Syndromic surveillance national summary:

Reporting week: 11 to 17 April 2016

During week 15 there were continued decreases in a range of respiratory indicators across all systems including GP consultations for influenza-like illness and emergency department attendances for pneumonia. Activity remains slightly higher than expected for the time of year, however is now approaching expected levels.

Remote Health Advice:

NHS 111 cold/flu, cough, fever and difficulty breathing calls all continued to decrease during week 15 (figures 2-5): calls are now at, or only slightly above, seasonally expected levels.

GP In Hours:

GP consultations for influenza-like illness continued to decrease during week 15, across all age groups and regions (figures 2, 2a & 2b). Activity is still higher than expected, however is now approaching seasonally expected levels.

There were also decreases across a range of other respiratory indicators during week 15.

Emergency Department:

During week 15 there were further decreases across a number of respiratory indicators including acute respiratory infection, influenza-like illness and pneumonia (figures 8, 12 & 13). Levels are now approaching those expected for the time of year.

GP Out of Hours:

During week 15 there was a continued decrease in the total number of GP out of hours consultations (figure 1). GP out of hours consultations for acute respiratory infection and influenza-like illness also continued to decrease and are now approaching levels expected for the time of year (figures 2 & 3).

Syndromic surveillance systems

Remote Health Advice

A remote health advice syndromic surveillance system that monitors syndromic calls from remote health advice services e.g. NHS 111 each day across England

GP In-Hours Syndromic Surveillance System

A large UK-based general practitioner surveillance system monitoring daily consultations for a range of clinical syndromic indicators

Emergency Department Syndromic Surveillance System (EDSSS)

A sentinel ED network across England monitoring daily attendances and presenting symptoms/diagnoses

GP Out-of-Hours Syndromic Surveillance System (GPOOHS)

A syndromic surveillance system monitoring daily GP out-of hours activity and unscheduled care across England using a range of clinical syndromic indicators

RCGP Weekly Returns Service (RCGP WRS)

A sentinel GP surveillance network covering England and Wales monitoring weekly consultations for a range of clinical indicators. This surveillance system is coordinated by the RCGP Research and Surveillance Centre
