Information Paper E14 'Highways and Traffic during Construction – Legislative Provisions'

Information Paper E14 has been extended to provide further clarity on the following topics:

- Ownership of highways to be stopped-up permanently
- Meaning of the term 'temporary stopping up'
- Future highway maintenance responsibilities reference to new Information Paper E28
- Powers to take action against any person depositing mud on a road without lawful authority or excuse (Highways Act 1980, Section 161)
- Application of New Roads and Street Works Act 1991, Sections 54, 55, 64 and 75
- Meaning of the term 'lorry ban orders'
- Recovery of expenses due to extraordinary traffic (Highways Act 1980, Section 59)

Information Paper E28 'Future Highway Maintenance Responsibilities' (1)

New draft Information Paper **E28** 'Future Highway Maintenance Responsibilities' has been approved for discussion with the Highways Subgroup

Key points:

- Describes maintenance responsibility for new highway assets created, or existing highway assets altered, by the HS2 Phase One works
- Covers both roads and public rights of way
- Expands on summary of legislative provisions regarding maintenance of permanent highway works authorised by hybrid Bill, as outlined in Information Paper E14
- Primarily intended as an aid to discussions between nominated undertaker and each highway authority



Information Paper E28 'Future Highway Maintenance Responsibilities' (2)

Provides more detail than given in Information paper E14 on the following topics:

- General hybrid Bill requirement Schedule 4 Part 3 paragraph 14(2)
- List of assets for which highway authority will be responsible for
- Issues specific to overbridges
- Issues specific to viaducts & underbridges
- Issues specific to tunnels
- Winter maintenance
- Maintenance agreements
- Road restraint systems
- Highway maintenance costs
- Possible retention of temporary traffic management measures

Permanent highway works

Hybrid Bill provisions:

- Schedule 4 Highways
 - Part 3 Construction and maintenance of highways
 - Paragraphs 10 and 11
- Schedule 31 Protective provisions
 - Part 1 Highways and traffic
 - Paragraphs 1 to 7
- Certain aspects also covered by Schedule 16 Conditions of deemed planning permission



Schedule 4 – Highways (1)

Part 3 – Construction and maintenance of highways - paragraph 10

- (1) Where under this Act the nominated undertaker—
 - (a) constructs a new highway, or
 - (b) alters a highway, otherwise than by carrying out street works within the meaning of Part 3 of the New Roads and Street Works Act 1991, the construction or alteration must be completed to the reasonable satisfaction of the highway authority.
- (2) Where work mentioned in sub-paragraph (1) has been completed to the reasonable satisfaction of a highway authority, it must certify that fact in writing to the nominated undertaker.
- (3) If the nominated undertaker requests a highway authority to issue a certificate under subparagraph (2) and the highway authority does not before the end of the period of 28 days beginning with the date on which the request was made—
 - (a) issue a certificate under that sub-paragraph, or
 - (b) notify the nominated undertaker of its decision to refuse to issue such a certificate, it is to be treated as having issued such a certificate at the end of that period.
- (4) Any dispute with a highway authority under this paragraph must be referred to arbitration if the parties so agree, but must otherwise be determined by the Secretary of State.



Schedule 4 – Highways (2)

Part 3 — Construction and maintenance of highways - paragraph 11

- (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where under this Act the nominated undertaker—
 - (a) constructs a new highway which is constituted by or comprises a carriageway, or
 - (b) realigns a highway which is constituted by or comprises a carriageway.
- (2) The construction or realignment must be carried out in accordance with plans, sections and specifications approved by the highway authority at the request of the nominated undertaker; and such approval is not to be unreasonably withheld.
- (3) Any dispute with a highway authority under sub-paragraph (2) must be referred to arbitration if the parties so agree, but must otherwise be determined by the Secretary of State.
- (4) If, on application by the nominated undertaker for the approval of plans, sections or specifications under sub-paragraph (2), the highway authority fails to notify the nominated undertaker of its decision on the application before the end of 28 days beginning with the date on which the application was made, it is to be treated as having approved the plans, sections or specifications as submitted.



Schedule 31 – Protective provisions (1)

Part 1 — Highways and traffic - paragraph 1

- (1) The following provisions of this Part have effect, unless otherwise agreed in writing between the nominated undertaker and the highway authority concerned.
- (2) In this Part—

"plans" includes sections and specifications;

"property of the highway authority" means any apparatus of the highway authority affixed to or placed under any highway.

(3) Part 3 of the New Roads and Street Works Act 1991 does not apply in relation to any matter which is regulated by this Part.



Schedule 31 – Protective provisions (2)

Part 1 — Highways and traffic - paragraph 2

Wherever in this Part provision is made with respect to the approval or consent of the highway authority, that approval or consent must be in writing and subject to such reasonable terms and conditions as the highway authority may require, but must not be unreasonably withheld.

Part 1 — Highways and traffic - paragraph 3

In exercising the powers conferred by this Act in relation to any highway the nominated undertaker must—

- (a) have regard to the potential disruption of traffic which may be caused, and
- (b) seek to minimise such disruption so far as is reasonably practicable.



Schedule 31 – Protective provisions (3)

Part 1 — Highways and traffic - paragraph 4

- (1) This paragraph applies to the construction of any tunnel, subway or other structure authorised by this Act under and within 8 metres of the surface of any highway which comprises a carriageway.
- (2) The nominated undertaker must not, without the consent of the highway authority, carry out works to which this paragraph applies except in accordance with plans submitted to, and approved by, the highway authority.
- (3) If, within 28 days after such plans have been submitted, the highway authority has not approved or disapproved them, it is deemed to have approved the plans as submitted.
- (4) This paragraph does not apply to street works within the meaning of Part 3 of the New Roads and Street Works Act 1991..

Part 1 — Highways and traffic - paragraph 5

In the construction of any part of the works to which paragraph 4 applies under a highway no part of it may, except with the consent of the highway authority, be so constructed as to—

- (a) interfere with the provision of proper means of drainage of the surface of the highway, or
- (b) be nearer than two metres to the surface of the highway.



Schedule 31 – Protective provisions (4)

Part 1 — Highways and traffic - paragraph 6

- (1) The provisions of this paragraph have effect in relation to, and in relation to the construction of, any new bridge, or any extension or alteration of an existing bridge, which carries—
 - (a) any part of the works authorised by this Act over a highway, or
 - (b) a highway over any part of those works.

Any such new bridge, or (as the case may be) any bridge so extended or altered, is referred to in this paragraph as "the bridge".

- (2) Before commencing the construction of, or the carrying out of any work in connection with, the bridge which involves interference with a highway, the nominated undertaker must submit to the highway authority for its approval plans, drawings and particulars (in this paragraph referred to as "plans") relating to the work, and the bridge must not be constructed and the works must not be carried out except in accordance with the plans submitted to, and approved by, the highway authority.
- (3) If, within 28 days after the plans have been submitted, the highway authority has not approved or disapproved them, it is to be deemed to have approved the plans as submitted.
- (4) If the bridge carries any part of the works authorised by this Act over any highway—
 - (a) it must be constructed in such manner as to prevent so far as may be reasonably practicable the dripping of water from the bridge, and
 - (b) the highway authority may, at the cost of the nominated undertaker, provide and place such lamps and apparatus as may from time to time be reasonably necessary for efficiently lighting any highway under or in the vicinity of the bridge.



Schedule 31 – Protective provisions (5)

Part 1 — Highways and traffic - paragraph 7

The nominated undertaker must—

(a) secure that so much of the works authorised by this Act as is constructed under any highway must be so designed, constructed and maintained as to carry the appropriate loading recommended for highway bridges by the Secretary of State at the time of construction of the works, and

(b) indemnify the highway authority against, and make good to the highway authority, the expenses which the highway authority may reasonably incur in the maintenance or repair of any highway, or any tunnels, sewers, drains or apparatus in the highway, by reason of non-compliance with the provisions of this paragraph.



Future agenda items

- Content of 'plans, sections and specifications' submissions under Schedule 4, including
 - Technical approval of highway structures
 - Road Safety Audits (stages 2 and 3)
 - Departures from standards

Summary of comments

- 93 individual comments
- Summary of type of comments given in following slides
- Many comments related to issues relevant to all roads, not just rural roads
- Some comments relate to topics proposed to be covered in future agenda items, including:
 - Departures
 - Non-motorised user audits and road safety audits



Rural Road Design Criteria - general

- Aimed at all rural roads that aren't trunk roads or motorways
- Intends to provide a safe, consistent and proportionate approach to help ensure that the character and distinctiveness of such routes is retained as far as is reasonably practical.
- Caters for:
 - high-speed roads (through the adoption of DMRB design standards); and
 - Lower-speed roads (through appropriate design values based on Manual for Streets / Manual for Streets 2)

Status of Rural Road Design Criteria

- Design basis for rural roads
- Hybrid Bill gives the deemed permission to construct the highway which has similarities to outline planning permission
- Schedule 4 requires highway authority approval for new highways and realignments comprising the carriageway.
- Schedule 16 approvals (planning conditions) may also be required for HS2 works, for example, such as earthworks/permanent lighting/sight noise or dust screens which are integral to the design of the highway works. But this would not capture the technical approval of the 'highway' itself.

Local design considerations

- Rural Road Design Criteria gives requirements and guidance applicable for all rural roads designed to that design basis.
- Local factors can be taken into account as part of Schedule 4 (paragraph 10/11) plans and specification submission.



Pavement design life

- Design life for permanent pavements 20 years
 - Consistent with HD26/o6 for less heavily-traffic roads
- Design life for temporary works
 - Consider amending based on comments received



Fencing

- Fencing adjacent to highway typically accommodation fencing (landowner's)
- HS2 security fencing provided for security of railway



Width

- Single-track roads
 - Considering greater guidance about applicability of when single-track versus two-lane roads
- Two-lane roads should generally match existing, subject to minimum width of 5.5m to allow for two cars to pass in safety at low speed
- Hardstrips considering amending to allow hardstrips where required for continuity



Structures

- Overbridges and underbridges with singletrack roads
 - 5.5m wide carriageway (between kerbs), with road markings to give a centred 3.5m running lane, to discourage unsafe overtaking.
- Verges considering amending to give additional clarity about verges continuing through structures
- Clearance to abnormal height routes



Alignment

- Source of values
 - DMRB higher-speed roads
 - Manual for Streets / Manual for Streets 2 lower-speed roads
- Comments about consistency of different elements of alignment (horizontal alignment, vertical alignment, superelevation, etc.) at design speeds of 50km/hr and 60km/hr
- Additional guidance proposed for:
 - Determining design speed in the absence of 85th percentile data
 - Calculating the length of transitions for low-speed roads



Junctions

- Ghost-islands not available as an option for low-speed roads
 - Considering amending to allow this option where appropriate



Kerbs and drainage

- Provision of kerbing on rural roads
 - Planning authorities are expected to show an interest in avoiding kerbing on rural roads
- Avoid specification of proprietary systems for gullies in running carriageway



Road restraint system and road lighting

- Assessment for need of road restraint system
 - RRRAP versus risk assessment process
- New road lighting systems
 - Consider environment and safety
 - Only where economically justified
