# Routine inspection under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012

As you know, an unannounced inspection of your travelling circus took place on 14 April 2017 under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012 (the "Regulations").

### **Decision of the Circus Licensing Panel**

In summary, the inspector recommended that your current licence be continued.

As before, a copy of the inspection report is now attached for your information. You are reminded that, where an inspection report's use in deciding the status of a licence has been concluded, it is our usual policy to release inspection reports in response to any Freedom of Information request.

The inspector's findings have been considered by a panel of officials on behalf of the Secretary of State (the "Panel"), who were satisfied that at the time of the visit the conditions of the Regulations appeared to be being complied with and who have recommended that your current licence is allowed to continue.

While the inspector was satisfied that all of the licence conditions are being met by your circus, there were some additional points the Panel would like you to address or consider:

 The Panel noted the inspector's finding that the Camel 'Kashmere' had a 'small lick granuloma type lesion on his left upper lip'. The Panel agreed that the lesion should be monitored and its condition recorded along with the records being kept on the camel's weaving behaviour. The Panel would like you to discuss the newly occurred granuloma, and any necessary follow-up, with your lead vet. Given that a 'lick granuloma' potentially indicates another type of abnormal behaviour (along with the weaving behaviour) the Panel agreed with the inspector that you should now, in consultation with your lead vet, seek specialist advice on the camel from a behaviour expert. The inspector has recommended that a behaviourist experienced in equine problems may be able to offer advice on behavioural therapies. Details of any discussions with your lead vet and a behaviourist, along with any therapies recommended, should be recorded in the camel's care plans; to be reviewed at your next inspection.

- 2. The Panel noted the inspector's comments that the reindeer appeared at the time of the inspection to be fit to be displayed again. However, the Panel were content that as the reindeer are being monitored by your lead vet, they should not be used in performance or in display until your lead vet has passed them fit to do so. A copy of the letter from your lead vet containing that approval should be sent to APHA/Defra.
- 3. The Panel noted the inspector's recommendations concerning your record keeping. However, the Panel only recommends that this advice is something you should consider, perhaps in discussion with your representative body the Circus Guild of Great Britain.
- 4. Finally, the Panel agreed to remind you that, although the inspection found no visual signs of further problems at the time of the visit, this does not necessarily mean that the ongoing recurrent conditions that have been previously identified have been fully addressed. You should continue the ongoing monitoring and treatment of any chronic/recurrent conditions as required.

### **Further Inspections**

We made clear to you when issuing your licence that there would be at least two additional inspections during the year. The inspection on 14 April 2017 represented one of these inspections. There will be at least one further announced inspection during the year. The Secretary of State also retains the power to undertake further announced or unannounced inspections during the remaining period of your licence. Additional inspections may also be required in response to changes in your stock list, any complaints received or concerns raised about the wild animals in your circus.

You will usually be charged for the costs of any further inspection visits, once they have taken place.

### ANIMALS

Kashmere, the older camel was reported previously to have some areas of alopecia. At my visit he appeared in good coat. He was tethered and 'sat' watching the general activities. After being disturbed by us and left when we moved to other animals he began weaving, we noted this each time there was activity in the back areas which he wasn't involved in. He also exhibited some anticipatory behaviour.

Kashmere also had a small lick-granuloma-type lesion on his left upper lip which the circus felt might be a temporary lesion associated with licking molassess off his lip. This should be monitored going forwards and the Lead vet consulted if it doesn't quickly disappear.

The weaving should be looked at by a behaviourist experienced in equine problems. I understood that he has always shown this behaviour since he arrived on the circus. But there may be behavioural 'therapies' which could be applied.

Kachana was in a heavy full coat and no visible lesions were noted on visual inspection (previously reported alopecia on inner rear legs) were noted with him standing, he appears to have no other problems.

The reindeer, Naughty and Nice have had a history of dermatits in the lower legs and although travelling with the show are not allowed to perform or be seen. Neither had an active problem and the time of the visit and have good hair regrowth over the sites, there are still some cornified/thickened areas but it appears that treatment has been successful. I can see little reason to exclude them from being seen, or indeed in doing what little they always did - ie participate in a parade of animals at the beginning or end of the show. Naughty has also had a recurrent 'tooth abscess' problem, this has been investifgated and treated. Although no absolute cause has been determined it appears quiescent at the moment, but is kept under observation. I would suggest a review of the status of these animals to allow them to return to the 'zoo' rather than being hidden each showtime.

Outdoor areas are satisfactory, the layout of the site does not pemit the usual shape of the areas but the fencing has been used to construct perfectly adequate large areas.

It has been requested that the Lead Vet carry out a clinical examination of all licensed animals at one of the two visits each year. The animals are all tractable and this would be a sensible exercise and should be properly recorded in the animals records.

In my view the records are too complex, there are too many individual documents and the summary sections are unused. The animal records all have headers for clinical history, and behaviour. These are not used and could contain useful summary header info extracted from the detailed clinical history on the records. Similarly record forms are used very much in the way a paper record would be, ie the form, is completed and another one begun. A better system would be a desktop folder for each licensed animal (and others), in this would be one of their forms completed as a single open word document, adding new info to the top as a new entry is made, old history would scroll down but easily be accessible. Vet reports could be cut and pasted in and the actual reports marked appropriately or moved into an archive. Also in each folder would be all the various records related to animal, training, behaviour etc scans of vet reports, photos. Care plans easily identified as single documents. Various documents would also be bersion tracked with review dates.

I would also strongly recommend getting this computerised data in the cloud, once on dropbox it could be downloaded anywhere they need it, on new computers etc. Accessed by phones where there is no power. At the moment there are file cards which are their long standing records, computerised records comprising many files to comply with inspections - containing all of the essential data, and printed paper backups. A more user friendly system would help.

It is recommended that the license be continued.





### Dear Carol

Thank you for your email concerning the letter from your lead vet regarding your reindeers' coats.

We wanted to check a couple of things before getting back to you. Under veterinary certification principles vets are allowed to sign certificates "subject of supporting evidence from an authorised veterinarian who has personal knowledge of the matters in question".

Your lead vet letter of 4 May 2017 confirms he is happy that the reindeer return to public viewing. Our Circus licensing inspector's report of 14 April 2017 provides observations of the reindeer condition confirming that the coats have 'good hair regrowth over the sites'. In our view this appears to be sufficient evidence to fulfil the lead vets requirement on his report dated 28 February 2017 - where he stated that the reindeer 'should be withheld from public viewing until the coats have recovered further'. On this basis, we are content for you to use your reindeer again for the purpose of display and performance in your travelling circus.

However, your lead vet's report of 28 February 2017 states that you would be sending photographs to him showing hair regrowth. It is not clear whether this has taken place. We would expect you and your lead vet to be consistent with past letters and communications, and evidence of this to be available for future inspections by Defra once your circus returns to England. Further, you are reminded that Defra Circus licensing inspections do not generally involve a full clinical examination. Therefore, as set out in Defra's letter of 20<sup>th</sup> March, you should still ensure that one of the two required annual routine inspections that must be carried out by your lead vet <u>must include a clinical veterinary inspection of your licensed animals.</u>

Application for a licence under the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012 – Addition of new Zebra to your stock list

Thank you for your email of 26 May concerning the addition of the zebra 'Humbug' to your stock list.

Unless a shorter period is agreed, the Welfare of Wild Animals in Travelling Circuses (England) Regulations 2012 require a minimum of 14 days prior written notice before new animals can be acquired for use in a travelling circus (Condition 1 of the Licensing conditions). However, as you acquired the zebra in Wales, where you are currently touring and where the 2012 Regulations do not apply, we are content on this occasion to accept your email of 26 May as the required prior written notice. The formal 14 day notification period ended on 9<sup>th</sup> June 2017, and we will accept your updated stock list (containing all the wild animals you now have).

Further, before you return to England you will need to ensure all the relevant records are updated as appropriate. The following list outlines the new paperwork you will need in place for when your circus returns to England:

- An individual record for the zebra;
- Care plans for the zebra, agreed with and signed by your lead vet;
- An updated list of people authorised to have contact with, and care for the zebra.

The plans do not need to be sent to us, but they should be in place by the time your circus returns to England where they can be checked by an inspector. Depending on when you propose to return to England, it may be necessary for an inspector to undertake an inspection of your circus now a zebra has been added to your stock list. Alternatively, the inspection may form part of your final routine inspection of the year. You will be charged for the cost of this inspection once it has taken place.
