We are after the number of adverse sanctions decisions in Newcastle in 2011 and 2012.

Freedom of Information request 2013-2754

I now would like to request the following, for the years 2011 and 2012, for (1) Newcastle Upon Tyne and (2) nationally:

- 1. The average length of an adverse sanction period
- 2. How many were sanctioned -
- two to four weeks
- 5 to 15 weeks
- 16 to 26 weeks
- -higher than 26?

This would give us a proportion of the numbers you have already given us

- 3. Do you know how many of those were appealed to the independent tribunal service?
- 4. And how many of those appeals were completely successful?
- 5. How much in total (in pounds) Jobseekers Allowance was removed from claimants due to adverse sanctions?
- 6. For the total numbers of adverse sanctions (that you previously gave in response to FOI 2013-1723), can you say how many were under 25 and how many were 25 or over.

Freedom of Information request 2013-2754

In response to questions 1, 2 and 5;

We can confirm that the Department does hold some information on the duration of JSA sanctions (the term sanction has been used here to mean both sanctions and disallowances). This includes the date the sanction was applied but we do not hold readily available information on the actual length.

To provide an answer would require us to combine data on multiple sanctions and overlapping decisions accounting for differences in dates (e.g. when a claim ends during a sanction; when a sanction is reserved for application against a future JSA claim; when circumstances change during or after a sanction). We would also need this information to calculate how much was 'removed' from claimants due to the application of a sanction.

We therefore estimate that the cost of complying with this part of your request would exceed the appropriate limit of £600. The appropriate limit has been specified in regulations and for central Government it is set at £600. This represents the estimated cost of one person spending 3½ working days in determining whether the Department holds the information, and locating, retrieving and extracting the information. Under section 12 of the Freedom of Information Act the Department is not obliged to comply with this part of your request and we will not be processing it further.

- 2. The number of sanctions applied is the number of Varied⁷, Fixed Length⁸ and Entitlement Decision⁹ sanction referrals where the decision was found against the claimant.
- 3. The decision to apply a sanction can be overturned (Non-adverse decision) following reconsideration or appeal by the Sector Decision Maker.
- 4. **Month:** The month in which the decision on the sanction referral, reconsideration or appeal was made. The year 2012 only includes data up to and including the 31st of May, which this is the latest data available by Local Authority.
- 5. **Local Authority:** Local Authorities are assigned by matching postcodes against the relevant postcode directory.
- 6. **Age:** Age of claimant is calculated at the date the referral for a decision was made.
- 7. Varied Length sanctions: A sanction of between 1 week and 26 weeks is imposed for leaving employment voluntarily without just cause, refusing employment without good cause, or losing employment through misconduct. The actual period in each case is at the discretion of the Adjudication Officer who makes the decision.
- 8. **Fixed Length sanctions:** A sanction of between 1 week and 26 weeks is imposed for refusal, without good cause, to attend an employment programme or carry out a Jobseeker's Direction. Payment of benefit continues in full pending the Adjudication Officer's decision on a sanction question.
- 9. Entitlement Decisions: These are questions on which entitlement to JSA depends. For example, if there is doubt around whether the Jobseeker's agreement (JSAg) is suitable, whether they are actively looking for work or making themselves available for work. In most cases payment of JSA will be suspended by benefit processing until the doubt is resolved.

- 1. Access the DWP Tabulation Tool via the link above.
- Under Sanctions and disallowances select Before 22 October 2012
 JSA sanction and disallowances.

- 3. Under the Benefit/Scheme drop down, select **Referrals where a** decision has been made for varied length sanctions (by number of referrals).
- 4. In the Analysis option select (**Thousands**).
- 5. In the Row option select **Time Series**.
- 6. In the Column option select **Reason for referral where appealed**.
- 7. If you only wish to know the number of appeals, in the Subset option select **NONE**. Otherwise, if you wish to know the number of *successful* appeals, select **Whether a decision was Adverse**.
- 8. In the following Subset option select Non Adverse.
- Finally, in the Date option select October 2012 which is the latest available data at national level. Then click Get Table to retrieve your statistics.

You will need to repeat this process both for fixed length sanctions and entitlement decisions by changing the type of sanction in step 3 above. The total of these three tables will give you the overall sanctions figure for Great Britain.
