#### **Background information**

#### Jobseeker's Allowance

Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA) was introduced on 7 October 1996. It replaced Unemployment Benefit and Income Support for unemployed people and brought them together in a unified benefit with two routes of entry. It can be claimed by people who are available for and actively seeking employment, including those in remunerative work for less than 16 hours a week on average, and by people on a government training scheme.

#### The effect of Lone Parent obligations

From 24 November 2008 Lone Parents (LPs) with a youngest child aged 12 or over were no longer able to make a new or repeat claim for Income Support (IS) solely on the basis of their parental status. Existing IS LPs with a youngest child aged 12 or over had their eligibility removed over a period of time commencing 2 March 2009. From October 2009 this policy was extended to LPs with a youngest child aged 10 or 11 and from October 2010 the policy was extended to LPs with a youngest child aged seven or over. Subject to the passage of the Welfare Reform Bill, lone parents will be eligible to claim Income Support until their youngest child is five years old.

#### Identification of Lone Parents claiming JSA

The preferred source of numbers on JSA is the Claimant Count which is produced on a monthly basis by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) via the NOMIS website (<u>www.nomisweb.co.uk</u>). DWP are providing a breakdown of this headline number so we can identify the number of Lone Parents claiming JSA following the roll out of Lone Parent Obligations. This is done using marital status information from the Claimant Count data alongside HMRC Child Benefit data. Specifically looking at whether a JSA claimant has their marital status recorded as "single"; "widowed"; "divorced" or "separated", and has an open Child Benefit claim for at least one child aged under 16, at the 'count date' (second Thursday of the month).

#### Data sources:

- ONS Claimant Count data
- HMRC Child Benefit data
- DWP ethnicity data.

#### **Data lags**

The figures are produced one month in arrears compared to the ONS Claimant Count. This is because additional processing is required in order to identify Lone Parents.

#### Coverage

All cases in Great Britain excluding clerical cases.

#### Caveats

The figures potentially undercount the number of Lone Parents in receipt of JSA where the claimant is recorded as having an open Child Benefit claim at the count date but their marital status is not recorded and this cannot be inputed.

Differences between DWP JSA statistics and ONS Claimant Count statistics Both the ONS Claimant Count and DWP 100 per cent JSA data are measures of the numbers of people claiming JSA, however there are differences in the statistics published from these two sources.
