REQUEST FOR INFORMATION: iTunes and Android Stores

Thank you for your request for information which we received on 19 November about Departmental spend in the iTunes and Android stores. As you know, we have handled your request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

You asked for the total amount spent in the iTunes and Android stores for the years 2012, 2013 and 2014 and a breakdown of each item purchased, when it was purchased and its cost. We have interpreted your reference to the Android store as meaning the Google Play store.

There was only one transaction during the period specified:

2013/14	Apple iTunes Store	199.99	Purchase of MacBook Editing Software for use by our communications team producing internal communications videos
