Thank you for your email of 3 December in which you requested the following information:

The post exercise report of the Military Home Defence Exercises held in Autumn 1988.

As previously advised the information requested falls within the scope of the following qualified exemption: Section 26 Defence. A Public Interest Test (PIT) has therefore been carried out to determine whether this information can be released. The conclusion of the PIT was that the information you have requested can be provided, however some information has been redacted under Section 40: Personal Information and Section 26: Defence. The document requested is attached.

In your request you also asked the following questions which we have answered below.

1) Provide the titles and the page counts of the 3 files.

<u>Title and estimated number of pages</u> Exercises and Training: National and Home Defence Exercises - Brave Defender 2; 500 Pages Exercise Brave Defender 2; 200 Pages Ex Brave Defender 2; 50 Pages

 The likelihood of the files being released as individual files via separate FOI requests. Or if they can be broken down into different chunks to be more manageable when being reviewed.

All FOI requests from one individual on the same subject are aggregated into one FOI request if they are received by the Department within 60 days of each other. We would not be able to advise how to break down the request without reviewing the documents first which would unfortunately take longer than the time limit for FOI requests.

3) Would it be possible for a cursory glance of the documents to see if the files contained anything relating to a current (As of the documents time of writing) or future (When brave defender 2 was to be held) UKLF ORBAT.

Unfortunately this would not be possible due to the classification of the documents in question.

4) If an executive summary of the files might be provided.

An executive summary of the files is not held and it is not within the FOI act to create information.

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If you remain dissatisfied following an internal review, you may take your complaint to the Information Commissioner under the provisions of Section 50 of the Freedom of Information Act. Please note that the Information Commissioner will not investigate your case until the MOD internal review process has been completed. FOREWORD

1. Ex BRAVE DEFENDER I in 1985 was the first National Military Home Defence Exercise to practise the conventional ground defence of the United Kingdom. Ex BRAVE DEFENDER II is to be held in 1993 on a similar scale.

2. In order to maintain the momentum of high level MHD training, Regional FTXs are being conducted every three years in the intervening period between BRAVE DEFENDER exercises. The first of these was in the autumn of 1988 and is the subject of this report. The next series of Regional MHD FTXs are planned for 1991.

3. The 1988 MHD FTXs were successful and reflect credit on all those who planned and executed them. A total of some 50,000 participants were involved. From the Army these included Regulars, TA, HSF and Reservists. In addition, US Forces, Civil and MOD Police and limited OGD were involved. The US element included some 900 servicemen who flew in from the United States. Exercises would have been more satisfactory had the participation of the RN and RAF been as planned. As a result some reality was lost.

4. This PXR is to be used to further develop organisations and plans for the military home defence of the UK. In addition to following up the points in the report, it will serve as a useful guide to those planning the 1991 MHD FTXs and Ex BRAVE DEFENDER II.

5. Although this report shows that considerable progress has been made since BRAVE DEFENDER I, it also indicates that a large number of issues still require improvement. As the highest priority it is my intention to ensure that future MHD exercises, both at regional and national level, should be sponsored by UKCICC(H) in order to achieve the appropriate level of tri-Service participation without which so much of the impetus and reality of exercises is lost.

DISTRICT MILITARY HOME DEFENCE (MHD) FIELD TRAINING EXERCISES (FTX) - SEP-OCT 88 NAIN POST EXERCISE REPORT (PXR)

INTRODUCTION

1. Nine District MHD FTXs were conducted by GOCs of Districts in Great Britain between 7 Sep and 1 Nov 88. These exercises were designed to maintain the momentum of MHD training, following the first national MHD FTX, Ex BRAVE DEFENDER 1, conducted in Sep 85.

2. With the exception of specific objectives, set by the Field Army Commander for each District's exercise, GOCs were given a free hand to run their own exercises.

3. The series of exercises were successful and many valuable lessons were learned. Each District submitted a PXR to HQ UKLF for its own exercise. This main PXR draws together all the comment from individual District PXRs into a single document, setting out HQ UKLF's recommendations and responsibility for follow-up action, where applicable.

4. Inevitably, peacetime constraints, such as the selection of exercise KPs and the limited force levels available to participate in these exercises, caused a number of artificialities to be noted. Where possible, recommendations arising from artificialities have been filtered out, except where valid exercise planning considerations are concerned.

LAYOUT

5. In such a large report, containing a total of 406 individual points, it is essential that specific points can be referred to quickly. To this end, there are 2 sets of indices:

a. <u>Main Index</u>. Page (11). This sets out the subject areas and associated topic codes together with the point and page numbers.

b. <u>Subject Index</u>. In front of each Annex there is an index of subjects addressed within the Annex, together with the HQ UKLF action branch listed in the right-hand margin.

FSOPS AND ARMY FIELD MANUAL

6. Section 2 of Annex B addresses a large number of comments on these 2 documents. Detailed staffing of these is already underway as follows:

a. <u>FSOPs</u>. As a result of comment and recommendations in District reports shown in columns (c) and (d) of Annex B, a series of Working Group sessions have been planned under the sponsorship of G3 OR/TD/CD/NBC (SOP Author) which will result in the complete rewrite of this document as a 2nd draft later this year. In addition, comments arising from the EX WINTEX 89 PXR will also be addressed.

b. <u>Army Field Manual Vol 5 Part IV</u>. Similarly, comments set out in Annex B have already been taken into account in the process of redrafting this document, which will be reissued this year.

7. In a few cases, some comment on these documents is not considered valid. Where this is so, the reasons are set out in column (g) of the Annex.

SPECIAL STUDIES

8. In addition to general points for study that the Field Army Commander gave GOCs, 14 Special Studies were allocated to Districts. The status and progress of the resulting study reports is shown at Annex Q. Where Districts other than the designated proponent have commented on a special subject, this study is incorporated into the relevant part of the main report. Where subjects are unique, brief progress reports are included in Appendices to Annex Q.

CIVILIAN PARTICIPATION

9. Police. Although comment on civilian participation is addressed in Annex A, Section 2, it is important that Home Office policy on this matter is clear, so that future expectations of civilian involvement on similar exercises can be set in proper perspective. Notwithstanding the limited ability of the civil police to participate in exercises, their operational primacy in MHD remains fundamental to the MHD concept of operations. No specific funding from central government exists to support police participation in MHD exercises; such police involvement as there has been is due entirely to the flexibility and cooperation of Chief Constables. It is therefore important that existing good relations are nurtured and maintained.

10. Other Government Departments (OGD). Addressing this matter on Ex TORCHLIGHT 88, the Winister of State at the Home Office pointed out that, "the Civil side has a full range of peacetime responsibilities, of which emergency planning forms but a tiny part". The effect of this is that whiist Regional Emergency Committees will always be encouraged to take a part in WHD exercises, Local Authorities are another matter. Home Office policy is that the first priority for local government is to have their wartime emergency plans in place before they participate in exercises.

11. <u>RN and RAF</u>. The reduced participation inevitably constrained virtually all District exercises and led to some loss of reality.

MHD RECCE

12. Comment on MHD Recce (Annex D, Section 1) is based largely on the military aspects of currently perceived tasks. Two vital factors were largely ignored as a result of exercise artificialities:

a. The primacy role of the civil police in MHD recce in its broadest sense.

b. Strict interpretation of the Police/Military Joint Tactical Doctrine (PMJTD).

. These factors, together with the conversion of TA infantry battalion mortar sections into recce sections, creates an urgent need for MHD recce to be reviewed. Without a valid concept of operations and proper organisation to meet that concept, the much needed enhancements in equipment will not be funded. Consequently, this subject is on the agenda of the next UKLF Concepts and Equipments Committee (CEC).

IMPACT OF EX WINTEX 89

13. Comment by Districts contained in this Report was made well before Ex WINTEX 89 had taken place. In most cases, HQ UKLF's comments also pre-dated Ex WINTEX. The consequent concurrency of this Report with the WINTEX PXR is fortuitous, because it allows many conclusions and recommendations to be incorporated in the PXR for Ex WINTEX.

14. In many ways MHD FTXs and CPXs are complementary, insofar as in certain areas, each refresh the parts that the others cannot reach. By this means a more realistic assessment of problems is possible.

CONCLUSION

15. This Report is issued at a time when the start of planning for similar exercises in 1991 is imminent. The recommendations of this report should be taken into account when both the 1991 exercises and Ex BRAVE DEFENDER 1993 are planned.



AIR DEFENCE

1. CinC UKAIR is ultimately responsible for AD in the UKADR and in this capacity needs to have operational control over all LLAD assets. The only LLAD capability not under operational command of UKAIR are:

a. 12 x JAVELIN from 5 AB Bde.

b. AD assets of HM ships in ports.

2. It is considered by HQ UKLF (Arty) that there should be some LLAD capability for point defence of selected critical KPs, but no assets exist or are currently planned to meet this requirement.

3. It is therefore recommended that the requirement for LLAD to protect selected KPs is examined by UKCICC(H) in consultation with HQ STC, so as to identify a national order of priority for AD protection of KPs.

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4. It is of note that on Ex WINTEX 89, the JAVELIN were placed under operational control of CinC UKAIR.


1. There is an unanimously held view that there are not enough Recce assets in UKLF. DRAC has proposed a number of options, the most expensive of which involves the creation of an additional 9 Sqns. It is also hoped that the next phase of the TA mortar/recce issue will be the expansion of the present force (15 men/bn) to a full platoon (an increase of 10 men/bn). The resolution of these aspirations can only be met in the context of the UKLF ORBAT Review.

2. However it may be that the CIVPOL factor has been consistently overlooked. CIVPOL have been unable to provide on exercise anything like the effort they would devote in war. Hence many tasks have been given to Recce on exercise that CIVPOL are more suited to, and which they would carry out in war. Moreover the resources of the combined CIVPOL Forces in any Army District make the Recce assets look puny in comparison. It is exercise experience that has led to the current view that there are too few Recce assets. The CIVPOL contribution in war has, for obvious reasons, not been accurately assessed.

3. Furthermore, exercise experience has led to a distorted view of the types of task Recce should be capable of performing. This has led to a degree of overfacing (as evinced in GOC SWDIST's letters on the subject following Ex DRAKE's DRUM).

4. Unfortunately EDIST's PXR did not take CIYPOL into account. It may be the Army Cond's view that a Study into the whole question of tasks, equipment, capabilities and quantity of Recce, all in the context of the capabilities of CIYPOL, would be appropriate.

5. Planned enhancements to HD Yeo (Sp Tps to convert to Recce and equipment improvements) could proceed without further staffing once final CEC approval is granted. The next CEC meeting is in Apr. The conversion of TA HD Inf battalions' mortar sections to Recce has been fully staffed in the HQ and is awaiting DGTA & Org approval. Further expansion of all Recce forces (Yeo and Inf) will be considered in the context of the ORBAT Reviews.



UKWMO

1. The general concept of using ROC posts in the general surveillance network around KPs is accepted. However communications present a major problem.

2. It has proved impossible to adapt either of the radios held by the ROC to communicate with Army units. Telephone and personal contact are the only possible means. Radio will either have to be loaned or additional sets purchased to meet this requirement. Neither option is considered appropriate in the current climate.

3. Further work to identify which posts are suitably located to provide useful surveillance information to KP guards, would have to be carried out at District level.
