Report on: Report of the Technology Assurance Committee meeting on 10 December 2015

Background:

1. The Chair of Technology Assurance Committee (TAC) is required to report on its work to the Board after every meeting of the Committee. This report highlights the key issues considered by the Committee.

Issues:

TAC update

2. TAC members noted the report, which provided an update on developments in Information Services since the last TAC meeting. There had been significant progress in working through the 'hump' in new projects and a shift from 'enablers' to data analytics. The implications of the flexible working policy were also discussed. The importance of resolving issues around type 2 objections to the use of patient level data was emphasised.

Integration update

3. The Chief Information Officer introduced the report, which provided an overview of the ongoing work to facilitate the integration of Monitor, the NHS Trust Development Authority and some NHS England functions into NHS Improvement. TAC members underlined the importance of obtaining the funding required to proceed with key capital projects to ensure a successful integration and to enable NHS Improvement to meet the expectations placed on it – in particular in regard to improved financial performance in the provider sector. The need to develop a critical path programme plan, and to be clear about the implications of missing milestones, was highlighted.

The role of NHS Improvement in delivering benefits to the sector through technology enabled change

4. The expectation that NHS Improvement will deliver benefits to the sector through technology-enabled change (with the Health and Social Care Information Centre and NHS England) was underlined. TAC members noted the report, which outlined plans to use technology to improve the performance of the NHS. The Chief Information Officer provided an overview of the negotiations that had taken place and that are still ongoing. The importance of securing the funding required to underpin the high expectations now being placed on NHS Improvement to drive performance improvement across the provider universe was underlined.

Cyber security

5. TAC members noted the report, and NHS Improvement's central role in ensuring NHS provider organisations play their part in improving cyber security. The importance of improved cyber security and good information governance in creating the climate in which patients will allow the sharing of their information so as to permit better care – and better management of the care system – was underlined.
