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Chapter 2:

Holliwell Farm to Bradwell Power Station

England Coast Path: Burnham-on-Crouch to Maldon - Natural England's Proposals



Part 2.1: Introduction

Start Point: : Holliwell Farm (grid reference: TR 016 957)

End Point: Bradwell Power Station (grid reference: TL 998 088)

Relevant Maps: 2a to 2k

Understanding the proposals and accompanying maps:

The Trail:

- 2.1.1 Generally follows existing walked routes, including public rights of way, along most of this length.
- 2.1.2 Mainly follows the coastline quite closely and maintains good views of the sea.
- 2.1.3 This part of the coast includes the following sites, designated for nature conservation or heritage preservation (See map C and C2 of the Overview):
 - Essex Estuaries Special Area of Conservation (SAC)
 - Dengie (Mid-Essex Coast Phase 1) Special Protection Area (SPA)
 - Dengie (Mid-Essex Coast Phase 1) Ramsar site
 - Dengie Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) for its wildlife, habitat and geomorphological interest
 - Blackwater, Crouch, Roach and Colne Estuaries Marine Conservation Zone (MCZ)
 - Outer Thames Estuary Special Protection Area (SPA)
 - Outer Thames Estuary Special Protection Area (SPA) proposed extension area
 - World War II pillbox 98om south east of Holliwell Farm, Scheduled Ancient Monument (SAM)
 - Saxon Shore fort and Anglo-Saxon monastery at Bradwell-on-Sea, Scheduled Ancient Monument (SAM).

We have assessed the potential impacts of access along the proposed route (and over the associated spreading room described below) on the features for which the affected land is designated and on any which are protected in their own right.

2.1.4 With input from specialists we have considered each of the sites involved and the relevant designations and concluded that for this section of the coast our proposals will not have a detrimental effect.

In reaching this conclusion we have identified a requirement to provide appropriate signage at key locations to explain the importance of these habitats and to encourage people to stay on the trail.

In relation to those nature conservation sites listed above, refer to our published Access and Sensitive Features Appraisal for more information.

Accessibility:

2.1.5 Generally, there are few artificial barriers to accessibility on the proposed route, which makes use of existing surface paths wherever these meet the criteria in the Coastal Access Scheme.

However, there are places where it may not be entirely suitable for people with reduced mobility because:

- South of the Chapel of St Peter-on-the-Wall, Bradwell at intersection of BCM-2-So13 and BCM-2-So14 it is necessary to descend/ascend the grassy flood bank
- North of the Chapel of St Peter-on-the-Wall, Bradwell BCM-2-So17 it is necessary to descend/ascend a short flight of steps

Where we have proposed exercising our discretion:

The discretions referred to below are explained in more detail in the Overview.

- 2.1.6 Estuary: This report proposes that the trail should contain sections aligned on the estuary of the rivers Crouch and Blackwater, extending upstream from the open coast. See part 5 of the Overview. The trail covered by this chapter includes part of this estuary route on both the rivers Crouch and Blackwater.
- 2.1.7 Landward boundary of the coastal margin: We have used our discretion on some sections of the route to map the landward extent of the coastal margin to an adjacent physical boundary such as a fence line, pavement or track to make the extent of the new access rights clearer. See Table 2.2.1 below.
- 2.1.8 At BCM-2-Soo1 to BCM-2-So13, BCM-2-So18 and BCM-2-So21 to BCM-2-So25 we have used this discretion to limit the landward extent of the coastal margin to the landward top edge of the seawall, or low concrete wall at the rear top of the seawall. This has had the effect of reducing the amount of coastal margin that would have otherwise been available by default. This option provides the most clarity because:
 - The break in slope provides an easily identifiable boundary for access users.
 - There is no clear boundary feature at the bottom of the seawall that could mark the boundary of the coastal margin.

- 2.1.9 Restrictions and/or exclusions: We have proposed to exclude access by direction under the Countryside and Rights of Way Act (2000) in certain places along this section of coast. For details of these directions, see 2.3.6 in the Formal Proposals Section of this chapter and Part 10 of the Overview.
- 2.1.10 Access rights to the spreading room would be subject to the national restrictions on coastal access rights listed in Annex D of the Overview. These restrictions would not apply to public rights of way.

Establishment and ongoing management of the trail

- 2.1.11 Some physical establishment of the trail would be necessary, in accordance with the general approach described in part 7 the Overview.
 - New interpretation panels will be added at sections BCM-2-So18 and BCM-2-So23; and
 - Minor repairs to the steps on section BCM-2-So17
- 2.1.12 Ongoing management and maintenance would be necessary in accordance with the general approach described in part 8 of the Overview.

Future Change:

2.1.13 At the time of preparing the report, we do not foresee any need for future changes to the access provisions proposed for the length of coast described in this chapter.

Formal Proposals - Holliwell Farm to Bradwell Power Station

Discretion to include an estuary

2.3.1 Natural England proposes to exercise its functions as if the sea included the estuarial waters of the River Crouch as far as Burnham-on-Crouch and River Blackwater as far as Promenade Park in Maldon as indicated by the extent of the trail shown on maps 1a and 6e.

Proposed route of the trail

2.3.2 The route is to be at the centre of the line shown on maps 2a to 2k as the proposed route of the pavement, and with the landward edge of the top of the sea wall shown as the trail on map1a.

Landward boundary of coastal margin

- 2.3.3 Adjacent to route sections BCM-2-Soo2, BCM-2-Soo3, BCM-2-Soo9, BCM-2-So21 and BCM-2-So22 the landward boundary of the coastal margin is to coincide with the low concrete wall at the rear top of the seawall which is landward of the public footpath shown as the trail on maps 2b, 2c, 2g and 2i.
- 2.3.4 Adjacent to route section BCM-2-So₁₇ the landward boundary of the coastal margin is to coincide with the hand rail which is landward of the steps on the existing walking line shown as the trail on map 2i.
- 2.3.5 Adjacent to route sections BCM-2-Soo1, BCM-2-Soo4 to BCM-2-Soo8, BCM-2-So10 to BCM-2-So13, BCM-2-So18, and BCM-2-So23 to BCM-2-o25 the landward boundary of the coastal margin is to coincide with the landward edge of the top of the sea wall shown as the trail on maps 2a, 2c to 2k.

Local restrictions and exclusions

- 2.3.6 Natural England proposes to exclude access relevant to this length of coast, as follows:
 - Access is to be excluded all year-round to all areas of intertidal mudflats and salt marsh on this length of coast, adjacent to route sections BCM-2-Soo1 to BCM-2-So25. This exclusion is proposed under s25A of the Countryside and Rights of Way Act (2000) as the land is unsuitable for public access. This exclusion will not affect the route itself and does not apply to any land that could be considered to be excepted. See maps J to P in the Overview for details.
 - Access is to be excluded during the Ringed Plover breeding season in the coastal margin on the cockle shell beach between Coate Outfall and Shell Bank, route section BCM-2-Soo3. This is proposed under s26 of the Act as it will prevent impact through trampling and direct disturbance of Ringed Plover nesting sites. This exclusion will not affect the route itself and does not apply to any land that could be considered to be excepted. See map D in the Overview for details.


Alternative routes

2.3.7 There are no proposals for alternative routes in relation to this length of coast.



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
Map 2a Holliwell Farm to Deal Hall





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
Map 2b Deal Hall to Shell Bank





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
Map 2c Shell Bank to Bridgewick





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
Map 2d Bridgewick to Round Barn






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Map 2e Round Barn to Howe Outfall




Map 2f Howe Outfall to Marshhouse





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
Map 2g Marshhouse to Glebe Outfall





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
Map 2h Glebe Outfall to Eastlands


Map 2i Eastlands to Sales Point
