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Information request

"I am volunteering at a Citizens Advice Bureau, and as part of my work I attend benefit tribunals with our benefits specialist. As I am also a law student, I undertake some legal research into some of the cases we deal with.

I am currently trying to undertake research into sanctions applied on Jobseekers Allowance. I have found DMG chapter 34 very useful for this. However, I cannot find the cases or legislation used within this guidance. For example, it footnotes 'JSA Regs, reg XX(X)' throughout. However, one cannot find what act this is without the year it was produced; there are many variations of the JSA regulations. I also cannot find the case details for any of the cases cited e.g. R(U) 5/87. I have emailed Lincolns Inn library and I have been told that many of these cases are only available in hard copy, and so this explains why I am not able to find them on your database.

What I would like to know is:

- Which 'JSA Regs' are the DWP referring to in DMG chapter 34 sanctions
- Is there a way to find the cases specifically on DMG chapter 34 (I have already tried using the oscc database)
- Can these cases be used in a tribunal"
