




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


Year 2 procurement overview



Contract value: up to £200,000.00

- One report detailing recommendations for the development of mechanisms to permit the correct functioning of the Clean Energy Certificates market in Mexico for Mexican regulators (CENACE).
 - -Revision of current situation of Clean Energy Certificates market
 - -Determination of needs and characteristics of market with CFNACF

Evaluation of potential mechanisms drawing on international experience and best practices

Write up and presentation of recommendations for CENACE

- ii. One report outlining possible financial and contractual mechanisms for the HVDC in partnership with relevant Mexican regulators (SENER/CRE)
 - -Documentation detailing regulatory framework for HDVCs
 - -Determination of needs and characteristics of HDVC market
 - -Evaluation of potential financial and contractual mechanisms
 - -Write up and presentation of recommendations for SENER and CRE
- iii. One road map outlining steps to improve energy efficiency in transport and fuel for transport (CONUEE)

 - -Design of schedule, content and launch event for oil and gas leadership programme.

One report to include detailed information of the current capabilities of the local supply chain with a particular focus on Tier 2-Tier 4 companies, both Mexican and foreign (with operations in Mexico). The report should include the specific sub-sectors in which each company operates and the relevant contact details of the company.

- **One workshop** to present the report findings to the UK supply chain and other relevant stakeholders.
 - -Design of work plan and organisation of workshop in close consultation with DIT

 - -Presentation of report to British Embassy and UK companies

1 ODA contract for Financial Mechanisms covering FinTech and Green Finance.

Contract value: up to £140,000.00

Lot 1: FinTech

i) One quantitatively heavy report on the potential impact of Open Banking in Mexico.

Focus areas:

- -Economic growth, financial inclusion, and gender equality in Mexico.
- -<u>Commercial benefits</u> derived from the creation of value through disruptive business models in the financial services sector; as well as creation of added value for traditional financial institutions.
- -Current <u>needs of the Mexican ecosystem</u> for the adoption, implementation and use of the OBS and other FinTech related technologies (e.g. Blockchain).

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Lot 1: FinTech (Cont.)

<u>ii) One pilot boot camp on open and big data</u> to be delivered to at least 8 start-ups in Mexico City, to strengthen the evidence base for Open Data <u>in Financial Services</u> policy making.

We expect the pilot to include weekly workshops, regular mentoring, additional capacity building and acceleration activities, and a demo-day event organisation.

<u>iii) Delivery of up to two capacity building workshops</u> on FinTech for policy makers and legislators to be delivered to at least 30 attendees in Mexico City.

The workshops should cover Open Data, Big Data, Open Banking Standards, Virtual Assets, Crowd-funding, E-payments and the Regulatory Sandbox





Lot 1: FinTech (Cont.)

iv) Development of <u>one</u> <u>roadmap</u> for the adoption of an Open Banking Standard (OBS) in Mexico, including an assessment of the <u>current situation</u>, key <u>risks</u> and <u>constraints</u>, regional implications (with a particular focus on <u>NAFTA</u>, <u>MILA</u>, and the <u>EU's Revised Payment Service Directive - PSD2</u>) and next steps and concrete actions for implementation of the roadmap to achieve <u>adoption</u> of a <u>competitive OBS in Mexico</u>, and <u>v) Coordination and delivery of one event to present the project results</u> to at least 50 relevant high level stakeholders in Mexico City.

Lot 2: Green Finance

vi) An adaptation methodology for the CBI low carbon building standards in Mexico, a vii) Production of a training guide to cover Mexico Carbon Market readiness.





Lot 2: Green Finance (Cont.)

<u>viii) One report</u> to cover: Mexico Green Bonds Market Outlook 2017/2018; Mexico's local government policy instruments for Emissions Trading review; Clean Energy Certificates secondary market projections for 2018-2025, and public private finance enhancement options for public transport in Mexico.

ix) Events and communications coordination to include: a Climate Finance Advisory webpage, the 2018 edition of the Green Bonds Mexico conference, an event on the International Perspectives on Clean Energy Certificates, and a Carbon Market Simulation closing event

1 ODA contract covering Security and Justice and Anticorruption

Contract value: up to £266,000.00

Lot 1: Security and Justice

- i) One <u>scoping paper</u> on investigative police trainings (at federal and state levels) and problems detected on their implementation.
- ii) One integrated <u>training programme proposal</u>, on <u>criminal</u> investigation from <u>operational</u> to <u>tactical</u> and <u>strategic</u> levels range, focusing on the investigation of serious crimes.
- iv) One <u>four-day mission</u> from the UK to Mexico to exchange <u>best</u> <u>practices.</u>
- iii) One <u>two-day seminar</u>, including the participation of two British experts, to present the findings and the training programme proposal.

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Lot 1: Security and Justice

- v) One <u>in-depth report</u> on the impact of the Community Policing model in General Escobedo, Nuevo León and Morelia, Michoacán, recommendations and an action plan to strengthen the training programme for *community policing* officers.
- vi) A <u>one-day seminar</u>, including the participation of one international expert, to present the findings and the training programme proposal to the government .
- vii) One <u>four-day mission</u> from Mexico to the UK to exchange best practices.
- viii) A final report of the project implementation





Lot 2: Anti- Corruption

- i) A <u>peer to peer review mechanism</u> according to the National Anti-Corruption System.
- <u>ii) Two in-depth reports</u>, (1) reviewing existing government systems that have to be linked to the National Digital Platform and (2) recommendations and action plan to develop a beneficial ownership registry that complies with GAFI and effectively uses the already existing government registries.
- iii) One <u>bilateral mission</u> to the UK to share best practices on anticorruption.

The suggested areas are customs and contractual mechanisms in the energy sector. These manuals should include international, including UK s best practices related to the Bribery Act is recommended.

Contract 1: Infrastructure and Mobility

Contract value: up to £220,000.00

- One report containing an assessment or baseline of Mexican and international standards for the implementation of Building Information Modelling (BIM)
 - -Identify BIM's baseline in Mexico and analysis of international best practices and the upcoming ISO on BIM
 - -Analysis of the implementation of BIM in Mexico
 - -Gap analysis of standards in Mexico and internationally
 - -Recommendations in consultation with industry, the Federal Government, UK BIM Task-group and BSI



To be tendered: Future Cities

Contract 1: Infrastructure and Mobility (Cont.)

- ii) One roadmap of a National low emission vehicles strategy for Mexico
 - -Analysis, design and development for a National low emission vehicles strategy in Mexico
 - -Plan for implementation of the strategy in key states and/or cities
- **One detailed plan** for the implementation of urban sustainable mobility projects and its financing mechanisms (i.e. green bonds) in key Mexican cities.
 - -Identification of 5 cities, structure transport projects and financing mechanisms and implement workshops
- **One detailed plan** for the improvement of development of Mexican Cities specifically focusing on the Transport Oriented Development methodology.





1 ODA contract for Digitalisation covering Digital Governance.

Contract 2: Digitalisation

Contract value: up to £75,000.00

- One report outlining how to implement Big Data and Artificial Intelligence skills in Mexico
 - -Recommendations on how to promote and implement a national policy on digital skills on Big Data and AI in Mexico
 - -A regional analysis on what states and stakeholders are developing on Big Data and AI in Mexico
- ii. One case study on how to implement Big Data and AI skills in a Mexican city.
 - -Partner with key institutions to foster a dialogueon how to use digital skills on Big Data and AI to promote economic development
 - -Select a key element to focus the case study in a city



To be tendered: Future Cities

Contract 2: Digitalisation (Cont.)

- iii. One report on how to implement a Digital Governance strategy at a National level in Mexico
 - -Design and organise a visit to the UK of key stakeholders in the digital sector for chosen Mexican government officials, parliamentarians and civil society
- iv. <u>Launch of one pilot project</u> to support the digitalisation programme of the Ministry of Economy, Commercial Regulation Unit
 - -Identify a joint pilot using Big Data agreed by the Ministry of Economy, Commercial Regulation Unit and the Embassy -Implement pilot project with close supervision from the Ministry of Economy, Commercial Regulation Unit (Unidad de Normatividad Mercantil) and the Embassy





Monitoring, Reporting, Evaluation and Learning

- •Implementers are in charge of **base-lining**, **collecting** and **reporting data** (subject to discussions on detail with the overall programme MREL team).
- •They are expected to **engage** constructively with the **Monitoring & Reporting, and Evaluation & Learning** (MREL) teams (both, internal to the Embassy and external).
- •All requirements and responsibilities for Prime implementers must be passed on through any subcontracting to other implementers.
