## **REQUEST FOR INFORMATION: NEONICOTINOID INSECTICIDES**

Thank you for your request for information, which we received on 6 October 2015, about communications regarding the pesticide group neonicotinoids between Defra Ministers or Defra's Permanent Secretary and the National Farmers Union, Syngenta or Bayer from 11 May 2015 to the date of your request (on 6 October 2015). We apologize for the delay in replying to you, which was due to an administrative oversight.

We have handled your request under the Environmental Information Regulations 2004 (EIRs). The EIRs apply to requests for environmental information, which is a broad category of information defined in regulation 2 of the EIRs. Public authorities are required to handle requests for environmental information under the EIRs. They give similar access rights to the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

We can confirm that Defra does not hold any letters, emails, faxes or telephone calls between Defra Ministers and the Permanent Secretary with the National Farmers Union (NFU), Syngenta or Bayer concerning neonicotinoid insecticides between the dates specified. This information is therefore exempt under regulation 12(4)(a) of the EIRs, which relates to information which is not held at the time when an applicant's request is received. Regulation 12(4)(a) is a qualified exception, which usually means that a public authority is required to conduct a public interest test to determine whether or not information should be disclosed or withheld. However, the Information Commissioner, who is the independent regulator for requests made under the EIRs, takes the view that a public interest test in cases where the information is not held would serve no useful purpose. Therefore, in line with the Information Commissioner's view, Defra has not conducted a public interest test in this case.

We can confirm that there has been one meeting between the Permanent Secretary and the NFU, held on 30 June 2015, where neonicotinoid insecticides were discussed (amongst a large number of other issues). No minutes were taken and, as indicated in the above paragraph, no correspondence or other communications relating to this meeting is held by Defra.


