The management and staff make considerable effort to fully comply with the current requirements and are receptive to constructive advice to ensure ongoing compliance. The records are clear and are in a standard format in use by the Circus Association to which they belong.

Records appear up to date, clearly completed and safely stored. General management and staff competence appears good.

I was not able to see complete evidence of the lead vet CPD, although relevant information is available, which indicates adequate CPD for most of the species held i.e. Hoofed stock, canidae etc. The operator was advised to ensure that evidence of CPD in the reptile species held will be available at the next inspection. Veterinary records were detailed and comprehensive and indicated ongoing care for the all species held.

Temperature and humidity for the snakes were both in line with recommended levels and confirmed by records.

Items for attention:

- 1. The Ankole is tagged and intradermally tested for TB twice yearly. This is recorded by the operator in the animal's record and now countersigned by the veterinary surgeon carrying out the test. This should be completed following each test.
- 2. The next routine veterinary visit will be carried out during the tour season 2015.
- 3. There is now an additional reindeer in the group. When on tour these are housed and grazed separately from the other hoofed stock. It should be ensured that the outdoor enclosure area adequately meets the requirements recommended under the guidance and should be extended if so required to meet this.

Application for a licence under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012

As you know, following your application for a renewed licence under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012, an inspection took place on 9 February 2015.

Decision of the Circus Licensing Panel

In summary, the inspector found that your circus was complying satisfactorily with the circus licensing regime and that your circus should continue to be licensed.

The inspectors' findings have been considered by a panel of officials on behalf of the Secretary of State, who have recommended that a licence be issued to you for the period of twelve months from 20 March 2015. A copy of the licence is enclosed with this letter.

A copy of the inspection report is also attached for your information. As you are aware, where an inspection report has been used in deciding the status of a licence, and no further matters are pending, it is our policy to release the report in response to any Freedom of Information request.

Further inspections

During the twelve-month period of your licence, there will be at least two further inspections. An inspector will be in touch with you during the year to arrange at least one of these inspections. There will also be at least one inspection that will be arranged without your prior knowledge. During these unannounced inspections, you will be expected to cooperate fully with the inspector as you would for any announced inspection. The inspector will provide identification on request and you will be able to contact us on the above number (during office hours) to confirm the identity of the inspector should you wish. A refusal to allow an inspector to inspect premises during one of these unannounced

inspections would be treated as a failed inspection which could result in your licence being suspended or revoked.

As has been indicated previously, you will also be charged for the costs of these further inspection visits, once they have taken place.
