3.	Definition of Service	This service provides for the safe, decent and lawful external movement and supervision of prisoners. It also effects the orders of the court in relation to transfer to and from establishments for court appearances. It supports effective court operations and medical interventions including the use of technology, such as video link appearances and Telemedicine consultations. The intention is to minimise operational risk, improve prisoners' experiences, provide cost improvements and support establishment regime delivery.
		This service supports and helps deliver population strategies, as well as supporting and helping deliver national and regional healthcare initiatives and delivery, together with access to facilities and services in the community. Prisoners are not to be exposed to undue public interest or embarrassment while on external movements.
		This service supports the duty of care to staff, members of the public, prisoners and stakeholders in relation to the safe and secure provision of external movements and court appearances. This accounts for the increased risks presented when prisoners enter the wider community setting. This service supports the maintenance of security, safety, order and control whilst conducting external movements of prisoners. It requires staff to act in accordance with their 'Powers of a Constable' when delivering this service.

7.	Strategic Context	There are occasions when prisoners are required to be taken outside the secure environment of the prison and during such instances it is essential they remain in secure custody at all times.
		Any movement of a prisoner outside of an establishment is considered an increased security risk and such movements should, therefore, be minimised as far as operationally possible. External movements may also incur additional costs to the establishment, Clinical Commissioning Groups, police or other stakeholders. Arrangements are made for prisoners to have access to services in the community and outside clinical services where it is considered more effective.
		The External Movements & Appearances (EMAA) service also enables other judicial and operational requirements, including:
		Productions at court
		Inter-prison transfers
		Funerals
		Visits to dying relatives
		Weddings/civil ceremonies
		The external movement of prisoners who are not approved for release on temporary licence (ROTL) is

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facilitated by a security escort, comprising a minimum complement of two staff with restraints applied in all but exceptional circumstances, having first been subject to a routine risk assessment.

#### **PECS**

The first generation of Prison Escort and Custody Services (PECS) contracts ran from 1999 following the passing of the Criminal Justice Act 1991, which permitted the private sector to undertake transportation and care of prisoners during escort. The third generation contracts commenced in 2011. The contract length is seven years with an option of extending by a further three years. The contracts are flexible and are designed to cope with variations in demand and the configuration of the supported justice sites. They also account for fluctuations caused by seasonal, geographical and other external factors.

The service was previously organised into a court escort service based on four geographical areas in England and Wales, together with a further, separate national Inter-Prison Transfer contract. The revised contract merges these services into one integrated service yielding various economic and operational efficiencies to meet the needs and requirements of the Ministry of Justice (MoJ).

The service is also a key factor in helping manage the prison population by moving prisoners around the estate to provide the level of security they require and that is suitable for their gender, age and legal status and to locations that provide activities and programmes, which are appropriate to the prisoner needs; for example, offender behaviour courses required to help reduce their risk of re-offending. Additionally, the service also plays a key factor in moving prisoners around the estate under the Government's Transforming Rehabilitation agenda

The introduction of Video Link technology has reduced risk and cost and improved the overall experience for prisoners. Facilitating meetings, appearances and appointments by means of video-link removes the need for prisoners to leave the secure confines of a prison, enhancing security. Each external movement avoided through the use of video-link technology also brings a substantial cost avoidance benefit to the organisation. NOMS is committed to maximising the use of video conferencing in line with the wider CJS efficiency programme agenda.

The PECS court escort contract plays a key role in ensuring prison capacity is used effectively by enabling transfers of prisoners between establishments to manage the national population as efficiently and effectively as possible.

#### Concordat

The Concordat between NOMS and the NHS Counter Fraud and Security Management Service entitled 'Prisoner - Escort and Bed Watch Function' is intended to provide a framework for prisoner escort and 'bed watch' functions. It will be used locally by the NHS Local Security Management Service (LSMS) and the sending establishments. The Concordant identifies the specific risks resulting from the need for prisoners to access medical treatment in a hospital environment. It also addresses those medical

		Additionally, in 2012, HMIP commenced a new inspection programme of court custody facilities. The focus is on the care and treatment of those detained, during the escort and at the court, to ensure they are safe, secure and able to participate fully in court proceedings. The HMIP 'Court Custody Expectations' which describe the standards of treatment and conditions expected at each court custody suite, endorse the areas of inspection.
		There are a number of HMIP expectations/measurements surrounding external movement and court appearances of prisoners ensuring their treatment is safe, legal and decent. HMIP expects prisoners should understand why they are being transferred, taken for medical treatments or produced at court (for further details, see HMIP 'Prison Expectations').

		Concordat between the NOMS & NHS Counter Fraud and Security Management Service
		• Requires a fresh risk assessment to be conducted each time it is reviewed in order to establish: the level of restraints to be used during transportation to and from the hospital and the level of restraints to be used during the prisoner's stay in hospital.
		Requires that each decision is properly considered taking account of all relevant information and be proportionate to the risks involved.
		Deems the restraining by handcuffs of a prisoner receiving chemotherapy (and, by implication, other life saving treatment) degrading. Such restraint would be likely also to be regarded as inhumane unless justified by other relevant considerations.
		Makes the distinction between the risk of escape (and the risk to the public in the event of an escape) posed by a prisoner when fit, and those risks posed by the same prisoner when suffering from a serious medical condition. Medical opinion regarding the prisoner's ability to escape must therefore be considered as part of the assessment process.
