## Notice of Suspension of a licence issued under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012

As you know, an unannounced inspection under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012 (the "Regulations") took place on 25 November to ensure your ongoing compliance with the Regulations. As I said in my letter of 16 November, although the scheduled inspections planned for your circus for your current licence had finished, the Department retain the power to undertake further announced or unannounced inspections during the remaining period of your licence. Additional inspections could be required in response to concerns raised about the wild animals in your circus.

In summary, the inspection found a number of matters which cause concern. However, the matters of most immediate concern found during the inspection were that:

1. The two reindeer and the camel 'Kachana' were not adequately supervised whilst the public had access to them. The public were allowed unsupervised contact with the camel and were allowed to feed the reindeer and camel unsupervised. As has been made clear to you several times previously in writing, unsupervised access to licensed animals is restricted to authorised persons and any access by the general public requires direct supervision. Given it's medical history, we have also required you to maintain additional monitoring of the camel's well-being.
2. The camel 'Kachana' was found to have a hoof condition which had not been seen by a vet and did not appear to be being treated appropriately. It was the view of the inspector that the animal was not fit to be on display.
3. The display enclosures were also found to be inappropriate. The size is smaller than that required in the circus guidance for animals including reindeer. Further, none of the animals on display, given that they appeared to have been on display all day, have been provided with a place to retreat to, out of public gaze.
4. Animals were reported to not be receiving sufficient exercise as they are been kept in the display enclosure for most of the day and the on-site facilities only enable them to have short walks
5. Care plans did not include any risk assessments for the display work undertaken and individual records did not record the amount of extra food being fed to the animals by the public, which is clearly taking place and being encouraged.

## Decision of the Circus Licensing Panel

The Inspector's additional findings have been considered by a panel of officials on behalf of the Secretary of State and the panel is satisfied there is a clear breach of conditions 4 , $5,7,8$ and 9 of the licensing conditions. The panel has recommended that your licence be suspended with immediate effect.

During the suspension period you must not operate a travelling circus with wild animals. You will need to ensure that your wild animals do not perform and are off display at all times. Under the Animal Welfare Act 2006, the maximum penalty for operating a travelling circus with wild animals without a licence is 6 months' imprisonment or an unlimited fine or both. If your wild animals are dangerous wild animals within the meaning of the Dangerous Wild Animals Act 1976, they will need to be licensed under that Act which is administered by local authorities. It is your responsibility to ensure that you are compliant with any other laws that are relevant to the keeping or displaying of wild animals.

## Measures required to secure compliance with the Licensing Conditions

Before your licence can be reinstated we require you to undertake the following measures:

- Provide Defra with evidence that the camel 'Kachana', has been seen by an appropriate vet as instructed by the inspector during the inspection on 25 November and that the came! is now undergoing a suitable course of treatment. We would expect to see this evidence, in the form a signed letter from the vet, within one week of the date of this letter.
- Provide Defra with a signed letter from the vet stating that, in their opinion, the camel 'Kachana' is now fit to be used in a display. The animal is not to be used in a display until such time as it is fit to do so and, if you are unable to confirm its fitness, you should remove the animal from your stocklist.
- Ensure that the environment that any animals are to be displayed in is appropriate, both in terms of size and security. Further details can be found in the section on

Environment (pages 18 to 25) in the guidance on the Regulations. Also, if the animals are to be displayed during all the opening hours of the Garden Centre, the environment provides ready access to a place for the animals to retreat to, out of public gaze.

- A clear commitment from you that, if the public are to be allowed access to any of your animals, it will only be under direct supervision by someone from your list of authorised persons.
- Care plans are revised to include a risk assessment of the display work being undertaken, and that individual records will include details of all extra food being eaten by the animals on display.

If you do not provide the Secretary of State with sufficient evidence to demonstrate that the conditions on which the suspension was based, points one to four above, have been rectified by 28 days after the day following the date of this letter your licence to operate a travelling circus using wild animals may be revoked.

## Right of appeal

You are entitled to appeal this decision to a magistrates' court by way of a complaint but must do so no later than 28 days after the day following the date of this letter. The Magistrates' Courts Act 1980 will apply to the proceedings.

The magistrates' court may on application permit you to continue to operate a travelling circus, subject to the conditions in the Schedule to the Regulations, pending an appeal.

## Dear Defra Circus Animal Welfare Team

Thankyou for your letter of yesterday regarding our unannounced inspection. Obviously we are upset at the suspension but do realise the reasons this decision was made. Unfortunately we have had a stressful few months recently what with Dad dying and[REDA and me having to go backwards and forwards to Poland where he died and also[REDAC husband [RED has had to have a knee operation which means he is out of action too, so we are working on a more than usual reduced winter staff. We realise this is no excuse for bad management and also realise that we have not kept to the standards agreed before with you.

We have as from this morning taken our licensed animals off display at the garden centre for this season, we don't do any Father Christmas reindeer work. With regards to the camels feet I phoned this morning to the Vets practice only to find that the Vet who saw the camel is now on leave until the $10^{\text {th }}$ so we will not be able to get a letter signed by her within a week, I have asked if another Vet can confirm that the Vet did see Kachana and they have just comeback with the attached report. You will see that it states that a follow up would be by phone, however our intention is to have her revisit when she returns. Perhaps you could let me know by return if this ok until the Vet gets back on the $10^{\text {th }}$. We can then get another report which will be signed by her.

It is our intention to hold an emergency management meeting as soon as possible to go through our procedures and devise a new system which will be sent to you to agree. Just so you know the garden centre intend to bring back their own reindeer and will be displaying them when they do, so if anyone does turn up they are not ours.

## Dear Carol

Thank you for your emails of $3^{\text {rd }}$ and $7^{\text {th }}$ December. We understand that, due to leave, you have not been able to get a signed letter from the vet who has seen Kachana. The Panel took the decision to approach the veterinary practice separately to discuss the treatment outlined in your email of $3^{\text {rd }}$ December. The veterinary practice confirmed that the camel Kachana has been seen by a member of the practice but that person is currently on leave. The Panel was concerned about the length of time suggested by the practice between visits by the vet. The practice has agreed to contact you regarding the effectiveness of the treatment and arrange a check-up if necessary. Even though your licence is currently suspended, we would advise you that your records for the camel Kachana should be kept up to date and that the veterinary advice and treatment is recorded appropriately. The attending veterinary surgeon should update the individual records as necessary and should, if they have not already done so, consult your lead vet regarding any treatment recommended.

We note that all your animals are now off display, and that - with the exception of the Camel Kachana - the animals currently at the garden centre will be moved to a new location. You will need to confirm that the animals have been moved when it occurs.

With regard to reinstating your licence, we await the outcome of your emergency management meeting. Once you have considered your procedures, and suggested how you will ensure that your licensed animals are always supervised in future where the public has access to them, we will consider again your suspension and what other action we think might be necessary. We reserve our right to carry out further, unannounced inspections in this regard.

## VETERINARY REPORT

## Ref: Kachana, 5 months old camel belonging to Carol Macmanus and kept at Baytree Nurseries, High Road, Weston, Spalding, Lines, PE12 6JU

The above camel was examined on the $30^{\text {th }}$ of November due to a 2 week history of sore feet in all four limbs.
On presentation, the camel was in good body condition. A mild dermatitis in all four feet was found; the lesions were dry and in some places small bleeding was observed through the scabs.
A treatment consisting of topical disinfectants (hibiscrub solution twice a day), topical anti-inflammatories (Isaderm cream once a day) and ointments to improve the healing (Flamazine, once a day) was started. Re-check in 15 days is recommended.

This meeting was called to review Mondao's management policy due to the fact that since returning to base camp after touring our current management policy had all but broken down and this has resulted in our Defra Circus License being suspended following an unannounced inspection. The reasons for the suspension are as follows.

1. The two reindeer and the camel 'Kachana' were not adequately supervised whilst the public had access to them. The public were allowed unsupervised contact with the camel and were allowed to feed the reindeer and camel unsupervised. As has been made clear to you several times previously in writing, unsupervised access to licensed animals is restricted to authorised persons and any access by the general public requires direct supervision. Given its medical history, we have also required you to maintain additional monitoring of the camel's well-being.
2. The camel 'Kachana' was found to have a hoof condition which had not been seen by a vet and did not appear to be being treated appropriately. It was the view of the inspector that the animal was not fit to be on display.
3. The display enclosures were also found to be inappropriate. The size is smaller than that required in the circus guidance for animals including reindeer. Further, none of the animals on display, given that they appeared to have been on display all day, have been provided with a place to retreat to, out of public gaze.
4. Animals were reported to not be receiving sufficient exercise as they are been kept in the display enclosure for most of the day and the on-site facilities only enable them to have short walks.
5. Care plans did not include any risk assessments for the display work undertaken and individual records did not record the amount of extra food being fed to the animals by the public, which is clearly taking place and being encouraged.

The meeting started with a discussion on why and how the old management policy had broken down and the following were agreed as contributors.

1. The recent death of [REDA which caused great distress to all. 2. [REDA and ${ }_{\text {ntrnin }}^{\text {[REDA }}$ leaving to do Christmas work elsewhere.
2. [REDACTED]
having to undergo a knee operation.
3. Failure to keep the circus licensing panel up to date with any Veterinary problems and treatment.
4. Poor holding conditions at the garden centre.
5. Not enough staff on duty to monitor the animals as required by the license.
6. Failure to have a discussion regarding the similar conditions and defra requirements from last year.
7. Lack of control of the amount of food the animals were receiving from the public.

Immediately following the suspension letter the animals were taken off display and were not in sight or touch of the public, but they continued to stay at the garden centre until a firm staffing plan was put in place. It was decided that Mondeo would not display their licensed animals at the garden centre in the future.

The following is now in place:

1. The baby camel is still at the garden centre but off display and is being looked after by [REDACTED] and [REDACTE who all realise that even if the animal is not on display the conditions of the license for keeping the camel and completing and recording all the necessary paperwork is ongoing. The reason for keeping the camel there is because, where they are housed off display is dryer than the two other holding places and it was decided this would be better for the healing of the camels feet. He does have company day and night with two of the llamas in the day and all the llamas at night.
2. The adult male camel and the reindeer are now at ${ }^{\text {[REDACTED] }}$ [REDACTED]
[REDACTED] anc[REDACTED] are there working between 8.30 am and $4 / 5 \mathrm{pm}$ and Carol visits once a day to oversee the animal's condition. These animals cannot be accessed by the public in any way.
3. The zebra continues to live at Carols home, ${ }^{\text {[REDACTED] }}$
[REDACTED] and is cared for by Carol.
The baby camel had been treated by a vet and his treatment is ongoing but has improved considerably. The Vets reports have been forwarded to defra. However Mondao are still waiting for the Vet who saw the camel initially to return to the practice. The next Vets visit to the baby camel is planned for Monday $21^{\text {st }}$ December, details of which will be sent to defra.

Mondao does have a risk assessment but the inspector obviously did not access it on his inspection it is attached for your attention. This may need updating now.

Future Action in order to comply with the licensing regulations.

1. Regular management staff meetings with updates on all issues so that everyone is up to date with current situations. Actions following meetings have to be passed down to the grooms.
2. Full inspections of the venues holding areas and suitability for each animal prior to their inclusion.
3. Sufficient exercise areas for each animal.
4. Any Veterinary problems to be reported to Defra as they happen.
5. Closer contact with defra.
6. Enough staff to cover each area and species.
7. Regular consulting on current Codes of Practices.
8. Records, risk assessments, etc. kept in such a way every item is visible and available to the Circus Vet Inspectors and to staff and regularly updated.
9. Food intake to be recorded on a daily basis.

The above camel was examined on the $21^{\text {st }}$ of December for a follow up due to a previous skin condition (dermatitis) in all four limbs.

On presentation, the camel was in good body condition. At this point, the mild dermatitis in all four feet that was found in previous visits is almost resolved and the swab results were negative for tingworm.

A continuous treatment consisting of Flamazine twice a day must be followed until the skin has healed completely.

At this moment, the camel is fit to be used in a display. However the current owners (Carol Macmanus and Gracie Timmis) have decided to stop the display until the skin is completely recovered.

## Notice of reinstatement of a licence issued under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012

As you know, following an unannounced inspection on 25 November under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012 (the "Regulations") Defra's Circus Licensing Panel took the decision to suspend your licence, pending further actions from you as notified in our letter of 2 December 2015.

The Circus Licensing Panel confirms that they have received the required notification that the camel 'Kachana' has been seen by a vet, has been treated and is now deemed fit to be displayed again. Also, we accept your undertaking that you will no longer be displaying any of your licensed animals at the Baytree Garden Centre. The Panel also note the new procedures you have agreed to adopt to ensure there is appropriate supervision and monitoring of your licensed animals at all times.

## Decision of the Circus Licensing Panel

The above information has been considered by the Circus Licensing Panel, which has recommended that your licence be reinstated for the remaining period of the licence. The decision to reinstate your licence has been taken on the basis that:

- We are satisfied that the camel 'Kachana' has been seen by a vet and is now fit to be displayed;
- you do not intend to display any of your licensed animals at Baytree Garden centre again during the winter; and
- you have introduced new procedures to ensure your licensed animals will be supervised at all times where the public has access to them.

A copy of the inspection report is now attached for your information. You are reminded that, where an inspection report's use in deciding the status of a licence has been concluded, it is our usual policy to release inspection reports in response to any Freedom of Information request.

You are again reminded that the Secretary of State retains the power to undertake further announced or unannounced inspections during the remaining period of your licence. Additional inspections may also be required in response to changes in your stock list, any complaints received or concerns raised about the wild animals in your circus.

You will usually be charged for the costs of any further inspection visits, once they have taken place.

## Licence Renewal

You are reminded that your current licence is due to expire on 12 March 2016. Given the suspension that has occurred during your current licence, if you wish to continue touring England with wild animals after 12 March we would expect you to have applied for, and received, a new licence before your 2016 touring season begins. As you are aware, it could take up to 6 weeks to issue a renewal, assuming that the paperwork is in order and a satisfactory inspection visit has taken place. A fee of $£ 389.36$ must still be paid when applying for a renewal.

Any new licence application should still be submitted with the reviewed care plans for your animals, as agreed with your lead vet, as set out in my letter of 16 November. In line with the comments by the inspector in his inspection report of 25 November (attached to this letter, in additional notes, at bullet point 6), we would also expect the revised care plans to record what additional actions you will be taking to manage your two male camels. We would also expect to see a revised risk assessment for where the public have access to your licensed animals when not on tour, should you choose to display them at a different winter venue in future.

## Preamble to Inspector's Report*

This was an unannounced visit to the Winter quarters where the circus remains for November,December, January \& part of February.
The two reindeer, which are shedding velvet, are walked over to the garden centre each day, where they are penned, under cover, next to the Mondao,s llamas, \& are in close proximity to the public but behind a stand off barrier. The public hand feed them carrots but cannot touch them.

The young hand reared camel,"Kachana" now 5 months old, is also brought over each morning \& is penned alongside, with two young llamas. However, there is no stand off barrier here \& so the public can not only hand feed him, they can also touch him.
There is no permanent staff presence in this area.
I was told the animals are walked over to the G.C. by authorised persons from Mondao, but was not thjere at the requisite time to observe this. As far as I was made aware or observed, there are no Mondao staff at the GC apart from when they take them to \& fro \& clean them out \& replenish food \& water. The public are "encouraged" to buy carrots at the GC to feed by hand to the reindeer \& young camel. There appears to be no control of quantity or quality, BUT, the animals do not have to eat them all \& ad lib hay is also provided which would be of greater dietary value \& in fairness they do not look overweight. There were no members of the public present during the visit \& as far as I am aware, no records are kept, however signage indicates that the money from carrot sales goes to various named charities \& so there should be records of the amount raised \& hence fed.

The adult male camel "Kashmeire" is kept separated from his son as he has bitten him. He is kept in the main winter quarters \& has a $12 \mathrm{~m} \times 6 \mathrm{~m}$ partly covered area and another outdoor paddock is available. This was not in use at the time of the visit but was adequately fenced \& free of hazards.
The zebra "Zebedee" was not on site. [REDACTED] Macmanus who visits the Bavtree site once or twice/week.

All the paperwork, apart from the daily records were with Carol, as was the drug box.

1. The young camel has dermatitis affecting all four feet with some lesions being open\& inflamed \& causing self trauma (biting). I was informed by [REDACTED] that local treatment with iodine $\&$ hibiscrub was being applied under veterinary direction. However,inspection of his individual record \& discussion with C.Macmanus showed that there had been no veterinary involvement. A verbal instruction was given to C.Macmanus to seek immediate veterinary attention.
2. The public have unsupervised contact with this camel.Apart from this appearing to be in breach of the licence conditions, there must, until tests determine otherwise,be a possibility of a zoonotic transmission eg. of mange or ringworm from the feet via the mouth of the animal to the public, who are encouraged to buy carrots for hand feeding. C.Macmanus was informed that in my opinion the Panel will probably not approve of this situation.
3. The reindeer daytime pen ( 9 am to 5 pm ) in the garden centre measures approx. 54sq.m This is probably less than ideal but they are partly restricted as they are shedding velvet at present. They also get exercise when walked to $\&$ from their night time location, which is approx. the same size \& approx. 200 m away.

The size of the reindeer pen (as last year) is not ideal ( certainly not the 150sq.m in the Guidance, but then neither is the size of the ungulate specified). I was told last year that they would have a common, larger pen with some alpacas once shedding had stopped. (but they were in a different location then \& Carol was not on site this year to comment). They said it was difficult to increase the walking into the car park due to continual traffic $\&$ by the time that had stopped it was dark. They seem aware it is not ideal \& mentioned possibly moving to an alternative site next year. Their feet appear in good condition $\&$ there are no visible skin lesions.

The young camel also returns to the circus compound at night, staying with the young llamas from 5 pm till 10pm \& then goinginto his own stall.
4. Apparently, at the request of the garden centre, the reindeer were walked(on leading reins) over to the opening of "Santa's Grotto". A young girl dropped the carrot she was feeding \& when the reindeer took it off the floor \& then raised its head, the girl was "hit" by the antlers causing the parents to complain. The circus say that this trip will not be repeated.
5. The zebra was inspected at ${ }^{[R E D A C T E D] ~} \&$ found to be in good condition. It has a large grass paddock shared with horses $\&$ there is an excellent stable block for indoor accommodation. The drug box(inside the horse trailer) was also at this location, as were all the records apart from the daily ones.
6.It is recommended that consideration be given, $\&$ recorded in the care plans, as to the future management of the two male camels.
7. The records show that the required 4 vet visits/yr have been made, that there have communications recently eg. re injections for the reindeer \& that the agreed preventative medicines eg. wormers, have been administered. It is obviously very regrettable that there appears to have been no veterinary examination of the camel's feet which raises the question of whether any would have been sought if the unannounced inspection had not taken place.
