Preliminary flood risk assessment: Tameside Metropolitan Borough Council

This addendum by Tameside Metropolitan Borough Council (2017) updates the council's preliminary flood risk assessment report published in 2011. Read the addendum in conjunction with the <u>preliminary assessment report</u>.

Addendum

The preliminary flood risk assessment (PFRA) and flood risk areas (FRAs) for Tameside Metropolitan Borough Council (Tameside MBC) were reviewed during 2017, using all relevant current flood risk data and information.

Past flood risk

Localised flooding occurred in east Tameside following intense rainfall on November 21st 2016. Six key flooding sites were recorded, all being located around areas centred on Wild Bank Hill which included: Demesne Drive area, Huddersfield Road, Tame Close and Town Centre area, Stalybridge. Micklehurst Road, Mossley. Highfield Gardens, Hollingworth. The intensity of the rainfall on Wild Bank Hill resulted in a large volume of surface water runoff. This, in turn, led to a number of inlet structures being unable to cope with the amount of water and debris during this weather event. This caused localised flooding to a number of areas with 80 properties being affected.

Whilst areas to the east of the Borough were impacted by substantial flooding following the 21st November 2016 severe weather event, they are not considered persistent problems However, full details with regards to this event and impact can be found in the Tameside MBC Section 19 report and can be accessed at; www.tameside.gov.uk/floodresilience
