What has happened to income inequality in the UK in the last 40 years? What are the likely causes of these changes?

DWP response

Income inequality is measured by the GINI co-efficient; which ranges from zero (everybody has identical incomes) to 100 percent (when all income goes to only one person).

The ONS report 'The effects of Taxes and Benefits on Household Income, 2011/12' gives changes in income inequality in the UK between 1977 and 2011/12, as well as some of the potential causes of these changes. This can be found on pages 17-18 of the report.

A more detailed analysis of changes to income inequality between 1980 and 2009/10 is provided in the report '<u>The effects of taxes and benefits on</u> household income, 1980-2009/10'.
