CC budget 2013-14 - £21.4m

= c. **50% real terms** cut since 2007.

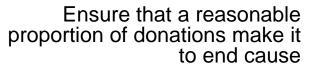

Q Which one, if any, of these qualities is most important to your trust and confidence in charities overall?



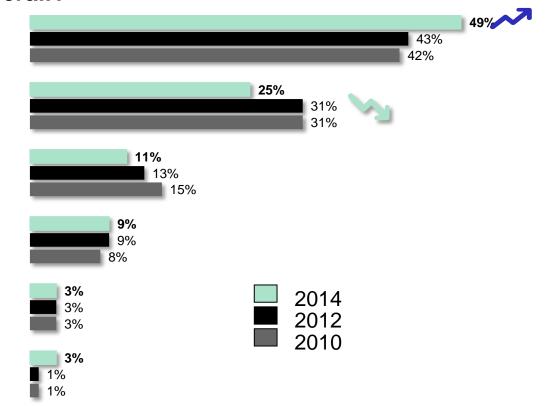

Key figures 2013-14



Registrations

6,661 applications to register (16% > than last year)

4,968 registration applications approved

1,331 CIOs registered

Incoming traffic to First Contact

146,700 calls, emails letters (94% resolved in FC)

1,280 reports of serious incidents

86 whistleblowing reports

672 FOI requests (dealt with by business assurance team)

Operations cases

2,752 new cases (of which 1,865 compliance)

3,054 cases concluded

Investigations & Enforcement



- 64 charities placed under inquiry (15 in 2012-13)
- 540 use of legal powers in investigative work (216 in 2012-13)
- 1,633 number of formal exchanges of information with other agencies
- Proactive alerts e.g. recent alert on reporting serious incidents.

More proactive approach



Operations / registrations

- New operations monitoring team
- 318 referrals, including **89** from registrations (betw. October 2013 & April 2014)

Accounts monitoring

- Casework related and themed accounts reviews
- 1,664 sets of accounts reviewed

Smarter, more focused guidance

- Clearer focus on expectations of trustees
- E.g. new Conflicts of Interest guidance

Annual Returns and Accounts-Defaulters Work



- New initiative announced at public meeting last year
- 115 charities have now gone through the process
- 58 entered the class Inquiry and 43 have now fully complied
- £47m of charitable funds now publicly accounted for
- Response from defaulters much better
- Sector compliance on time is high (86%)

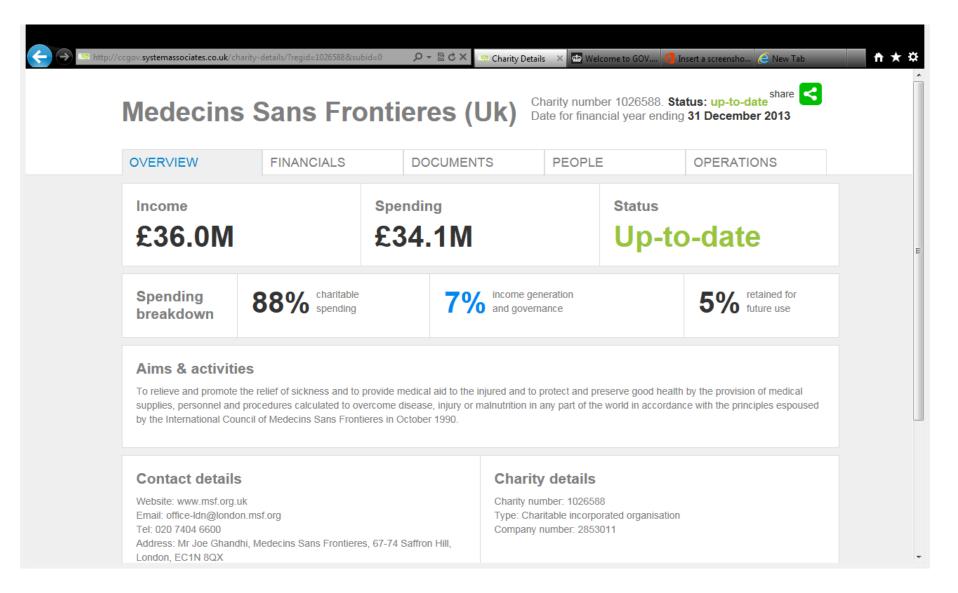
