The buildings shown in the report will make no difference to the detectability of the turbines. The radar antenna is on a tower 7.7 m agl which is a similar height to the buildings giving it a clear LOS to the proposed turbines.

Hi

Please see the attached report from Aviatice challenging our objection to a three turbine development at Hill of Lychrobbie (DIO 19464).

In the first instance the report suggests that shielding may be provided by buildings on the Lossiemouth site itself. It goes on to point out that there are existing turbines, which we have assessed as being detectable, where the radar beam passes over those buildings, and suggests that the detectability of the Lychrobbie turbines might be determined with reference to the actual detectability of these other turbines.

I would suggest that the first step in dealing with this query would be to establish whether the buildings in question are likely to provide any shielding. If they are, end of problem.

If we think that the turbines will still be detectable, despite the buildings, we might then want to consider whether we want to look at the actual detectability of Buchfruch, Dunbeath and Upper Scaerel which, the report claims are similarly blocked from the radar by the buildings. Before I pass this request to I Gp, could you advise on whether there would be anything to be gained from such an exercise?

Paragraphs 3.9 and 3.10 seem to be raising operational questions (Why are we objecting to Lychrobbie when we have not recently objected to other detectable turbines in the vicinity?) so I will address these to I Gp if and when this becomes necessary.
