### The Importation of Animals Order 1977

The Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, by this licence issued under Article 3 of the Importation of Animals Order 1977, hereby authorises the landing in England, in accordance with the conditions set out below, of

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This licence is valid until varied or revoked by the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs.

# Conditions

- 1. Each consignment of pigs must be accompanied by an official health certificate, signed by an authorised veterinary officer appointed by the Government of Jersey or Bailiwick of Guernsey giving the:
  - i) Name and address of the consignor and consignee;
  - Name and address of the holding of origin (and if appropriate the approval number of the approved collection centre in Jersey or Bailiwick of Guernsey - if the centre is the premises of origin);
  - iii) Name and address of destination;
  - iv) Breed, age, and official identification number of each pig; and
  - v) Authorisation number of transporter, a description of the means of transport, and registration number of the vehicle in which the animals were transported.
- 2. The health certificate referred to in paragraph 1 above, must confirm that:
  - i) The animals were inspected by the Official Veterinarian during the 24 hours prior to the scheduled departure of the animals from Jersey or Bailiwick of Guernsey and did not show clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease at that time;
  - ii) The pigs are not animals which are to be destroyed under a programme to eradicate contagious or infectious disease;
  - iii) The holding of origin and, where applicable, the approved collection centre and the area in which they are situated, are not subject to any prohibitions or restrictions connected with any animal disease affecting porcine animals, in conformity with Community or national legislation;
  - iv) The animals did not remain in the assembly centre for more than 6 days;
  - v) The animals are fit to be transported in accordance with Council Regulation (EC) 1/2005;
  - vi) The pigs to be moved have originated from a holding where:
    - a) they have been continuously resident for at least the last 30 days prior to loading or since birth and;
    - b) no animal imported from a third country was introduced into the holding of origin during the 30 period, unless it was isolated from all other animals on the holding
  - vii) A declaration was received from the exporter stating that the pigs:
    - a) will be moved from the premises of origin/the assembly centre directly to the destination named in the accompanying health certificate;
    - b) will be in vehicles/containers which had been thoroughly cleansed and disinfected beforehand with disinfectant approved for the purpose by the Government of Jersey or Bailiwick of Guernsey.
    - c) have not been vaccinated against Aujeszky's Disease.
- 3. The shipment of all animals must be direct from Jersey or Bailiwick of Guernsey to England. In the case of animals for slaughter, they must be shipped direct from Jersey or Bailiwick of Guernsey to the slaughterhouse of destination.
- 4. After leaving the premises of origin, the pigs must be kept separate from animals of a lower/different health status and/or while in transit will come into contact with animals not similarly certified.
- 5. The importer shall give the local Animal Health and Veterinary Laboratories Agency (AHVLA) office responsible for the area of destination advance notification of the expected time of arrival of each consignment in writing, and at least 24 hours advance notification of the expected time of arrival of each consignment.
- 6. The consignment must comply with Animal Transport Welfare requirements in accordance with Council Regulation (EC) 1/2005

- 7. The health certification must accompany each consignment to its final destination and the original or a copy must be retained by the premises or establishment of destination for a minimum period of three years for presentation to an inspector on request.
- 8. Pigs from Jersey or Bailiwick of Guernsey that are destined for or enter Great Britain via a port or airport in Scotland or Wales should be imported under the terms of a licence issued by the Scottish Government Rural Directorate or the Welsh Assembly Government Rural Affairs Department as appropriate.
- 9. Vehicles being used to transport the animals must be cleansed and disinfected as above as soon as possible after unloading and before carriage of other animals (unless the same consignment is reloaded after a stop for welfare purposes).

### Notes

1. All landings of pigs in England shall be in accordance with the provisions of the Importation of Animals Order 1977, the requirements of Council Regulation 1/2005 on the protection of animals during transport and the provisions of this licence.

2. Once the animals arrive in England, the movement from the port or airport must also meet the requirements of the Disease Control (England) Order 2003 as amended or any legislation superseding or amending the same. #### Caution

Any breach of any conditions attached to this licence will constitute an offence under the Animal Health Act 1981, Section 73. The penalty on conviction of an offence under this section is a maximum of six months imprisonment and/or a £5000 fine.
