## Reporting week: 18 July to 24 July 2016

There were increases in heat/sun stroke and insect bites during week 29 across all systems, followed by decreases to expected levels, in line with the warm weather.

**Remote Health  
Advice:**

Heat/sun stroke and insect bite calls increased further during week 29 (figures 10, 10a, & 11, 11a). Fever calls in the children increased slightly during week 29 (figures 3 & 3a) in line with the warm weather.

**GP In Hours:**

During week 29 there was an increase in GP consultations for heat/ sunstroke, peaking on Wednesday 20 July, in line with the warm weather (figure 22). Consultations have since decreased to seasonally expected levels.

**Emergency  
Department:**

Heat/ sunstroke attendances increased and peaked during week 29, in line with the warm weather (figure 22).

**GP Out of Hours:**

GP consultations for heatstroke peaked midweek during week 29, in line with the warm weather (figure 11).

Contacts for respiratory indicators, including acute respiratory infections and difficulty breathing/ wheeze/ asthma, decreased during week 29 (figures 2-5).

## Syndromic surveillance systems

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### Remote Health Advice

*A remote health advice syndromic surveillance system that monitors syndromic calls from remote health advice services e.g. NHS 111 each day across England*

### GP In-Hours Syndromic Surveillance System

*A large UK-based general practitioner surveillance system monitoring daily consultations for a range of clinical syndromic indicators*

### Emergency Department Syndromic Surveillance System (EDSSS)

*A sentinel ED network across England monitoring daily attendances and presenting symptoms/diagnoses*

### GP Out-of-Hours Syndromic Surveillance System (GPOOHS)

*A syndromic surveillance system monitoring daily GP out-of hours activity and unscheduled care across England using a range of clinical syndromic indicators*

### RCGP Weekly Returns Service (RCGP WRS)

*A sentinel GP surveillance network covering England and Wales monitoring weekly consultations for a range of clinical indicators. This surveillance system is coordinated by the RCGP Research and Surveillance Centre*
