INDEPENDENT CONSULTANCY - NEW COMMISSIONS

Dear Ms Swinson,

The Committee has considered your application to join an advisory group for an academic research project on shared parental leave, which has been set up by a researcher at University College London. It is an unpaid and part-time role (involving one meeting every 8 months or so plus occasional emails over the course of 3 years).

The Committee has also considered your proposal to deliver training workshops on diversity in the workplace for the InclusIQ Institute, a company that delivers games-based diversity training. This is a paid piece of work to deliver two training workshops initially, though it could lead to further projects.

The Committee notes that 16 months have now lapsed since you left Ministerial office.

The Committee agrees that these commissions are permissible within the terms of your independent consultancy.

The conditions that apply to your independent consultancy are:

- you should not draw on (disclose or use for the benefit of yourself or the organisation to which this advice refers) privileged information available to you from your time in Government;
- for two years from your last day in ministerial office, you should not become personally involved in lobbying the UK Government on behalf of your clients or those you advise;
- once you have received approval to set up as an independent consultant, you must seek confirmation from the **Committee directly** that each subsequent <u>individual commission</u> is permissible under the terms of your consultancy before taking it up. If, after enquiry, the Committee takes the view that a commission is, or may be, outside the terms of the consultancy you will be expected to submit a fresh application.

As you know, the Business Appointment Rules explain that the restriction on lobbying means that former Ministers should not engage in communication with Government – including Ministers, special advisers and officials – with a view to influencing a Government decision or policy [including

applications for awards or grants] in relation to their own interests, or the interests of the organisation by which they are employed, or to whom they are contracted".

I should be grateful if you would let me know when you take up these commissions, or if it is announced that you are to do so. Once the commissions have been publicly announced or taken up, we will publish this letter on the Committee's website and include the main details of the commissions, together with the Advisory Committee's advice, in the regularly updated consolidated list on our website and in the next annual report.
