






The challenge

Financial and demographic pressure. Scaling up is not always the answer



People say they want more involvement – and trust in institutions is low





The need

- Faced with financial pressure and increasing demand, it is important to ensure that local services are ...
- ... as efficient and effective as possible...
- ... delivering the **right service** at the **right time**...
- ... with **minimum wasted effort** or **expense**...
- ... and ensuring the **best outcomes** for service users.
- This may well call for service redesign

Through


- Better tailoring of services to local needs and demand
- Better addressing complex needs and reduce duplication economies of scope
- Managing demand Asset Based Community Development
- Focussing on the real needs not what the system provides

We can

- Promote civic participation and cohesion more widely
- Reduce 'failure demand'
- Generate efficiencies



The model





Delivering Differently in Neighbourhoods

- Financial support and expertise to redesign services to deliver at neighbourhood level, with the involvement of local people and organisations
- Aims to help authorities to
 - provide better quality services which meet local people's needs
 - reduce overall cost by eliminating waste and achieving economies of scope
 - work with local authorities to gather evidence of effective neighbourhood delivery models and disseminate this more widely



The support offer

- Unringfenced grants of up to £90,000 to up to 25 local authorities in 2014/2015 and 2015/2016
- Expert panel DCLG, The Network, LGA, Associations of Directors, academics to provide advice and challenge
- Support with Cost Benefit Analysis
- Opportunities to exchange learning and network



The expectation

- The grants are intended to support local authorities to kick-start innovative projects for redesign, for example to develop:
 - options appraisals / feasibility studies
 - implementation plans
 - Cost Benefit Analyses
- We are looking to build the case for neighbourhood level service delivery, and would expect local authorities to work with us to gather evidence and learning and share this more widely.
