Given the very low number of cases which have been reported to us re. Sharia law and divorces, but the increasing media profile, could we add a sentence to the 'living in' guide (in the section on 'Social ethics and traditions in UAE') – something like:

"You should be aware that the UAE Personal Affairs Law, which is based on Islamic principles, can apply to foreign nationals in child custody and divorce cases."

That would allow me to go back to the journalist to say

"We are aware of a very small number of divorce cases involving British nationals in the UAE where the courts have applied aspects of UAE law which are based on Islamic principles.

The Foreign and Commonwealth Office provides a range of advice for British nationals looking to travel or live overseas. This includes travel advice (designed to alert British nationals to threats) and 'Living In...' guides (which provide a more general view of the customs of a country). Both of these are available for the UAE.

"The Foreign and Commonwealth Office also provides advice on specific types of available consular assistance, such as child abduction, arrest overseas and bereavement. For the UAE, the Foreign and Commonwealth Office has also provided detailed advice on child custody cases.

"All of this information is made publicly available on www.gov.uk.

["We intend to update our 'Living in the UAE' guide to reflect the use of UAE Personal Affairs Law — which is based on Islamic principles - in child custody and divorce cases."]

Hi all,

UAE Personal Affairs Law, which is based on Islamic principles, applies in custody dispute cases. Under Personal Affairs Law, after divorce proceedings take place Muslim mothers keep custody of girls under thirteen years old and boys under eleven years old. After this, custody may be transferred to the father or the father's family if directed by the Sharia court unless the court believes extending the age limit is for the benefit of the child. If the mother is found to be 'incompetent', if her behaviour is considered to be inconsistent with Islamic faith or if she remarries, the courts will decide NOT to award her custody.

With respect to non-Muslims, the law of the child's birth place applies in so far as it does not conflict with federal local laws. Foreign nationals are able to ask for their case to be heard under the law of their country of origin when the case is first presented. But the law of their own country cannot be applied (or used to challenge a verdict) once the case has started in t

Rather than add in new text I suggest we review this information and link it to the "living in" guide so that it is easier for people to find. I'm not aware of any specific information given about divorce proceedings in UAE though. I have copied in who might be able to point us in the right direction.

Hi both,

BBC Asian Network have been in touch. They are looking for a short statement on the use of Sharia law in the UAE by expat husbands looking to get a better deal in the divorce courts. They have been interviewing women who have been affected – some quite badly (e.g. domestic violence, losing custody of their children).

The women have complained that our travel advice doesn't mention the possibility of expats having access to Sharia law, and that some of them wouldn't have moved to the UAE if they'd known.

The key elements they would like us to address in a statement are:
Are we aware of cases where this has happened?
Is this a significant problem/issue?
Are we going to change our travel advice?

I'd also like to take the opportunity to highlight the full range of advice on offer to British nationals living overseas (not just travel advice – also 'living abroad' pamphlet, Post website, Post and FCO social media activity, etc).
