REQUEST FOR INFORMATION: Cost of the National Noise Attitude Survey 2012

Thank you for your request for information, which we received on 26 January 2015, about the total cost of the National Noise Attitude Survey 2012. As you know, we have handled your request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

Noise is a serious issue for many people in the UK, generating significant economic costs. Road traffic noise alone is estimated to cost the English economy at least £7-10 billion a year.

The National Noise Attitude Survey (NNAS) 2012 was a major face-to-face survey, designed to be representative of the UK population. Over 2700 people were interviewed about their attitudes to environmental, neighbour and neighbourhood noise and the impact it has on them. This includes noise from transportation sources, noise from inside and outside other people's homes, and noise arising from within the community, such as industrial and entertainment premises. The last survey of this kind was conducted in 2000 and the 2012 survey was also designed to examine changes over the last decade. The survey helps to inform government noise policy and particularly in understanding the potential impacts of noise.

Defra spent £460,063 in total on the National Noise Attitude Survey 2012. This included the sample design, questionnaire design, survey and fieldwork costs, analysis of a large dataset and peer review. The project value stated on the website¹ where the survey is published reflects costs for the main contractor responsible for the survey and fieldwork, and not for the work of other contactors. This main contractor was competitively tendered through a framework contract held by the then Central Office of Information and represented best value for money from the bids received.
