Routine inspection under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012

As you know, an announced inspection of your travelling circus took place on 30 September 2016 under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012 (the "Regulations").

Decision of the Circus Licensing Panel

In summary, the inspector found that current compliance is satisfactory.

As before, a copy of the inspection report is now attached for your information. You are reminded that, where an inspection report's use in deciding the status of a licence has been concluded, it is our usual policy to release inspection reports in response to any Freedom of Information request.

The inspector's findings have been considered by a panel of officials on behalf of the Secretary of State (the "Panel"), who were satisfied that at the time of the visit the conditions of the Regulations appeared to be being complied with and who have recommended that your current licence is allowed to continue.

While the inspector was satisfied that all of the licence conditions are being met by your circus, the Panel did note the inspector's comment that your stocklist was not up-to-date. The Panel recognise that you had kept Defra/APHA informed about the euthanasia of your Zebra, Zebedee, but would be grateful if you could now supply to Defra/APHA an updated stocklist by **20 October**.

Further Inspections

This inspection completes the schedule of inspections planned for your circus for your current licence. However, I would remind you that the Secretary of State retains the power to undertake further announced or unannounced inspections during the remaining period of your licence. Additional inspections may also be required in response to changes in your stock list, any complaints received or concerns raised about the wild animals in your circus.

You will usually be charged for the costs of any further inspection visits, once they have taken place.

Licence Renewal

Your current licence is due to expire on 12 March 2017. If you wish to continue touring England with wild animals after 12 March we would advise you to renew your licence in good time, ideally before the start of your next touring season. As with your original application it could take up to 6 weeks to issue a renewal, assuming that the paperwork is in order and a visit can be arranged. A fee of £389.36 must still be paid when applying for a renewal.

Preamble to Inspector's Report*

This visit is an announced touring inspection, carried out by the nominated inspector and accompanied by Animal health Officer, APHA.

The circus is operating under a current valid license.

The Circus Management and staff provided all necessary details and access to areas during the inspection.

The information supplied prior to the inspection was verified and found to be correct apart from the removal from the stock list of the aged Zebra [Defra/APHA were aware of this]. The relevant animals to be inspected were: 2 neutered male reindeer, 1 male adult and one young, Bactrian camel. The young camel had been microchipped for identification following normal procedures and the chip reading tallied with that supplied on the stock list

At the time of the inspection the Circus was located at a Farm-based site used as a car boot site, close to a major traffic intersection close to Silsden, Yorkshire The site was on a large level grassed field with parking for cars adjacent and a substantial area for outdoor grazing available. At the time of the inspection the site was well drained with easy access.

PERFORMANCE NOTES:

- 1. Camel and pony rides are offered prior to the performance and at the interval for about 20-25 minutes in each case. These are at walking pace only, supervised by category A personnel and with two category B personnel to each animal- one leading and the other supporting the rider.
- 2. Domestic species performances are mainly horses and are basic dressage manoeuvres or simple turns and pedestal stands. Each performance a maximum of 5 minutes. Other acts included llamas...
- 3. The male adult camel appears in one part of the show which involves a parade round the ring at walking pace. Total time approx 2-3 minutes. At no time did the animal exhibit any signs of distress.
- 4. In the parade which takes place in the early part of the show the Camel, reindeer, and other non licensable species parade around the ring at walking pace. Approx time as above 2-3 minutes. All licensed

The management and staff are now familiar with the inspection process and fully comply with the current requirements and are receptive to constructive advice to ensure ongoing compliance. Records appear up to date, clearly completed and safely stored. General management and staff competence appears good. The standard of maintenance of infrastructure is high with all wagons and animal quarters being in very good condition and fit for purpose. Animals appear well cared for and content, No coercion of animals in performance was noted and in my opinion no animal was subjected to uneccessary stress or any other matter which would compromise welfare. The use of licensed animals in the performance is of very short duration and involves only walking around the ring in the initial parade and the use of the adult male camel for rides prior to the performance and at

1. The young camel is in good health and now well up to size and weight for his age. It has not always been possible to weigh the animal as he is now of a size that he cannot be lifted by one person and requires a large weighing apparatus to weigh. The operators have introduced a weight estimation method using a horse tape and the equine formula, which although not totally accurate for other species does indicate any changes in the approximated range. This shows a steady gain for the young camel and stable weights for the other animals measured. I am satisfied that current progress is good.
