REQUEST FOR INFORMATION: MONK PARAKEETS

Thank you for your request for information about monk parakeets, which we received on 17 August. We have handled your request under the Environmental Information Regulations 2004 (EIRs).

The EIRs apply to requests for environmental information, which is a broad category of information defined in regulation 2 of the EIRs. Public authorities are required to handle requests for environmental information under the EIRs. They give similar access rights to the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

Monk parakeets are an agricultural pest in their native range. They can carry diseases and they have the potential to cause biodiversity impacts through competition for resources. They nest communally, often on man-made structures such as electrical utility structures (e.g. pylons and substations) where they can cause power outages. In the USA, where they have also been introduced, the cost of nest removal alone to reduce the risk of power outages was estimated to be \$1.3m to \$4.7m over a 5 year period.

The decision to remove monk parakeets from the wild in England was taken after considering all the evidence on the threat they pose to economic interests and taking a precautionary approach to any potential threat to biodiversity. The evidence base for the decision included advice from key agencies and principally, a peer-reviewed Risk Assessment for the species. The Risk Assessment, available from http://www.nonnativespecies.org, made clear that this species is capable of causing severe local damage to crops and of causing damage to artificial structures as a result of colonial nest building.





In England, even at their current small population size, they are causing a hazard to householders due to the droppings below their colonial nests and they have already built nests on a mobile phone mast. The current and potential problems are likely to become increasingly significant if the population is left to grow.

Since 2009/10, the Government has spent £259k on the monk parakeet eradication programme. Details of actions undertaken are contained in the table below.

All of the birds in the table above were removed using cage trapping, whoosh netting and capture by net/hand at the nest.

The removal of feral monk parakeets on the Isle of Dogs is ongoing using egg control to prevent eggs hatching, the capture of mature birds and the removal of some nests. In keeping with the spirit and effect of the EIRs, and in keeping with the government's Transparency Agenda, all information is assumed to be releasable to the public unless exempt. Therefore, the information released to you will now be published on www.gov.uk together with any related information that will provide a key to its wider context. Please note that this will not include your personal data.
