- Reviewing Monitor consultation on 'The new NHS provider licence' alongside the DoH
  consultation document 'Protecting and promoting patients' interests licensing
  providers of NHS services' we believe there is confusion regarding the scope of the
  exemption.
  - Monitor asks respondents if they support Monitor's provisional conclusion 'on the allocation of the licence where, but for providing Commissioner Request Services, a licence holder would be exempt from the requirement to hold a licence.' This does not agree with appendix B of the DoH consultation document.
  - The text of the DoH consultation document does not support the proposed exemptions flowchart provided in appendix B of the consultation. This flowchart shows independent sector provider of ambulance services being exempt from licensing whilst being required to response to Monitor's request for information. (NB consultation document does not provide details of the mechanism that will enable this information request.)

As a result we contacted <u>licence.exemptions@dh.gsi.gov.uk</u> and the reply we received stated that where an independent ambulance provider does provide NHS funded services and is registered with CQC, then the intention is that they will, like any other private provider of such services, be subject to licensing, but also subject to the de minimise exemptions.

In addition, we were informed that the Health and Social Care Act gives Monitor the power to request information from all providers of NHQ services, including licensed providers and providers exempt from the requirement to hold a licence. It may have been useful to have given this background information in the DoH consultation document to aid the reader's understanding.

We were also informed that the current proposal is that there will be no distinction between main contractors and sub-contractors for licensing. There is no guidance within this consultation document on the issue of sub-contracting and until we received the response from <a href="licence.emption@dh.gsi.gov.uk">licence.emption@dh.gsi.gov.uk</a> we had wrongly assumed that sub-contractors would be outside of the scope of the licensing framework. We believe that future consultations should all include a detailed description of the definition of NHQ funded services.

 We currently feel that the language used within both the DoH and Monitor consultations relating to the licensing framework is too NHS focused and that consideration should be given to the accessibility of these and future documents on independent and third sector providers.
