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APPLICATIONS AND OFFERS FOR ENTRY TO SECONDARY SCHOOLS IN ENGLAND IN ACADEMIC YEAR 2013/2014

INTRODUCTION

Each year local authorities submit data to the Department on how many families received an offer of a place at one of their preferred secondary schools. On 1 March, the families of 499,968 children were informed of their offer of a secondary school place to start in September 2013. This statistical release provides information on applications and offers made in England for the 2013/14 academic year.

Please see the User Guide section of this release for relevant information on the collection and interpretation of the figures.

This is an **official statistics** publication, published in accordance with the UK Statistics Authority's Code of Practice for Official Statistics.

KEY POINTS

The headline figures are:

- 86.7 per cent of families received an offer of a place at their first preference school – an increase of 1.4 percentage points compared to March 2012 and continuing the rising trend seen since 2010.
- 96.5 per cent of families received an offer of a place at one of their top three preferred schools an increase of 0.6 percentage points compared to March 2012 and continuing the recent rising trend.
- 97.8 per cent of families received an offer of a place at one of their preferred schools – an increase of 0.2 percentage points compared to March 2012 and again continuing the recent rising trend.
- London continues to have the lowest percentages of applicants receiving their first preference offers, but the figures have improved more than in most other regions. Overall, 71.1 per cent of applicants in London received a first preference offer, up from 67.5 per cent in 2012. Inner London improved to 67.3 per cent (from 65.8) and Outer London to 73.2 per cent (from 68.4 per cent in 2012).
- The highest percentage of first preference offers was seen in the North East with 94.6 per cent.
- The number of applications has reduced each year since 2008, when data were first collected, as overall pupil numbers have been falling (see guidance notes). However, the rate of decrease is reducing. There was a 0.8 per cent decrease between 2012 and 2013 compared to 1.7 per cent between 2011 and 2012 and 3.3 per cent between 2010 and 2011.

USER GUIDE

The admissions process

- 1. The key features can be summarised as follows:
 - Each local authority co-ordinates admissions to the state funded schools for all pupils in its
 area, including for its pupils who wish to apply to a school in another local authority.
 Applications for each school are ranked against the school's published oversubscription
 criteria by the admission authority for the school. Where a child can be offered a place at
 more than one of their preferred schools, the local authority makes an offer at the school
 their parents ranked highest.
 - Each local authority provides data on applicants resident in their area, including applications for schools in the area of other local authorities.
 - Local authorities must publish information about the admissions criteria of schools in their locality including data on volume of applications for the available places in previous years (i.e. showing whether they are oversubscribed).
 - Parents submit all their applications for state-funded schools on a single form returned via their home local authority.
 - They must be invited to express a minimum of three preferences, which they are asked to list in order of preference. In almost all local authorities, parents are invited to apply for between three and six schools.
 - Local authorities send parents a single offer of a school place on the same day at the beginning of March
 - Parents are entitled to appeal to the relevant admission authority against their refusal to offer a place. Such appeals are not reported on in this publication.

Data Collection

- 2. This is the sixth year that secondary preference data has been collected and published. These data enable local authorities and Admission Forums to compare outcomes with previous years, or compare themselves with areas with similar characteristics, and contribute to local discussion on how to improve the system and provision of places for parents. - 3. Local authorities are required to provide the data to the Secretary of State on 1 March each year (or the next working day) as prescribed in The Information as to Provision of Education (England) Regulations 2008. These regulations are available to view at http://www.opsi.gov.uk/si/si2008/pdf/uksi 20080004 en.pdf.
- 4. The data includes returns from 151 local authorities. The Council of the Isles of Scilly has been excluded as it has only one school where the normal point of entry is at aged 3 and pupils continue until aged 16.

- 5. For some local authorities the year of entry varies from Year 7 and is indicated where appropriate. See the Guidance on interpretation of local authority figures section below for further detail.
- 6. Peterborough and Torbay have made offers of a secondary school place to pupils currently in year 6 who have not submitted an application for a place at secondary school in the 2013 academic year. These offers have not been included in the table as they are out of scope of the data collection and cannot be related to preferences made. As it is not possible to split these offers into those made to schools within or outside the home local authority, the percentage breakdown along these lines has been removed.

Definitions

- 7. The following provides definitions of key headings used in Table 1:
 - National Curriculum Year of Admission the normal curriculum year of entry to schools within the local authority i.e. Year 7 is aged 11
 - Applications received from parents of children living in the area of the authority the number of applications received
 - The sum of admission numbers of all secondary schools the number of places available in schools within the local authority
 - Number of preferences offered by the local authority the number of schools parents can apply for in their application
 - Percentage of offers communicated
 - a) First preference percentage of applicants who received an offer of a place at their first preference school
 - b) Second preference percentage of applicants who received an offer of a place at their second preference school
 - c) Third preference percentage of applicants who received an offer of a place at their third preference school
 - d) A preferred school percentage of applicants who received an offer of a place at one of their preferred schools (this may be up to a sixth preference school in some local authorities)
 - Home applicants without an offer corresponding to any preference percentage of applicants without an offer of one of their preferred schools
 - Home applicants with an alternative offer of those without an offer of a preferred school, the percentage of applicants with an offer of an alternative school
 - Home applicants with offers of a school in the area of the local authority percentage of applicants living in the local authority area who received an offer of a school within the local authority area

- Home applicants with offers of a school in another local authority percentage of applicants living in the local authority area who received an offer of a school in the area of another local authority
- 8. Local authorities have been asked not to include children with statements of special educational needs, as their parents are not required to apply for a school place. In 2009 and earlier years, local authorities were required to include such applications and record them as receiving first preference offers.

Contextual Information

- 9. The decline in secondary school pupil numbers has been seen for a number of years. The Department for Education national pupil projections show that state-funded secondary school rolls of pupils aged under 16 have been in decline since 2004 and are expected to decline further until around 2016 when the increases in primary pupil numbers will start to flow through.
- 10. Some local authorities with grammar schools brought forward their selection exams for the September 2013 intake, so a pupil would know their results before submitting an application for a secondary school place. This is likely to lead to a reduction in the number of pupils in those local authorities putting a grammar school as a preference, due to parents having information on whether or not their child is eligible in advance of submitting their application.

Guidance on interpretation of the local authority figures

- 11. A few points should be borne in mind when looking at the figures for each local authority:
 - Each local authority co-ordinates admissions to the state funded schools in its area.
 Applications for each school are ranked against the school's published oversubscription criteria by the admission authority for the school. Where a child can be offered a place at more than one of their preferred schools, the local authority makes an offer at the school their parents ranked highest.
 - Each local authority provides data on applicants resident in their area, including applications by their residents for schools in the area of other local authorities.
 - Academies are included in the local authority figures. However, Free Schools can experience a rapid set-up process and may not be ready in time to make their offers within local authority co-ordination. Therefore, for their first year of operation Free Schools may make offers direct and thus be excluded from these figures. In their second year of operation, all Free Schools will make offers completely within local authority co-ordination. Free Schools making direct offers in their first year will be small in number for example, it is currently expected that around 35 mainstream secondary Free Schools will open in September 2013 so this is the maximum number that could be excluded from the data in this publication.
 - The number of home applicants given an alternative offer by the local authority can be lower than the number of home applicants who were not given an offer from their list of preferences. This is generally because either the local authority has been able to undertake another preference exercise (based on surplus places) or because the child does not require another offer (perhaps because they have moved into the independent sector).

- The data relates to applications for transfer from primary to secondary school made during the normal admission round. The vast majority of returns are based on data for pupils moving to year 7, but a small number of local authorities have reported on another year group which is the main point of entry in their area.
- Where returns for more than one year have been received, the figures for the largest, main point of entry have been used.
- These figures are based on offers made on National Offer Day and some changes may subsequently occur as a result of appeals or further offers made by local authorities after parents have accepted or declined their initial offers. Revised figures incorporating these changes will not be published.
- 12. As part of the data collection process, local authorities had the option to provide contextual information setting out factors which might impact on figures in their area. From the information provided, several common issues emerged:
 - The effect that having one or more very popular, heavily oversubscribed school has on the percentage of applicants being offered a place at their first preference school.
 - In local authorities that have selective schools: for the first time the outcome of selection tests were known in all such local authorities before the parents expressed a preference.

Future changes to the collection

13. It is proposed to extend the collection of secondary application and offer data to include primary school offers in 2014, when there will be an offer day (16 April 2014) for primary as well as secondary schools (1 March 2014). A pilot collection is currently being planned to check the feasibility of the primary level collection. Further information will be made available once this pilot has been completed.

Revisions/Updates

14. There are no planned revisions to this Statistical Release. However, if at a later date we need to make a revision, this will comply with the departmental revisions policy which is published at http://www.education.gov.uk/rsgateway/nat-stats.shtml.

General

- 15. Where any number is shown as zero (0), the original figure was also zero. Numbers of 1 and 2 have been suppressed, being replaced in the table by an "x". Where the numerator or denominator of any percentage calculated on numbers is 1 or 2, this has been replaced by an "x". "x" has also been used for secondary suppression to prevent disclosure. For figures for offers made to one of the applicant's three preferences or to a preferred school, some percentages have been shown as a minimal level to prevent disclosure of a connected figure.
- 16. All percentages have been rounded to one decimal place.

 - 0 zero
 - x small number suppressed to preserve confidentiality (see note 15 above)
 - -- figures have been removed as offers to pupils who did not make an applications for a secondary school place cannot be separated out of the two figures.
 - . not applicable
