

SHARED FUTURES

1. The United Kingdom and France enjoy the linguistic, cultural and individual ties that bind our societies closely together and we commit to strengthen and adapt those ties so that future generations can continue this friendship.
2. To launch a renewed approach to partnerships, we will:
 - Support the identification of **new partnerships**, including several that have been agreed in recent months;
 - Host a **summit of mayors and other leaders of city regions**, and take forward a programme of engagement between mayoral combined authority officers in the United Kingdom and their counterparts in France; and
 - Take forward a **Data Innovation Twinning Initiative** with activities including workshops and small bilateral projects between city-based groups in both countries. This will enable innovative work that has provided benefits in one city to be tested in a partner city.
3. To support education and social mobility, we will:
 - Expand opportunities for **mobility and links** through a new government to government framework; provide new impetus to the teaching and learning of each other's languages; and deepen cooperation and exchanges between policy makers, practitioners and institutions in school education, apprenticeships and skills and higher education;
 - Share lessons on getting school-aged girls interested in **cyber**, drawing on the United Kingdom's CyberFirst Girls competition, including through a potential joint girls challenge, and share best practice in relation to the United Kingdom Cyber Schools Programme, and exploring the identification of a small group of talented, socially diverse students to join summer camps; and
 - Support exchange of our young people through a revitalised **Entente Cordiale** programme for Masters students and the recently launched **Young Leaders Programme**.
4. To celebrate our experience hosting major sporting events and our world-class arts and museums, we agree to:
 - Sign a 'Declaration of Intention' on Sports Cooperation;
 - Highlight our commitment to cultural protection through the United Kingdom Cultural Protection Fund and ALIPH Fund and will take forward a joint initiative on cultural protection to safeguard cultural heritage around the world, both in conflict zones and where it is at risk from natural causes;

To celebrate our shared cultural history, we have agreed that the United Kingdom will hold a bilateral season of culture, based on the reciprocal exchange of masterpieces and intense cultural exchanges. In this context, we have agreed a loan of the Bayeux Tapestry to the United Kingdom, during the refurbishment of its permanent home in Bayeux and before the opening of the future Center for the Interpretation of Middle Age Europe of Bayeux in 2023, provided that the legal requirements and the scientific conditions of restoration and conservation have been met.

- Support the Normandy Memorial Trust in their work to build a Memorial in Ver-sur-Mer in honour of the 61,715 British servicemen and women who took part in the D-Day operations. The President and Prime Minister will together attend the inauguration of the project in June 2019 as part of the commemorations to mark the 75th Anniversary of the operation.
