Dear Sir,

Thank you for your letter, dated 6<sup>th</sup> July 2016, concerning the redetermination of the applications for the proposed Hlaerbrynnaie and Corrwild Wen wind turbine generating stations.

Since I am now 91 years of age, to write to you at all about environmental matters is to risk indiscriminate brutal by media by those who have a financial axe to grind or who consider old people to be irrelevant. However, after fifty years of still continuing research into brain activity, there exists a record of work which is willed to the Wellcome Trust (please see attached letter) so nil desperandum.

There are local rumours that already invested money is the cause of the redetermination of these applications. One senses that the validity of any argument by those who may profit financially from the imposition of wind turbines on the Welsh Uplands, might be said to be dubious. The beauty and serenity of the hills, the songs inspired by them, belong to the people of Wales and not to developers wishing to develop a windfarm landscape.

Concerning the adequacy of environmental information and the possibility of conflict, I have written in the past about the development of the Hlaerbrynnaie to Talerddig road. It is never wise to allow a build up of anger and frustration in an apparently powerless local community.

Rather than bounties in supplied, artistic montages, perhaps your safest path before coming to any decision would be to walk in the Welsh Uplands.

I am very sorry that it has taken so long for us to get back to you. However, we have now heard back from Professors and and discussed your papers at our Departmental acquisitions meeting. As a result I am now able to inform you that in principle we should indeed be interested in housing your papers here in due course.

There are a number of points which we discuss with potential donors and depositors, embodied in the transfer form which I enclose (please note that this is only an example for reference, and should not be completed), and I particularly draw your attention to the following issues.

The first of these is whether the material in question is being presented as a gift to the Wellcome Library, or whether it is only being deposited, in which case some guarantee of the permanence of the arrangement would be expected.

We would normally provide photocopies/photographs for private research subject to our usual conditions (i.e. contingent upon the physical condition of the material, and in the case of photocopies, an upper limit of 100 exposures per reader per year). In the case, however, of researchers wishing to publish material we need to have the copyright position clarified: if copyright is not assigned to us, we shall need a contact address for the person who would be handling requests.

Please note that we undertake to ensure that we are in compliance with the 1998 Data Protection Act by imposing restrictions on sensitive material such as medical details of living persons.

In the normal process of cataloguing collections we weed out any duplicate items, or ephemeral/routine materials; this can be held for review by the donor/depositor if required. However, if review is not specified, such materials will be disposed of.

Please do let me know if you have any comments or questions on the above or any particular points you would wish to incorporate into a transfer agreement.
