If the zebra were to breed then all the necessary steps would be taken as outlined in the Guidance on the welfare of wild animals in travelling circuses (England) regulations 2012

Contingency Plans for Watusi and Zumba should Watusi be Pregnant

Whilst there is no way for sure of knowing if Watusi is pregnant, other than sedating and scanning her, we have to assume that she is pregnant as Zumba was seen to mount her several times during April 2015. We have no wish to put Watusi through sedation and scanning as we believe this would stress her out unnecessarily. Watusi has put on weight it is true and this would add to the speculation that she may well be pregnant.

At the last defra inspection [REDACTED] MRCVS said Watusi looked like she may be pregnant, also the circus lead Vet [REDACTED] BVCs MRCVS agreed that she did look like she was pregnant. However neither could give a definite yes or no.

However there is a case to assume she may well be having a phantom pregnancy, in a paper by Penzhorn BL, van der Merwe NJ. J Reprod Fertil. 1988 May;83(1):371-5.

Regarding Cape Mountain Zebras it is stated. "Male zebras reach puberty later than domesticated horses. Permanent descent of the testicles occurs between 3 and 5 years of age. Spermatogenesis generally begins around 4 to 5 years of age. However, some colts exhibit studdish behaviour long before they are reproductively viable". So it may well be that Zumba is too young to be reproductively viable.

Female zebras come into season and can get pregnant from 2 years onwards. However there are no signs of Watusi "bagging up" nor are her teats waxing over but again this is not a guaranteed sign that she is not pregnant.

In the absence of any evidence one way or another we are assuming that she may well be pregnant and as such we have prepared some plans to cover all eventualities for both our zebras.

1. Proposed husbandry welfare changes.

To enable both zebras to get used to being separated from each other, although they will be next to each other we have started to house them in adjoining stalls and paddocks. Watusi will sleep in the rice trailer which will be her transportation to and from location to location. Zumba will accompany her but with a partition between them until she is near to foaling when she will be moved to her foaling location.

2. Plans for the foal's birth.

We have several plans for Watusi all of which are dependent on all the 'ifs, ands, and buts of the situation.

If all goes well and she shows definite signs that she is pregnant Plan a or Plan b will happen.

Plan a.

Watusi will be transported back to our winter quarters to her usual winter housing, we will also send a couple of ponies that can be housed close to her so she does not feel alone. She will also be accompanied by a knowledgeable carer who will look after her throughout her foaling. She will travel in the rice trailer.

The Pros of this plan.

Watusi will be in surroundings she knows and is familiar with.

The Cons of this plan.

Watusi may miss the hustle and bustle of the circus day, people coming and going, other animals being led and moved around her, etc and this may stress her.

Plan b.

We have a lifetime friend who runs a Horse Riding and Rescue Centre, he also provides horses and carriages for weddings and funerals. He is [redacted] of [redacted] part of [redacted], [redacted]. [redacted] was a circus man working with lions and tigers and other wild animals including zebras. He also owned his own small circus, [redacted], hence the [redacted] so he would be an A +.

█████ has offered to take in Watusi for her foaling period until she and her foal are able to return to our circus. █████ also has a foaling bay and an equine Vet on hand who is familiar with foaling mares. █████ would pick her up in her own rice trailer and transport her to his premises. If necessary Zumba could also be transported there and kept close by if she shows stressful signs of missing him. However we feel her mind will be on other things.

The Pros of this plan.

The riding centre has plenty of activity and horses, with people coming and going, vehicles bringing rescue horses, horses and carriages moving around all day, so she should not feel isolated.

The Cons of this plan.

█████ does not have a DWA license for the rescue centre. However our plan is to speak to our local council who issued us with our DWA and see if we can get permission to let her stay temporarily with █████. We do this when we move a DWA animal for filming purposes, whereby both councils involved know and approve the temporary situation. We would hope defra would support us on this.

Plan b is our preferred course of action as we feel Watusi would have all the expert care and attention needed for a first time foaling. We would need to assess and guess her 90% into her pregnancy.

Obviously plan a and plan b are plans for an ideal situation, however we also need to plan for the – What ifs:

Plans c.

What if she foals unexpectedly on the show? Obviously this would be against the guidelines of not transporting her during her last 10% of gestation.

If it is at night she will already be separated from Zumba so would not be in danger and the Vet would be called as soon as she was seen. If we feel she is pregnant then we will do a night watch on her but would hope to get her to her foaling location before this can happen.

If it is in the day, obviously she will be seen to start to foal and the Vet called straight away.

If she foals on a Monday she will have the rest of the week before being taken to the farm or to [REDACTED]. If it is later in the week and closer to the circus move we would need a fitness to travel from the Vet and we would take heed of all the Vets advice and instructions.

Should Watusi foal and fail to feed or nurture her foal we would take steps to hand rear the foal, although this is a very rare, practically unknown, occurrence with zebras.

These plans will be updated on a regular basis and may change at any time depending on how Watusi is and how the situation develops.



Peter Jolly has asked me to let you know that as a precaution Jolly's Circus are going to move their female Zebra Watusi to [REDACTED] farm this week, probably Thursday or Friday. The details of [REDACTED] farm are recorded in the Watusi's breeding plan which [REDACTED] sent to you on the 30th March.

Although it is still uncertain that Watusi is pregnant we all feel that it would be best practice to move her to the foaling area at [REDACTED] where an experienced Vet is available 24 hours a day. For company, at the request of the Jollys, [REDACTED] is arranging an aged mare to be in the next box to Watusi so that she will not feel isolated. This mare has foaled several times in her younger days and is very steady in her old age.

Peter sr has been in touch with his local council who issued his DWA and they are in agreement with the plan and like you need to know when the zebra is to move.

As soon as the moving day is confirmed we will let you know safe delivery and arrival and of course, if she is pregnant, safe arrival of the foal, which will be added to Jolly's Stock list.
