Summary: Within the local area of the proposed Free School it is expected that two schools will feel a minimal impact, four schools will feel a moderate impact and one school will feel a high impact, St Patrick's RC Primary School.

St Patrick's is the closest school to the proposed Free School, just under half a mile away, less than the average distance travelled to primary school in Manchester (0.6 miles). In principle it is likely to lose more pupils to the Free School than schools further away. It has attainment well below the national average and only a satisfactory Ofsted report, so parents may be attracted to an alternative. However, as a faith school, it is arguably less likely parents choosing St Patrick's would opt for the Free School; rather they are more likely to send their children to another nearby, and better-performing, Catholic school, such as St Anne's. St Patrick's was undersubscribed for entry in 2011/2012: Manchester primary schools admissions booklet reports that there were 37 preferences made for 30 places, but only 24 places offered, suggesting some were not first preferences. The school has an existing surplus of 33% of total capacity. The loss of even a few pupils could exacerbate that surplus and could have a significant impact on the school's overall attainment, viability and ability to improve. However, the primary school population is projected to increase over the next few years so any potential negative impact may be mitigated by overall increased demand over time.
