# Quarterly NHS Commissioning Population Statistics: based on military and entitled civilian medical patient registrations 01 October 2014

## INTRODUCTION

1. This quarterly Official Statistic provides summary statistics on the number of serving UK Armed Forces personnel and entitled civilian personnel with a Defence Medical Services (DMS) registration. This report uses a snapshot of data as at 1 October 2014. Reports are released quarterly, eight weeks after the reporting point. The next report will be published on 26 February 2015.
2. This report is being released to enable the MOD, the Department of Health (DH), NHS England (and devolved administrations), Public Health England, Local Area Authorities (LAA) and Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCG) to make informed decisions regarding the commissioning of clinical services in different parts of the country depending on the size and make-up of the Armed Forces populations requiring access to care, and to contribute to the MODs commitment to release information where possible.
3. Data are presented for personnel with a DMS registration: UK Armed Forces Serving personnel comprising Regular personnel, Gurkhas, Officer Designates and Full Time Reserve Service (FTRS) Full Commitment (FC) personnel. Entitled civilian personnel data presented comprise Service personnel family dependants and MOD employed civilian personnel who are entitled to care at MOD primary care facilities.

## KEY FINDINGS

4. As at 1 October 2014<sup>1</sup>:
  - 77% of all patient DMS registrations with MOD medical centres were for UK Armed Forces personnel.
  - 75% of all patient DMS registrations with MOD medical centres were in the UK; 68% of all DMS registrations were in England.
  - For UK Armed Forces personnel; 87% of personnel were registered in the UK (79% in England, 6% in Scotland, 2% in Northern Ireland, and 1% in Wales); 10% were registered overseas.
  - For entitled civilian personnel; 34% were registered in the UK; (32% were registered in England), 65% were registered overseas.
  - 89% of all 'over 60 year old' patient DMS registrations were for entitled civilians in Germany, Cyprus and other overseas locations. Of those age 60+ entitled civilian registrations overseas, 75% were males, and 25% were females.
  - 20% of entitled civilian registrations were for children aged 0-4. 52% of these children were male, and 48% were female.
  - 45% of UK Armed Forces personnel were aged 20-29.

## **BACKGROUND**

5. Across the UK the systems and policies regarding the provision of healthcare varies between the devolved administrations of England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland.
6. The Health and Social Care Act 2012 reshaped the NHS in England; aiming to make it more responsive, efficient and accountable<sup>2</sup>. Central to this restructuring was the establishment of Clinical Commissioning Groups, putting clinicians in charge of shaping services. CCGs are made up of General Practitioners (GP) with representatives from nursing, public health and hospital doctors. Their role is to improve the health of their section of the population by choosing and buying services. CCGs are supported by Commissioning Support Units; who provide technical support data, contract negotiations etc, and Clinical senates; hospital doctors providing specialist advice on patient groups or conditions. CCGs are also supported by NHS England (the operating name of the NHS Commissioning Board). NHS England has a role of assurance, support and development of, and co-commissioning with, CCGs. It is also responsible for specialist commissioning, regionally or nationally for smaller groups of patients with rare conditions and the commissioning of primary care services (not done by CCGs)<sup>3</sup>.
7. The Act also provided a new focus for Public Health; the public health budget was moved over to local government budget putting local authorities in charge of driving health improvement. Health and Wellbeing boards (part of local authorities) bring together key players to improve health and social care to improve care in a joined up way and reduce health inequalities. They are responsible for commissioning services such as smoking cessation, alcohol and drug misuse services, or interventions to tackle obesity. CCGs and Health and Wellbeing boards will work together in assessing local needs and developing commissioning plans<sup>2</sup>.
8. The Armed Forces Clinical Reference Group provides clinical advice to NHS England in support of its commissioning decisions regarding serving Armed Forces personnel, their families, mobilised reservists and veterans, ensuring that patients experience a seamless transition between MOD and NHS services.
9. In Wales, the NHS reforms in 2009 saw the former 22 Local Health Boards and seven NHS Trusts replaced with seven integrated Local Health Boards (LHB) and a new Public Health Wales NHS Trust. (The former Velindre NHS Trust and Welsh Ambulance Services Trusts also continued)<sup>4</sup>. The seven Local Health Boards plan, secure and deliver healthcare services on their areas. These reforms aim to improve joined up working between health and social care services, to place a greater emphasis on public health and to improve health outcomes.
10. Scotland has been developing a partnership working between health and social care since 2001, with a number of policies and Acts aimed at increasing flexibility for NHS and councils to work together and introducing more focus on patient-centered care. The NHS Reform (Scotland) Act 2004 abolished separate acute and primary care trusts and required NHS Boards to manage both types of service. It also required NHS Boards to set up Community Health Partnerships (CHP) in their local area to bridge the gap between primary and secondary healthcare and health and social care. CHPs were also expected to coordinate the planning and provision of primary and community health services in their area.<sup>5</sup>
11. In Northern Ireland, health and social care are jointly managed and provided. The Health and Social Care in Northern Ireland Board was established in 2009 and has five Local Commissioning Groups (LCG) that are responsible for assessing, planning and securing the delivery of health and social care.
12. Gaining an understanding of the local population is vital to any assessment of health. The make up of the Armed Forces population is very different to that of the UK as a whole, which has implications for the planning and provision of public services. The Armed Forces population is typically young males who tend to be physically fit, but due to the nature of their employment can sustain more injuries than in the entitled civilian population.

13. The nature of military employment also means that the population is transient, and regularly move around the country and to overseas locations.
14. Throughout 2013 the provision of healthcare by the MOD also changed. Prior to 2013, the Single Services (Naval Service, Army and RAF) were responsible for the provision of care through the medical centres located at their units. From April 2013 clinical provision was restructured so that one headquarters organisation; Defence Primary Health Care (DPHC), became responsible for the provision of care across all MOD medical centres in the UK and overseas (excluding Operations). The project achieved Initial Operating Capability on 1 April 2013 when the command and control of Medical Centres in the South region, Regional Occupational Medicine Departments, Regional Rehabilitation Units, and Defence Community Mental Health units started to pass from the single Services to the new HQ DPHC. The transfer of medical centres in the remaining regions began in October 2013, with Full Operating Capability achieved in April 2014.
15. MOD staff, mainly Public Health, Healthcare and DPHC, are in constant communication with NHS England to determine overall commissioning requirements, quality standards and pricing. The specialist medical and occupational health needs of MOD patients are arranged by this grouping, bringing in specialists for cases of "exceptional funding".
16. NHS England has appointed three Local Area Teams (LAT) to manage local requirements for Armed Forces commissioning in England. These are the main NHS contact for DPHC Regions. The LATs are in York, Nottingham and Chippenham and cover, north, central and southern England.
17. This statistical notice will provide information to commissioning and public health bodies to enable them to understand the MOD population at risk and in order that the needs of the Armed Forces can be considered in the commissioning of clinical services and provision of public health initiatives. Information has been presented by<sup>6</sup>:
  - Clinical Commissioning Group and Local Area Authority (England)
  - Local Health Board and Local Area Authority (Wales)
  - Community Health Partnership and Council Area (Scotland)
  - Local Commissioning Group and Local Government District (Northern Ireland)
  - Defence Primary Healthcare region (UK)

## **DATA, DEFINITIONS AND METHODS**

### **Data Sources:**

18. Data are compiled by Defence Statistics (Health) from the Defence Medical Information Capability Programme (DMICP) data warehouse. The DMICP programme commenced during 2007 and comprises an integrated primary Health Record (iHR) for clinical use and a pseudo-anonymised central data warehouse. Prior to this data warehouse, medical records were kept locally, at each individual medical centre. By 2010, DMICP was in place for the UK and the majority of Germany. Rollout to other overseas locations commenced in November 2011 and is ongoing.
19. The patient registration data from DMICP were cross referenced with the Joint Personnel Administration (JPA) system for UK Armed Forces personnel. JPA is the most accurate source for demographic information on UK Armed Forces personnel and is used to gather information on a person's service, Regular/Reservist status, gender and age. All demographic data for entitled civilian personnel was gathered from DMICP alone.
20. Data presented comprises a snapshot of the MOD medical centre DMS registrations as at 01 October 2014. Changes in population sizes at different reporting points may be due to bulk personnel moves (e.g. troops leaving Germany, units deploying to a given location) or may be due to overall changes in the numbers of personnel across the UK Armed Forces. The process of allocating patients registered in other overseas, reserve or unknown practices back to a UK, Germany or Cyprus practice at which they were previously registered at in the last 12 months can also contribute to changes in population sizes.

## **Definitions:**

21. Across the MOD and NHS, only one medical centre can be responsible for providing long term, permanent and full primary healthcare at a time. Patients that have their primary healthcare provided by Defence Medical Services (DMS) **cannot** be registered with an NHS GP Practice. The medical centre where a patient is registered is responsible for providing primary healthcare to that individual. However it is possible for an individual to be treated at an alternative medical centre (e.g. if they experience an emergency away from home), however their registration will not change. A small number of UK Armed Forces personnel will not be registered at a MOD medical centre, for example, if they are posted to an overseas location where MOD do not have a medical facility. Other arrangements are made for the delivery of primary healthcare for these individuals.
22. A DMS registration<sup>7</sup> at an MOD medical centre means that the MOD are responsible for providing long term, permanent and full primary healthcare; however these individuals will be referred to the NHS for secondary healthcare provision as required. In the first report in this series (data presented as at 01 July 2013) all Regulars, Gurkhas, Officer Designates and FTRS personnel were included, as they are eligible to hold a DMS registration. In the second report (data presented as at 01 October 2013), and going forward, registration types have been checked and any individuals with a 'non DMS' registration were excluded, as the MOD are not responsible for the primary healthcare of non-DMS patients and they should hold an NHS registration.

## **UK Armed Forces Personnel**

23. The following UK Armed Forces personnel have been included; Regulars, FTRS and Gurkhas with a DMS registration. This includes both trained and untrained personnel. Service personnel have been excluded when they have a non-DMS registration type. The "non-DMS" denotes that their Primary Healthcare is delivered by the NHS, with a record also being held on DMICP. This record is used for when they access healthcare facilities in DMS medical centres for emergency or ad hoc treatment, and for treatment whilst on operations.
24. As at 1 October 2014, 2,140 UK Armed Forces personnel held a non-DMS registration. As such, these personnel were excluded from the data. Due to data quality issues outlined in the background quality report, it is possible some individuals have an incorrect registration type and should be included. A further 3,550 personnel had no registration type listed. These individuals have been included in the report, and are listed in the Unknown subcategory of 'Other'. Defence Statistics are working with Defence Primary Healthcare to resolve the data quality issues highlighted above for future publications of this report.
25. Naval Service personnel registered to surface or submarine flotilla have been allocated to either HMS Nelson (Portsmouth), HMS Drake (Plymouth) or HMS Neptune (Faslane, Scotland) as per Naval Service policy, as the base ports are responsible for the care of individuals requiring medical treatment or onward referral to the NHS.

## **Reservist Personnel**

26. Within the Armed Forces there are several types of Reservist with differing entitlements to MOD primary care. Those FTRS who are DMS eligible are FTRS Full Commitment and FTRS aircrew. FTRS on Home or Local Commitment (excluding aircrew), and other types of Reservists such as mobilised Army Reserve (formerly Territorial Army) are not eligible to have a DMS registration and should hold non-DMS registration types only. However, there are known data quality issues with DMS registrations. In this report, all FTRS who hold a DMS registration are included and so any FTRS who incorrectly hold a DMS registration will be included in the report. Defence Statistics are continuing to work with Defence Primary Healthcare to resolve these issues.

## **Entitled civilian Personnel**

27. The data presented on entitled civilian personnel were based on the number of DMS registrations in DMICP identified as 'civilian'. 'Civilians' include contractors, MOD employed entitled civilians and

military family dependents. Please note the numbers presented are NOT representative of the number of MOD employed civilians or military dependents associated with the MOD, as the majority of MOD civilian employees are not entitled to military health care, and the majority of military dependents will be registered with an NHS GP practice. In the UK, when military dependants are entitled to military health care, the movements of patients around medical centres may be just as frequent as movements in military patients if families follow their military partners to the locations where they have been based.

28. There are a small number of MOD UK medical centres which provide primary healthcare to entitled civilians. A full list of these practices can be found at Annex F. These medical centres are training facilities for military healthcare personnel, and exist to offer a full range of training opportunities for the purposes of GP revalidation.

#### **Data Methods:**

29. In providing this analysis, Defence Statistics (Health) have examined patient registration information from the Defence Medical Information Capability Programme (DMICP) and cross-referenced with the Joint Personnel Administration system (JPA) for UK Armed Forces personnel.
30. The absence of a UK area or region in the tables of this report means that there are no MOD patient registrations associated with that area.
31. The information shown has been compiled from data held by Defence Statistics (Health) on 1 October 2014. Information has been provided for UK Armed Forces personnel and entitled civilian personnel, with figures broken down by age band and gender. Information has been presented by Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) and Local Area Authority (LAA) for England, and equivalent commissioning groups and local authorities for other UK countries, as advised by the ONS. (See paragraph 17). Data are also presented by each Defence Primary Healthcare (DPHC) region.
32. Personnel registered at a MOD medical centre in Germany or Cyprus have been presented. This will enable stakeholders to identify any changes to the populations in these areas, and any subsequent impact on UK MOD medical centres, for example the drawdown of troops in Germany and the return of these personnel to UK locations.
33. For UK Armed Forces personnel only, Defence Statistics have devised a process to allocate personnel to a medical centre where they are registered at overseas practices (excluding Germany and Cyprus), data management practices, reserve practices and at incorrect facilities (see paragraphs 34-38). For civilian patients, no data processing is carried out (more detail on civilians is given in paragraph 39).
34. At any time there are large numbers of UK Armed Forces personnel stationed/deployed overseas. In order to enable commissioning bodies to make decisions regarding the possible numbers of personnel who may need access to services, it is important to include as many of these personnel as possible in the analysis.
35. Due to movements of UK Armed Forces personnel, potentially to a non DMICP enabled location, and the movements of troops on deployment, it is necessary to have data management practices set up for the handling and movement of patient records. These practices perform a legitimate function, but sometimes records are not correctly moved out of these locations.
36. UK Armed Forces personnel may also be incorrectly registered at non primary care locations (e.g. Regional Occupational Health Teams (ROHT), Regional Rehabilitation Units (RRU), Departments of Community Mental Health (DCMH), Primary Care Rehabilitation Facilities (PCRF), Decommissioned vessels and blank registrations) or Reserve Practices.
37. For personnel registered at the facilities listed below. Defence Statistics (Health) identified the medical centres at which they were previously registered in the last 12 months. Where this was a UK, Germany or Cyprus medical centre, the personnel have been allocated to their most recent UK, Germany or Cyprus location and presented for the corresponding region. These figures have been presented as 'registrations'.
- Overseas, Operations and Exercises
  - Data management practices
  - Non primary care locations
  - Reserve Practices

38. Where a previous UK, Germany or Cyprus medical centre could not be identified in the last 12 months, personnel have been presented in **Table 1** as follows:
- Overseas, Operations and Exercises - 'Other Overseas'
  - Data management practices – 'Unknown'
  - Non primary care locations – 'Unknown'
  - Reserve Practices – 'Reserve Practices'
39. Where entitled civilian personnel were registered overseas (excluding Germany and Cyprus), at a data management practice or at a non primary care practice such as ROHT, RRU, DCMH etc, they have been classified as 'Other' in **Table 1**. Previous registrations for entitled civilians were not looked into due to the sporadic nature of their care patterns and locations (entitled civilians may constantly move around with their military partners as outlined in paragraph 27). Entitled civilians under military care are known to move between NHS and military practices. As such, tracing entitled civilians to their last known UK, Germany or Cyprus military medical centre could create a false impression of entitled civilian registrations. It was not possible to tell when entitled civilians were registered under NHS care and as such, current practice registrations only were used in this report. This accounts for the high numbers of entitled civilians in the 'Other' category.
40. The 'Other' category in **Table 1** & in all tables in **Section 5** present registrations not in the UK. It presents the number of personnel who were currently registered in Germany, Cyprus, and those records from Operations, Exercises and other non-UK locations whose previous registrations over the last 12 months were also not in the UK. This group includes registrations in:
- British Forces Germany (BFG)
  - Cyprus
  - Other overseas (those in overseas locations excluding Germany and Cyprus, those on Operations and those on Exercises)
  - Reserve practices
  - Unknown (those in data management practices, those with incorrect registrations at incorrect non primary care facilities, and those with blank records)
41. All UK medical centres identified from DMICP were mapped to an NHS CCG using a list published by the Health and Social Care Information Centre and the Office of National Statistics (ONS).
42. Defence Statistics (Tri Service) produce Quarterly Location Statistics on population locations. Although there are differences regarding the inclusion of certain groups of individuals between the two reports (e.g. Quarterly Location Statistics exclude reservists and Gurkhas; NHS Commissioning population statistics include FTRS and Gurkhas), there is overlap regarding the location of military personnel. The CCGs with the largest number of reported medical registrations in the Commissioning statistics also stand out as being the most heavily populated areas in terms of stationed locations within the military. However, the numbers of UK Armed Forces presented by location will be also different to those presented by Defence Statistics (Tri Service) as they are based on patient registration data and in order to ensure access to care is available for the maximum population in a region, where possible, overseas registrations have been allocated back to a UK, Germany or Cyprus medical practice as in the majority of cases patients will be returned to access secondary health care. Due to this allocation process, it is important to realise that the tables in this report do not show where people are based.
43. For tables where age bands have been presented, the Service age bands start at 16 (the youngest age at which it is possible to join the Armed Forces). The entitled civilian age bands start from 0-4. Note that the age bands in the tables span five years with the exception of a 16-19 category for Service personnel and the 60+ category for both Service and entitled civilian personnel. The age presented is the age at the time of the data extract.
44. The tables in this report have been scrutinised to ensure individual identities have not been revealed inadvertently. In line with Defence Statistics' rounding policy (May 2009), figures have been rounded to the nearest 10 in keeping with the Office for National Statistics Guidelines. All numbers fewer than five have been suppressed and presented as '~'. Rounding is desirable both as a means of disclosure control and to improve the clarity of outputs and convey appropriate levels of precision to users. Totals and sub-totals have been rounded separately and so may not equal the sums of their rounded parts. Numbers ending in "5" have been rounded to the nearest multiple of 20 to prevent systematic bias.
45. Tables containing military and civilian breakdowns (Tables 1 to 10) in this report show the changes in

population figures over the latest quarter (for all military, and for civilians). Tables containing age and gender breakdowns in the annexes of this report (Tables A1.1 to D2.6) show changes in the population figures at the overall countrywide level only (top row of each table). The following arrows indicate percentage changes:

- △ There has been between a 5% to 10% increase since the previous quarter;
- ▲ There has been a greater than 10% increase since the previous quarter;
- ▽ There has been between a 5% and 10% decrease since the previous quarter;
- ▼ There has been a greater than 10% decrease since the previous quarter.

46. Percentage changes have not been shown where population figures were below 20 in both the current and previous quarters. This is because a difference of a small number of people can show a large percentage change, creating a false sense of change over the three month period.
47. Where no arrow is presented, but the population figure is at least 20 in the current and/or previous quarter, the percentage change between the population numbers over the last quarter is less than 5%.

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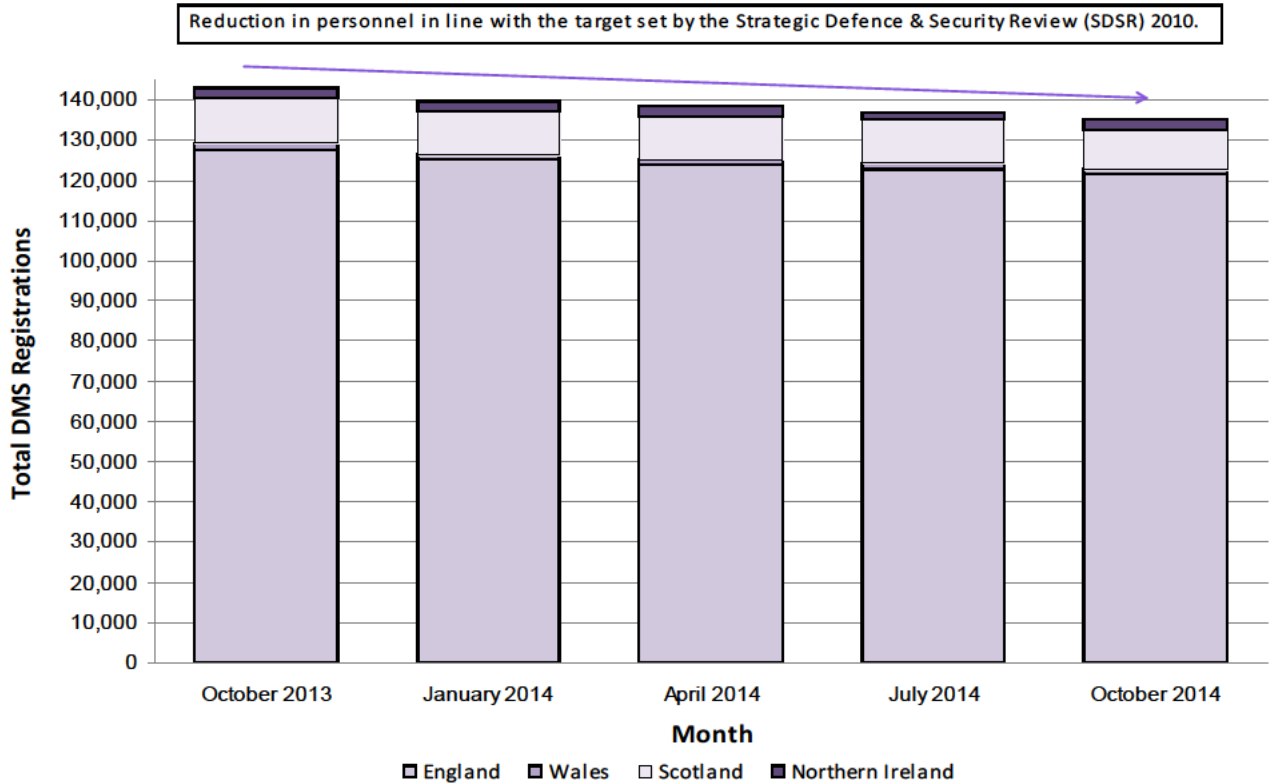
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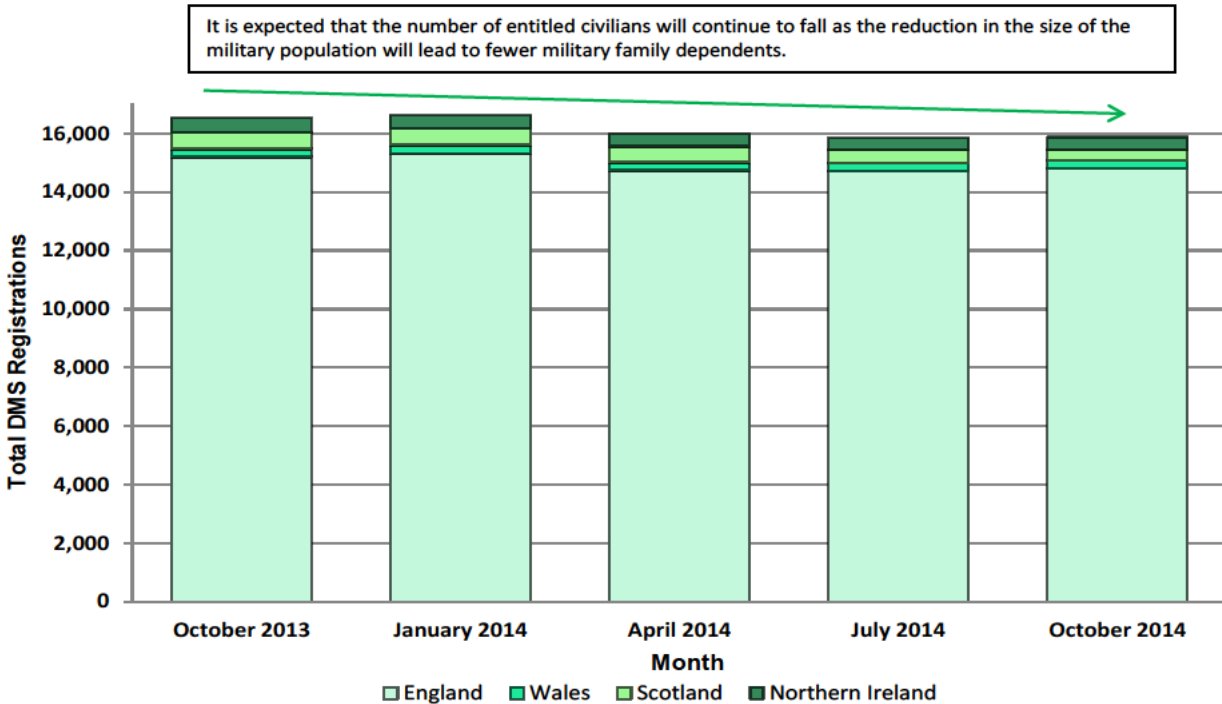
## FINDINGS

48. **Figure 1** presents the number of registrations for UK Armed Forces personnel within the UK over the last five quarters<sup>8</sup>.

49. **Figure 2** presents the number of registrations for entitled civilians within the UK over the last five quarters<sup>8</sup>.



**Figure 2: Entitled Civilian UK registrations by country and quarter, October 2013 - October 2014, number.**

50. **Figure 1** shows a net reduction in UK Armed forces registrations within the UK over the last five quarters with an overall reduction of **7,970** personnel. For the latest quarter, the proportion of personnel in Northern Ireland has returned to expected levels following the relocation of 1 SCOTS from Edinburgh to replace the Mercians who moved out last quarter.
51. **Figure 2** shows a net reduction in civilian registrations over the last five quarters with an overall reduction of 650 personnel. However, civilian figures this quarter have increased slightly (N=20) from last quarter.
52. **Table 1** presents the location of all UK Armed Forces and entitled civilian personnel as at 01 October 2014.

53. **Table 1** shows that for UK Armed Forces personnel:
- 79% were registered in England (n=121,420)
  - 9% were registered elsewhere in the UK (n=13,650)
  - 7% were registered in Germany (n=11,850)
  - 2% were registered in Cyprus (n=2,450)
54. **Table 1** shows that for entitled civilian personnel:
- 32% were registered in England (n=14,790)
  - 2% were registered elsewhere in the UK (n=1,080)
  - 31% were registered in Germany (n=14,250)
  - 10% were registered in Cyprus (n=4,570)
55. **3% (n=5,040)** of personnel had a registration location that was incorrect (presented in **Table 1** as 'Unknown'). Defence Statistics (Health) are working with Defence Primary Healthcare (DPHC) to identify and resolve data quality and registration issues (please see paragraph 61).
56. The overall number of UK Armed Forces registrations has decreased by **1,410** since the last report dated 01 July 2014. This is due to the Armed Forces conforming to redundancy targets as set out in the Strategic Defence and Security Review (SDSR).
57. The SDSR was a review of the United Kingdom's defence and security capability published in 2010. It envisaged that by 2020 each Service will number: Royal Navy 29,000, RAF: 31,500 and Army: 94,000. The target for the Army was revised to 82,000 following the internal 3ME in July 2011 and announcements in the Army 2020 paper published July 2012.

58. The reduction in numbers in Germany from the previous quarterly report is due to the unit move of 1 AAC to the UK, and disbandments of and in: 3 MERCIAN, 2 LSR, 28 Engr Regt and Hameln Station, 111 and 114 Pro Coys and 16 Tk Tp Sqn. This is consistent with the Army structures announced as part of the A2020 programme in 2012 and will see circa 10,500 posts remaining in Germany at the end of 2014.
59. During the last quarter 1 SCOTS have relocated from Edinburgh to Northern Ireland, replacing the Mercians who moved out of Northern Ireland in the previous quarter. Therefore figures for Northern Ireland have returned to previous levels, and figures for Scotland are showing a decrease. Figures for Scotland are expected to increase during 2015 in line with the A2020 programme, and the drawn down of troops in Germany, some of whom will move into Leuchars.
60. Fluctuations in the number of personnel registered to 'Other overseas' and 'Unknown' locations may occur due to the process of allocating back to a practice they were previously registered at in the last 12 months. These fluctuations may be caused by military personnel spending a longer time in other overseas locations<sup>9</sup>, patient records not being moved back to UK, Germany or Cyprus practices in a timely manner or due to the registration being incorrectly moved to a non-primary care location i.e. not a medical centre.
61. There are known data quality issues with patient registration data from overseas practices using the deployed version of the electronic patient record. It is possible that old patient records are still showing as overseas registrations for both military and civilian personnel. Defence Primary Healthcare staff are working to address this issue and it is likely that the number of overseas registrations will decrease over time as records are cleansed.
