coincides with the increasing focus on more serious offending.
- At the offence group level, comparing the 12 months ending March 2010 and 2011 for offenders of all ages, first time entrants fell in all categories except for sexual offences and robbery which increased by eight per cent to 3,400 and 14 per cent to 1,700 respectively. Of those offence groups showing falls the theft and handling group was down 20 per cent to 36,800, summary offences excluding motoring were down 10 per cent to 84,500 and summary motoring offences were down 13 per cent to 31,300. These three offence groups accounted for 83 per cent of the reduction in first time entrants.

Criminal Histories

An offender is counted as having a criminal history if their PNC record shows that, at the time of receiving a reprimand, warning, caution or conviction, they had previously committed one or more offences that had resulted in one of these sanctions. The PNC data excludes a range of summary offences, and therefore the figures presented focus on the criminal histories of offenders cautioned or sentenced for indictable offences.

Criminal histories of offenders cautioned for offences recorded on the PNC

Just over half of offenders who were cautioned in the 12 months to March 2011 had no previous criminal history, although three per cent had 15 or more previous caution/conviction occasions:

- 53.2 per cent of offenders of all ages who received a reprimand, warning or caution in the 12 months ending March 2011 had no previous offences;
- 3.3 per cent of offenders had received a reprimand, warning, caution or conviction on 15 or more previous occasions. The majority of these offenders received a reprimand, warning or caution for drug offences and theft and handling stolen goods offences;
- The equivalent figures for the 12 months ending March 2001 show that the criminal history profile of cautioned offenders is changing over time: 68.3 per cent had no previous offences while 1.2 per cent had 15 or more previous occasions.

71.0 per cent of juvenile offenders who received a reprimand or warning in the 12 months to March 2011 had no previous offences;

- The equivalent figure for the 12 months ending in March 2001 was 77.5 per cent.
- Most of those with previous offences had received a reprimand or warning only
- 2.2 per cent of juveniles given a reprimand or warning in the 12 months to March 2011 had a previous conviction. The majority of these offenders received a reprimand or warning for drug offences and theft and handling stolen goods offences

47.5 per cent of adult offenders cautioned in the 12 months to March 2011 had no previous offences;

- This compares with 61.0 per cent in the 12 months ending in March 2001;
- 4.3 per cent of adults cautioned in the 12 months to March 2011 had been cautioned or convicted on 15 or more previous occasions. The majority of these offenders were cautioned for drug offences and theft and handling stolen goods offences;
- Adult females given a caution are more likely to be first time offenders than adult males; 61.4 per cent of females cautioned in the 12 months to March 2011 had no previous record of committing an offence, compared with 42.9 per cent of male offenders.

Criminal histories of offenders sentenced for indictable offences as recorded on the PNC

The criminal history profile of sentenced offenders is changing over time. More offenders sentenced for indictable offences in the 12 months ending in March 2011 had previous offences, and a higher proportion of offenders had 15 or more previous convictions or cautions:

- the proportion of all offenders sentenced for indictable offences who had 15 or more previous convictions or cautions has increased steadily from 17.1 per cent in the 12 months ending in March 2001 to 29.5 per cent in the 12 months to March 2011;
- Over the same period the proportion of sentences given to offenders with no previous convictions or cautions fell from 12.3 per cent to 10.4 per cent.

Criminal history by sentence type

The criminal history of offenders receiving different sentences varies by category of sentence, with custodial sentences associated with higher levels of previous offences. In the 12 months to March 2011:

- 42.3 per cent of adult offenders receiving immediate custodial sentences had
 15 or more previous convictions/cautions.
- In comparison 21.2 per cent of adult offenders receiving a community sentence had 15 or more previous convictions/cautions

Criminal history by offence type

The criminal history of offenders also varies with the type of offence for which they have been sentenced. In the 12 months to March 2011:
