Application for a licence under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012

Thank you for your application for a licence under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012 received in this office on 6th January 2017.

The tour itinerary included with your application indicates that you intend to perform at "Baytree" between 10th and 19th February. In Marc Casale's letter dated 2nd March 2016 it was made clear that in our opinion "the Baytree garden centre site, as presently constituted does not meet the guidelines for a touring, winter quarters or retirement site". The letter also stated that "If you intend to visit that site again, you will either need to remove your animals from your circus for the duration of your circus being at that site, or ensure that the site meets the required licensing conditions. The latter would require the site to be inspected again by Defra before the animals could be used in performance or display".

Therefore please can you confirm as soon as possible whether you will be touring at Baytree without your licensed animals or are expecting us to arrange a special inspection of Baytree after your renewal inspection at your winter quarters for your 2017 licence. You should be aware that this special inspection will be an extra inspection in addition to the normal three inspections undertaken under the regulations. As usual, you will be charged for this further inspection visit, once it has taken place.

Next steps

While waiting for the above confirmations, we propose to proceed to the next step in your application. We have appointed [REDACTED] as the inspector to undertake the necessary first inspection of your premises. The purpose of this inspection is to allow you to demonstrate that the required licensing conditions would be complied with. You will be charged for the cost of this inspection once it has taken place. A successful inspection must be completed and paid for before we can issue you with a licence.

The inspector will make contact with you shortly, either by phone or email, to arrange a mutually convenient time to undertake the inspection.

As you know, the findings of the inspection will then be considered by a panel of officials on behalf of the Secretary of State. Based on the findings, the panel will recommend whether you will be issued with a licence or whether further work on your application first needs to be undertaken. Please be aware that any further work may require a further inspection, for which you will be charged, before a licence can be issued.

Dear Circus Panel

Thank you for your letters regarding our winter inspection. We would like to clear up what seems to be some sort of confusion regarding the difference between a winter quarters and a touring site. After the incident at Baytree Garden Centre when we were using it as our winter quarters we agreed with you after our licence was reinstated that we would not use that site again as a winter quarters and have since housed our animals at our now permanent quarters at our homes. We intend to keep to our commitment on not using Baytree as a winter quarters ever again.

Our licensed animals will now start their summer season at our next site which is Kirton Boston.

With regards to our winter inspection we understand from your letter that [REDACTED] is to inspect and we understand this is to be the 26th January, although we have not been advised officially of this date nor has [REDACTED] been in touch. Perhaps you could confirm this please?

Please note our fields, just like the fields of other animal collections with hoof stock, are muddy, [REDACTED] has commented to us before during inspections about muddy fields with regards to grazing and dry areas and we do feel nervous about this upcoming inspection regarding this issue so want to let you know beforehand. Are animals winter feed is monitored and they are fed independently regardless of any grazing available. Also we do have inside areas where the animals can get away from any inclement weather and as we have no control on the weather we wish to make it clear that we do pay particular attention to the feet/hooves of our animals at all times.

As usual we are happy to work with DEFRA regarding all aspects of the licensing regulations and look forward to your reply.

Thank you for your e-mail.

Firstly, it might be helpful if I explained that, as stated in my last letter (11/01/2017), it was made clear that in our opinion “the Baytree garden centre site, as presently constituted does not meet the guidelines for a **touring, winter quarters or retirement site**”. Your licence was renewed last year based on the understanding that, if you wished to tour with your animals at Baytree again, we would need to inspect that site before you started performing with your licensed animals there. However, we note that you have now confirmed that you will not be using your licensed animals at Baytree this year. I would be grateful if you could also confirm that your licensed animals will remain at your winter quarters while your circus is at Baytree.

I can confirm that [REDACTED] will be conducting your licence renewal inspection on Thursday 26th January. Please accept my apologies for the short notice.

As you know, the findings of this inspection will then be considered by a panel of officials on behalf of the Secretary of State. Based on the findings, the panel will recommend whether you will be issued with a licence or whether further work on your application first needs to be undertaken. To Whom it may concern,

I, the undersigned, confirm that I visited and inspected the 2 camels and 2 reindeer belonging to Circus Mondao on Tuesday 15th November 2016.

Adolescent male camel ('Kachana'),

This animal was in excellent physical condition. He has previously been suffering significant bouts of watery diarrhoea which has seemed intractable to treatment, (worming, anti-coccidial treatments and dietary changes / supplements). However, he produced normal faeces at the time of inspection and the owner reports this is the case the majority of the time now. It seems most likely that the previous diarrhoea problems were caused by the difficulties in hand rearing an orphaned camel and consequent challenges in achieving a balanced intestinal flora. He has previously had some problems with his feet but today the soles, inter-digital spaces and dorsal aspects were normal, with no sign of disease. At the time of inspection, this animal was housed in a large weather-proof field shelter with free access to a grass paddocked area of suitable size.

Adult male camel, ('Kashmir').

This animal was also in excellent physical condition with firm erect humps. He was housed at the time of inspection in a large weather-proof field shelter with free access to a large grassed paddock.

The camels shared the field shelter. A physical barrier in the form of a rigid mesh metal grid separated the field shelter evenly between them. This serves the purpose of allowing these animals to be within sight and sound of their own kind without risking injury caused by potential conflict between 2 entire males. The accommodation was clean, comfortable and appropriate.

The proprietors have been made aware of some stereotypic behaviour in the form of 'weaving'. I have never observed this behaviour during any of my previous inspections. On further questioning it is apparent that Kashmir has exhibited this behaviour at a low level ever since he was acquired several years ago. It is the opinion of the owners that Kashmir came with this behaviour. The most likely times for Kashmir to weave have been identified as those just before housing and feeding. However, he certainly does not weave every time before these events, and it is not considered that the weaving has worsened over time. Any weaving event is short lived. This appears to be a low grade 'background' problem which although needing monitoring is not a cause for major concern at present. A recording system will be added to his care plan to objectively measure the times this behaviour is observed. This will initiate further discussion at subsequent inspections and an action plan will be put in place if deemed necessary. It is highly unlikely that we can stop this behaviour but measuring it in some way will allow us to gain a better understanding of the frequency and timing of these events. It is possible that the major triggers for this behaviour relate to social interactions and / or paddock size. Both are catered for here – he is not lonely, his environment is stimulating and his paddock / range of grazing offered is suitable.

Adult male Reindeer, ('Naughty' and 'Nice')

Both animals were in excellent physical condition. During the summer 'Naughty' has had repeated treatments for a presumed tooth root abscess on his left hand side. There was no swelling today and he was noted to be eating normally.

We had a discussion regarding the future management of the antlers. Historically testosterone injections have been administered in January to mimic the natural surge seen at rutting time. The sudden fall in levels a few weeks later has usually allowed the antlers to be gently knocked off. However the reindeer became very aggressive both to each other and to the handlers this year which has prompted us to reconsider the approach to this. We plan to saw the antlers off under sedation and local anaesthetic in January instead. We will also examine 'Naughty's oral cavity more closely with the benefit of sedation with a view to potentially radiographing the area to check for any tooth remnants etc.

Both animals were again demonstrating evidence of pruritus manifesting as nibbling – especially the ventrum and upper legs. They had previously been treated in September with Dectomax and Carol confirmed that they seemed to improve although never actually completely cleared up. Hair plucks and coat brushings demonstrated the presence of live mites. I have prescribed dectomax treatments for both to be repeated after 2 weeks. All possible other contacts are to be treated with ivermectin pour on and repeated at 2 weeks. I will repeat the hair plucks within the next month.

At the time of inspection, both animals were accommodated in an open shelter, (hay store), with access to plenty of grazing.
