#### Introduction

#### How to read the Estimates

- 1. Supply Estimates are the means used by the Government to seek fresh Parliamentary authority for the greater part of its expenditure each year. The Estimates are presented to Parliament, usually in March, and Parliament votes on the provision sought in July or August.
- 2. One or more Estimates are presented, by the Treasury, for each Government department. Each Estimate covers finance for specified purposes, for which the department concerned will be accountable to Parliament. As the basis of accountability, Estimates are necessarily fairly complex documents and some familiarity with them is needed in order to find and understand all the information that they contain.
- 3. Users may therefore wish to consult first the booklet **Supply Estimates**, 1993–94 **Summary and Guide (Cm 2230)**, also published in March. This document summarises the expenditure for which authority is sought and places it in the context of the Government's more general public expenditure plans. It also provides a guide to readers interested in the detailed information in individual Estimates, tells them where to find particular information and outlines Parliamentary Supply procedure.
- 4. An Index to the Supply Estimates, 1993–94 is also published. This document helps users interested in a particular area of expenditure or organisation to locate the correct Class and Vote.
- 5. Class III groups together all the Supply Estimates which are the responsibility of the Minstry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food (MAFF) and the Intervention Board Executive Agency (IB).

#### Reconciliation of Estimates with the control total

- 6. Expenditure in Class III is related to control total expenditure shown in the Departmental Report by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food and the Intervention Board Executive Agency, "The Government's Expenditure Plans 1993–94 to 1995–96" (Cm 2203). The Estimates thus describe in more detail expenditure in this Report and seek Parliamentary authority for it, in line with the plans set out in Cm 2203.
- 7. Cm 2203 not only describes the Government's plans for spending by MAFF and IB but also includes a description of the aims and objectives of this expenditure, and the outputs achieved. Users of the Estimates who are interested in Class III may find it helpful to look first at Cm 2203, to help them set the Estimates in context.
- 8. **Table 1** relates the Estimates for Class III to the corresponding plans in **Cm 2203**. A difference arises on the treatment of expenditure on the national price guarantees for wool and potatoes. **Cm 2203** provides for notional expenditure of some £6 million a year, whereas Estimates (Class III, Vote 3) provide for the expected level of government support, which is usually confined to the current potato crop and wool clip.

- Net contributions expected gross contributions and receipts to European Community Institutions are brought together in Cm 2217. In the Estimates however, most receipts from the EC are shown in departmental Estimates, either as appropriations in aid or on net subheads. Such receipts are therefore included in Table 1 and separately identified in individual Estimates. In addition, some receipts are surrendered to the Consolidated Fund. Table 11.4 of Cm 2217 gives a departmental breakdown of anticipated receipts from the EC.
- 10. It should be noted that expenditure in respect of market support on the beef special and suckler cow premium schemes, the milk outgoers scheme, the repayment of cereals co-responsibility levy (including to small scale producers), the annual premium on ewes, EC orchard grubbing scheme and the area payments on cereals, certain oilseeds and protein crops (with associated set-aside payments) and the EC share of expenditure on agri-environment and forestry schemes is undertaken by Agricultural Departments on behalf of IB. Payments to the various departments by IB appear as other expenditure not included in the control total in Class III Vote 1 (summarised in Table 1 of the Estimate) and as offsetting receipts in net subheads in the Agricultural Departments Votes ie MAFF (Class III, Vote 3 and Vote 4), the Scottish Office Agriculture and Fisheries Department (SOAFD) (Class XIV, Vote 1 and Vote 2) and the Welsh Office Agriculture Department (WOAD), (Class XV, Vote 1). However, to avoid double counting this expenditure appears only in the plans of the Agriculture Departments
- 11. Certain expenditure on agriculture, fisheries, and food in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland forms part of Cm 2214, Cm 2215 and Cm 2216. A summary of the Supply expenditure on agriculture, fisheries, food and forestry contained in Classes III, XIV and XV is given in Table 2 to this introduction. It excludes, however, expenditure by the Department of Agriculture for Northern Ireland which is borne on the Northern Ireland Consolidated Fund.

#### Running costs and manpower

12. The arrangements for controlling a department's running costs and manpower are explained in Chapter 4 of the Summary and Guide to the Estimates (Cm 2230) which also includes a table showing the running costs limit set for each department's gross control (and, where applicable, net control) areas, together with the related Civil Service manpower (permanent staff, whole-time equivalents). For gross control areas the running costs limit is derived from gross running costs provision, less VAT refunds on contracted out services; for those areas approved for net control the limit is derived by further deducting running costs related receipts. The running costs limits and related manpower figures for 1993–94 covered by Class III are:

# Class III, Vote 1 Intervention Board – Executive Agency: CAP market support

#### Introduction

- . Expenditure borne on this Vote is not subject to a cash limit.
- 2. The Vote makes provision for the implementation in the United Kingdom of the market regulation and agricultural support measures of the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) of the European Community. Most of these measures are mandatory under directly applicable Community legislation. Because most of the expenditure is reimbursed by the Community, the net provision sought is much less than the gross expenditure on the Vote and can be at a token level when expected Community receipts exceed expenditure.
- 3. The provision is based on the support levels expected to be prescribed by the Community, assumed levels of agricultural or 'green' conversion rates and expected developments in world prices and levels of UK production and trade. This includes the outcome of the agreement on CAP reform in May 1992 whereby support prices for the main agricultural products (eg intervention purchases) are reduced over a period of years and direct payments to farmers (eg arable scheme area payments) are increased. The initial effects of these changes are reflected in Sections A to D. The provision no longer includes an assumed level of monetary compensatory amounts (meas). These were abolished on 1 January 1993, in line with the introduction of the single market, as part of the reform of the EC agrimonetary system. Variations in the factors on which the Estimates are based frequently result in the presentation of Supplementary Estimates.
- 4. Expenditure on this Vote is highly unpredictable and sensitive to changes in, for example, trade volumes, world commodity prices, exchange rates and the day-to-day operations of the CAP instruments of market management. The net provision sought is £132.8 million. Forecast outturn for 1992–93 is £194.7 million, some £19.6 million less than provision taken following a spring Supplementary Estimate. The outturn in 1991–92 was nil with excess appropriations in aid of £59.7 million surrendered to the Consolidated Fund.
- 5. Administrative costs relevant to this Vote are in Class III, Vote 2.

#### Section A: Market support

#### Subhead A1: Intervention buying

- 6. Intervention buying is a method of supporting market prices for certain commodities by providing assured outlets at guaranteed prices. The Intervention Board Executive Agency (the Agency) is required to buy, at prices determined by the Community, produce of defined quality offered to it in accordance with detailed Community regulations. Sales are made at prices and on terms prescribed by the Community; sales receipts are shown as appropriations in aid. Contributions from the European Agricultural Guidance and Guarantee Fund (EAGGF) to the financing costs of holding intervention stocks are shown in Part III as extra receipts to the Consolidated Fund. Other contributions from the EAGGF to the intervention costs are included in Section B appropriations in aid.
- 7. The Estimate is on a cash basis and does not show the Agency's trading position. This is shown in the Intervention Buying Accounts which for the periods to 31 March 1992 are published as White Papers. These give the opening stocks, purchases, sales and closing stocks, with figures for trading losses recoverable from, or trading profits payable to, the EAGGF and for physical stock losses chargeable to the Consolidated Fund. The accounts also reflect the revaluation of stocks and give a breakdown of handling and storage costs and the EAGGF contribution to them. Accounts subsequent to the White Papers will be included in the Agency Accounts to be published in the Intervention Board Annual Report.
- 8. The estimated expenditure in this subhead is £221.0 million, compared with forecast outturn for 1992–93 of £322.6 million. The outturn for 1991–92 was £346.4 million.

#### Subhead A2: Other internal market measures

9. Subhead A2 covers the Agency payments on regulatory and support measures other than intervention buying (A1), external trade measures (A3) and payments to local authorities (C1). Levy receipts are shown as appropriations in aid. Most measures in Subhead A2 are wholly funded by the EAGGF; exceptions which are partly funded are aid to raspberry producers and any final payments of beef variable premiums and on certain sugar refining. Contributions from the EAGGF are included in Section B – appropriations in aid. Estimated expenditure is £317.4 million compared with the forecast outturn for 1992–93 of £377.1 million. The outturn for 1991–92 was £629.7 million.

#### Subhead A3: External trade measures

- 10. Subhead A3 provides for measures which are wholly funded by the EAGGF. Contributions from the EAGGF are included in Section B – appropriations in aid. The Agency is responsible for paying Community refunds in respect of trade with non-member countries and collecting Community levies on exports. The corresponding levies on imports are collected by HM Customs and Excise. For some commodities trade with other member states and non-member countries was, until 1 January 1993, subject to meas, which reflected the difference between the agricultural conversion or 'green' rate for sterling and its market rate based on a 'basket' of Community currencies. Under the old agrimonetary system, when the UK mca was positive, it was applied as a subsidy on exports, paid by the Agency, and as a levy collected by HM Customs and Excise on imports and passed on to the Agency. Conversely, when UK meas were negative they were applied as a levy collected by the Agency on exports and a refund on imports. However, the mca element was removed on 1 January 1993 when the new EC agrimonetary system came into effect. As a result there are no longer any mass payable on trade between member states, and the monetary gap, which meas were designed to bridge, was eliminated by setting green rates at or near prevailing market rates on 1 January. The new arrangements provide for the removal of any gaps created by currency fluctuations thereafter by adjusting the green rate to bring it back towards the level of the market rate. Trade with non-member countries is now subject only to import levies and export refunds. Final receipts of levies on trade with other member states are shown as appropriations in aid.
- 11. Expenditure on external trade measures is estimated at £441.3 million compared with a forecast outturn for 1992–93 of £502.5 million. The outturn for 1991–92 was £465.0 million.

#### Subhead A4: Other payments

12. Subhead A4 provides for certain repayments of sums surrendered to the Consolidated Fund in earlier years. Provision of less than £0.1 million is taken. Forecast outturn in 1992–93 and outturn for 1991–92 are both less than £0.1 million.

#### Subhead AZ

13. Subhead AZ shows receipts from sales of products out of intervention (A1), from levies on internal market schemes (A2) and external trade measures (A3); it also includes certain recoveries and forfeited securities. Receipts are estimated at £116.1 million, compared with forecast outturn of £224.2 million for 1992–93 and an outturn for 1991–92 of £231.6 million (with a further £59.2 million surrendered as an extra receipt to the Consolidated Fund).

#### Section B: Net receipts from the European Community institutions

#### Subheads B and BZ

- 14. Subhead B1 provides for payments to the EAGGF in connection with intervention buying such as profits on sales, the recovery of certain costs in respect of intervention stocks which fail quality tests after being taken into store, and any forfeited securities. Token provision is made for payments to the EAGGF on the closure of prior year accounts and arising from unrecovered losses. Subhead BZ covers the receipts from the EAGGF two months in arrears in respect of net expenditure in Sections A, C and D and on the closure of prior year accounts.
- 15. Total net receipts from the EAGGF are estimated at £2,290.9 million compared with a forecast outturn for 1992–93 of £1,479.1 million and outturn of £1,684.4 million in 1991–92.

#### Section C: EC grants for school milk

#### Subhead C1:

16. Subhead C1 covers the payments to local authorities in Great Britain of the EC school milk subsidy. Payments in respect of Northern Ireland are in Section D while payments in Great Britain other than to local authorities are in Subhead A2(5). Provision is for £31.0 million, compared with forecast outturn for 1992–93 of £37.7 million and outturn for 1991–92 of £32.5 million.

#### Section D: Payments to other government departments

#### Subheads D1 and DZ:

- 17. Subhead D1 covers market support schemes which are administered by other government departments. The schemes are mainly those where payments are to farmers and where on-farm verification is required. The subhead includes certain agri-environmental and forestry measures where EC reimbursement is now to be from the Guarantee Section of EAGGF rather than from the Guidance Section; the expenditure represents the EAGGF funding with the Exchequer share being borne on the cash limited votes of the departments concerned. Subhead DZ provides for certain recovered payments with interest where applicable. Net provision of £1,529.1 million is sought compared with forecast outturn in 1992–93 of £658.3 million and outturn of £442.4 million in 1991–92 (with a further £0.5 million surrendered as an extra receipt to the Consolidated Fund). Most of the expenditure will be reimbursed from the EAGGF but the balance falling to the Exchequer in this Vote is £22.6 million in 1991–92, £22.2 million in 1992–93 and £5.6 million in 1993–94.

#### Introduction

- 1. This Vote is treated as a cash limit.
- 2. The Vote covers the administrative costs of the Intervention Board Executive Agency (the Agency) in implementing the market regulation and agricultural support measures of the EC Common Agricultural Policy in the United Kingdom. Running costs (including costs of the Agency's computer development plan) account for about 61 per cent of the provision. The balance consists of payments to cover the administration costs of other bodies providing services on behalf of the Agency, together with provision for capital to purchase computer and telecommunications equipment in support of the Agency's computer development plan.
- 3. The provision sought in 1993–94 is some 9 per cent above the provision for 1992–93. This increase is largely due to the inclusion from 1993–94 of superannuation within the vote in line with central policy, and increased agents' costs reflecting CAP reform changes.
- 4. Symbols are explained in the introduction to this booklet.

#### Class III, Vote 3 Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food: agricultural support and animal health

#### Introduction

- 1. Expenditure borne on this vote is not subject to a cash limit.
- 2. It accounts for about 9 per cent of the Ministry's budget and has two distinct parts: direct support for the agricultural industry and measures to eliminate and control animal diseases. Classes XIV and XV provide for corresponding expenditure in Scotland and Wales. A summary of expenditure by the agricultural departments excluding the Department of Agriculture for Northern Ireland is given at Table 2 of this booklet at page 4. Administrative costs relevant to this Vote are included in Class III, Votes 4 and 5.
- 3. Corresponding expenditure by the Department of Agriculture for Northern Ireland is published under separate Estimates for the Government of Northern Ireland submitted to Parliament directly by the Secretary of State.
- 4. Total net provision sought is £67.9 million compared with a forecast outturn in 1992–93 of £111.2 million. Outturn in 1991–92 was £118.4 million.

#### Agricultural support

5. Section A of the vote covers expenditure on market support measures under the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP), including national price guarantee measures and new measures arising out of the CAP reform package. The net provision of £0.4 million includes expenditure on loan guarantees. No substantive provision is included at this stage for price guarantees for the 1993 wool clip and potato crop. The Ministry currently shares responsibility with the Potato Marketing Board (PMB) for the costs of potato market support in Great Britain and with the Wool Marketing Board for the costs of wool market support in times of over supply. In the event of the PMB having insufficient funds to meet its share of market support the Government has undertaken to make good the shortfall by way of a loan. Provision for Intervention Board expenditure on other market support measures under the CAP and on payments to farmers arising out of the CAP reform package is contained separately on Class III, Vote 1.

The Agriculture Act 1967 empowers the Minister to support loan guarantees made by the Agricultural Credit Corporation (ACC) prior to 31 March 1989. The potential maximum liability decreased from £6.4 million to £6.1 million at 31 March 1992.

6. Section B covers support for agriculture in special areas. The net provision sought is £21.8 million compared with a forecast outturn in 1992–93 of £24.2 million.

#### Animal health

- 7. The net provision of some £45.7 million in Section C is £15.0 million lower than that for 1992–93 because of a forecast reduction in expenditure on Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy compensation payments.

# Class III, Vote 4 Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food: agricultural, food and fishing services

#### Introduction

- 1. This Vote is treated as a cash limit.
- 2. This Vote encompasses a wide range of external services which fall under five main headings: agriculture and food services; support for the fishing industry; flood defence; coast protection and arterial drainage; emergency and strategic food services (civil defence); and grants and loans for capital and other improvements and alternative land uses.
- 3. Classes XIV and XV provide for corresponding expenditure in Scotland and Wales. Corresponding expenditure for the Department of Agriculture for Northern Ireland is submitted to Parliament directly by the Secretary of State.
- 4. The total net provision is for £386 million compared with provision of £368 million and a forecast outturn of £336 million in 1992–93. Outturn in 1991–92 was £291 million.

#### Agricultural and food services

- 5. Sections A to D cover agricultural and food services.
- 6. Sections A to C embrace expenditure on commissioned research, agricultural education and training, botanical services including plant breeders' rights and seed testing and certification, expenditure on producer organisations, co-operation grants and forage groups and assistance for production, marketing and processing, primarily aimed at fostering efficient and competitive agriculture and food industries. They include grant-in-aid for the Agricultural Training Board, Food From Britain, and the Trustees of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew. The provision of over £120 million for expenditure on commissioned research and development (subhcads A1 to A3) accounts for about 30 per cent of the expenditure on the Vote. The main external recipient is the Agricultural and Food Research Council which also receives a grant-in-aid from the Office of Science and Technology (see Class XVIII, Vote 2). £36 million of the research and development expenditure is in respect of work carried out by the Next Steps Agencies. Payments for this work appear as receipts in Class III, Vote 5 at subheads CZ, EZ and F1. There is one net subhead, C12, which enables the Ministry to make payments on behalf of the EC Commission for marketing and processing projects.
- 7. Section D covers payments for services provided by outside organisations and Next Steps Agencies. Other services provided for in Section D include international subscriptions, residual expenditure on land management and payments to miscellaneous committees, tribunals etc. Among the tribunals is a new one which will hear appeals by fishermen about the number of days they are being allowed at sea under new conservation measures. This tribunal is expected to sit for just one year.
- 8. The net provision under Sections A to D is for £227 million some £18 million above that for 1992–93. Payments for services provided by a new agency, the Pesticides Safety Directorate, are included at subhead D6 for the first time.

#### Support for the fishing industry

- 9. Sections E, F and J provide assistance to the industry directly through grants and loans and indirectly through commissioned research. They also cover measures to police UK waters to prevent illegal fishing.
- 10. The net provision is for £23.2 million compared with £17.7 million in 1992–93. The increase arises because of the introduction of a vessel decommissioning scheme covering the United Kingdom. About half the cost of the scheme will be reimbursed by the European Community, in the year following the expenditure.
- 11. Loans made by the Sea Fish Industry Authority with government funds before 14 May 1982 are subject to a non-statutory guarantee which was presented to Parliament on 27 April 1982. This allows the Authority, with the prior consent of Fisheries Ministers and the Treasury, to write off the outstanding part of any loan as a bad debt. The corresponding loan owed by the Authority to the Ministry would also be written off. The commitment at 31 March 1992 was for £0.16 million (at 31 March 1991 it was £0.27 million).

#### Flood defence, coast protection and arterial drainage

12. The net provision in Sections G and K is £65 million, some £1 million higher than that for 1992–93, due to an increase in provision for grants in respect of National Rivers Authority drainage and protection schemes.

#### Civil defence

13. Section H covers the annual storage, maintenance and management costs of the emergency food stockpile and emergency food services. The gross provision is for £4 million with forecast receipts from the sales of stock and equipment of £18 million giving net receipts of £14 million. This reflects the continued reduction of the size of the food stockpile. Net receipts anticipated in 1992–93 were £14 million. The outturn in 1991–92 was for net receipts of £3 million.

#### Grants and loans for capital and other improvements and alternative land uses

- 14. Provision in Section I covers expenditure on grants and loans to farmers for capital and other improvements, on measures to curb overproduction and to encourage environmentally beneficial farming practices. This section provides for the accompanying measures to CAP reform which are being considered. At present these measures are provisional. Total net provision is for £84 million compared with £91 million in 1992–93. The decrease in provision is due to reduced expenditure on set-aside.
- 15. Symbols are explained in the introduction to this booklet.

- 2. Section A provides for expenditure on administrative support for programme expenditure on Class III Votes 3 and 4 as well as the fulfilment of the Ministry's overall aims set out in the Government's Expenditure Plans. Administrative support costs arising from the reform of the Common Agricultural Policy are also included in this Section.
- 3. Sections B and E provide for the Veterinary Medicines Directorate and the Central Veterinary Laboratory which have operated as executive agencies since 1 April 1991, the latter on a system of net running cost control. Section C provides for the Central Science Laboratory which became an executive agency on 1 April 1992. Section D provides for the Pesticides Safety Directorate which will become an executive agency from 1 April 1993. Section F provides for the Agricultural Development and Advisory Service (ADAS), which became an executive agency on 1 April 1992 and operates on a system of net running cost control.
- 4. The net provision for 1993–94 is £313 million compared with a provision of £266 million and a forecast outturn of £266 million for 1992–93. Outturn in 1991–92 was £262 million.
- 5. Decentralised budgetary control now covers 75 per cent of Vote expenditure. Receipts from the payment for in-house research, development and policy advice shown on Vote 4 are included in the appropriations-in-aid of the executive agencies at Sections B, C, D, E and F.
- 6. Symbols are explained in the introduction to this booklet.

The figures include design and project management expenditure. "Year of completion" refers to the financial year in which the last significant payment including any payment of claims by contractors is expected to be made.

Projects cost estimates have been revalued to 1993-94 prices using the GDP deflator.
