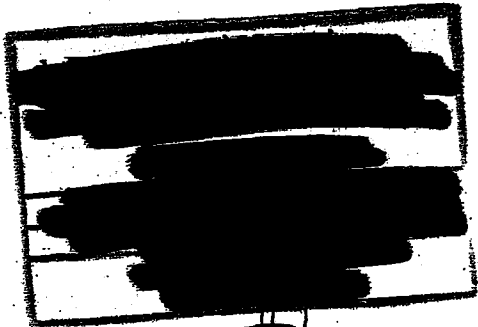

SUBJECT: HONG KONG: LEGCO ELECTIONS

1. This is just to record that, in response to requests from several London Embassies and High Commissions, on 21 and 22 September I briefed, in different groups, the Australian, Canadian and New Zealand High Commissions, the Japanese Embassy, and EU Embassies, on the LegCo elections. I told them that we would also be briefing in most capitals.

2. I stuck closely to the line to take in third TUR. The only significant respect in which I amplified that was in saying that, when the Minister of State (Mr Hanley) had passed through Hong Kong on 18 September, he had found the Governor heartened by the election results, and cautiously upbeat about his administration's ability to work with the new LegCo. [REDACTED] And it was much too early to go along with some of the more apocalyptic warnings of struggle between the Hong Kong Government and the new LegCo.

Overview

2. As the analysis in TUR makes clear, the Democratic Party has a position of considerable strength in the new LegCo. Together with the other pro-democracy parties and independents, they will form a bloc of around 30 votes; on "Livelihood" issues, on which they are likely to join forces with the DAB and pro-China unionists, they will command a clear majority.

3. So far, perhaps because they did not expect to do quite so well, the Democrats have given little public indication of their intentions.

Relationship between ExCo and LegCo

12. Another issue of great interest to the media is whether I will appoint members of the new LegCo to ExCo. During the last LegCo session and the election campaign, there were a number of suggestions that this would improve communication between ExCo and LegCo and thus reduce the likelihood of conflict when legislative or financial proposals were put to LegCo.

14. The election results have given the Democratic Party the opportunity to press for representation on ExCo, on the grounds that they and their allies may well be able to command a majority in LegCo on key issues.

[REDACTED] YEUNG Sum was quoted in the SCMP on 19 September as saying that the Party thought that ExCo should have representatives from different political parties and that they would not join if they were obliged to follow the rules of confidentiality and collective responsibility. Once again, their position may become clearer when I meet them next week.

16. There are, of course, other ways of improving communications between the executive and the legislative. In 1992, I suggested the establishment of a Government-LegCo Committee. This was rejected by LegCo largely because they could not agree on how they should be represented on it. Even now, there are mixed views from legislators on this proposal, according to media accounts. But there is a widespread feeling that communication needs to be improved. I propose in my Policy Address to make it clear that the

administration wants to establish a close relationship with LegCo,
and that we are open to any ideas about how this can best be done.
