

EXPORT OF CATS AND DOGS FROM GREAT BRITAIN TO MADAGASCAR

NOTES FOR GUIDANCE OF THE OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN AND EXPORTER

IMPORTANT

These notes provide guidance to Official Veterinarians (OV) and exporters. The Notes for Guidance (NFG) should have been issued to you together with export certificate 3951EHC. The NFG should not be read as a standalone document but in conjunction with certificate 3951EHC. We strongly suggest that exporters obtain full details of the importing country's requirements from the veterinary authorities in the country concerned, or their representatives in the UK, in advance of each consignment.

1. SUMMARY OF REQUIREMENTS

- For unaccompanied dogs and cats, an import permit from the veterinary authorities in Madagascar;
- Export health certificate issued by DEFRA;
- Animals must be examined by the OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN, not more than 48 hours prior to export;
- Rabies vaccination;
- Exporter's declaration confirming that the animal has not been imported into the UK in the 6 months prior to export;
- Treatment against roundworm and tapeworm.

2. CERTIFICATION BY AN OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN (OV)

This certificate may be signed by an OV appointed by the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, the Scottish Government or the Welsh Government, who is on the appropriate panel for export purposes or who holds the appropriate Official Controls Qualification (Veterinary)(OCQ(V)) authorisation, or an Authorised Veterinary Inspector (AVI) appointed by the Department of Agriculture, Environment and Rural Affairs - Northern Ireland (DAERA).

OVs/AVIs should sign and stamp the health certificate with the OV/AVI stamp in any colour **OTHER THAN BLACK**.

A certified copy of the completed certificate must be sent to the issuing office (in GB - the Centre for International Trade, Carlisle) within seven days of signing, or in the case of Northern Ireland, to DAERA, Dundonald House, Belfast.

The OV/AVI should keep a copy for his/her own records.

3. IMPORT PERMIT

An application to import dogs and cats into Madagascar is needed only if the dogs are unaccompanied. Applications for import permits should be addressed to The Director of Animal Production and Sea Fisheries Antananarivo, Madagascar.

4. RABIES VACCINATION

The veterinary authorities in Madagascar require vaccination not less than 30 days and not more than 12 months prior to export. A rabies vaccination certificate must be completed by the veterinary surgeon who administers the vaccine. It should be attached to the export health certificate.

5. NOTIFIABLE DISEASE CLEARANCE

OFFICIAL VETERINARIANS may certify paragraph IV(e) country freedom from rabies, providing written authority to do so has been obtained from the issuing office on form EC618.

6. TREATMENT

Within 3 days of export, dogs and cats must be treated with a medicinal product which is effective against roundworm and tapeworm. If this treatment is administered by a veterinary surgeon other than the OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN, the OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN must be provided with a letter or certificate confirming the administration of the treatment and the date of administration.

7. TRAVELLING THROUGH OTHER COUNTRIES

It is the responsibility of the exporter/agent to apply to the relevant authorities of any transit countries for permission to transport the animals through these countries. Additional health certification may be necessary.

8. **WELFARE DURING TRAVEL**

Welfare conditions during transport are laid down by Council Regulation EC 1/2005, implemented in England by The Welfare of Animals (Transport) (England) Order 2006, and parallel legislation in Scotland, Wales, and Northern Ireland.

Exporters must comply with the UK welfare laws relating to the export of animals. If transported by air, animals should be transported in accordance with International Air Transport Association (IATA) standards.
