Thank you for your email of 22 August 2017 requesting the following information:

"In view of the fact that in the next year over a hundred Marmoset monkeys will be killed at Porton Down and over a 1000 other animals. I would be most grateful if I could have an appointment with you in the near future to discuss the use of animals at Porton Down. Porton Down is using chemical and biological weapons to kill these poor monkeys. Maybe we could meet in the House of Commons or the Ministry of Defence, Whitehall, London. I know you are a kind and compassionate man who like animals.

I would be most grateful if you could tell me how many Marmoset monkeys are being kept in Porton Down as of today date, 22nd Aug 2017".

We are treating your correspondence as a request for information under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

A search for the information has now been completed within the Ministry of Defence, and we can confirm that all the information in scope of your request is held.

The information you have requested can be found below.

Dstl is proud of its work to develop and create battle-winning technology and protection equipment for UK Armed Forces and Government through the best use of science and technology. The remit for Dstl to provide safe and effective protective measures for the UK and its Armed Forces against the threat posed by chemical and biological weapons and to enhance the treatment of conventional casualties on the battlefield could not currently be achieved without the use of animals.

Dstl returns the numbers of procedures (experiments) involving animals to the Home Office on an annual basis. All Dstl's animal research fully complies with UK legislation and is regulated by the Home Office. Dstl Porton operates in accordance with the principles of Replacement, Reduction and Refinement (3 Rs) and has an active programme to increase their implementation by exploring the use of alternatives in order to reduce the requirement for animals in experiments.

On 22 August 2017, Dstl was holding a total of 347 marmosets at Dstl Porton Down.

With regards to your request for an appointment to discuss animal experimentation with the Rt Hon Sir Michael Fallon MP, this is not standard procedure. In the first instance, we would suggest that you engage with your constituency MP on the matters that concern you.
