REQUEST FOR INFORMATION: BADGER POPULATION NUMBERS

Thank you for your request for information about badger population estimates which we received on 24 October. We have handled your request under the Environmental Information Regulations 2004 (EIRs).

The EIRs apply to requests for environmental information, which is a broad category of information defined in regulation 2 of the EIRs. Public authorities are required to handle requests for environmental information under the EIRs. They give similar access rights to the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

Your questions and the answers are below:

Question 1. Could you please tell me who assessed the number of badgers in the cull zones prior to the postponed cull in 2012?

Staff from Government Agencies conducted the field work to establish badger numbers.

Question 2. Could you please tell me how long this initial assessment took to assess the number of badger i.e. 1 month or 2 months and the amount of staff involved?

The fieldwork and data analysis took approximately 3 months and involved up to 50 people. Not all members of staff were operating at the same time and some of them worked part time.

Question 3. I understand the cull was postponed in 2012 because the numbers were initially assessed as higher than expected (which were -please input your figures) this was revised up and hence the cull was postponed because you had new figures

Question 4. The cull was then assessed using the new figures (larger number) this decided the amount to be culled to achieve a 70% kill rate in each zone. I understand that there were 2 figures a lower and upper figure. What were these upper and lower figures for?

Question 5. Could you please tell me how you have reassessed the number so quickly, if your staff have been involved in audits, monitoring etc. How long does it take to do the evaluation of numbers considering you are actually killing them as you go?

Different organisations were responsible for different parts of the pilot culls and their evaluation. Cull companies undertook shooting activities under licence. Defra and its agencies were not undertaking shooting. These staff were responsible for monitoring, data collection and analysis. The estimation of the badger population through hair trapping was carried out just before culling started, and not during the culls themselves. Hair traps were set out in the field for a 3 week period and samples of hair collected daily. The analysis of the badger DNA from the hair, and the statistical estimates of the overall population took approximately 5 weeks.

In keeping with the spirit and effect of the EIRs, and in keeping with the government's Transparency Agenda, all information is assumed to be releasable to the public unless exempt. Therefore, the information released to you will now be published on www.gov.uk together with any related information that will provide a key to its wider context. Please note that this will not include your personal data.
